

A RABBINICAL VISITOR.

South Africa has ever attracted distinguished visitors from Europe, and the present is no exception. In our midst is Mr. Reuben Brainin, the distinguished Zionist and Hebraist scholar, Dr. Miriam Bernstein Kahan, the renowned exponent of Hebrew dramatic art, and now we have to welcome a distinguished Rabbi and scholar from Vilna, Russia. Rabbi J. L. Gurewitz has undertaken a mission in South Africa to raise funds for the Yeshiva in Polish-Lithuania, which, owing to the sad economic conditions existing there at the present, are in sore financial straits.

The visiting Rabbi has just returned from Cape Town, where, during his his ing his two months' stay, he made a deep impression and succeeded in interesting an influential committee of communal workers in his mission. He has consented to address the community at a number of Synagogues and large attendances were present when he preached on Friday last at the Berea Synagogue, in the afternoon, and at the Wolmarans Street Synagogue in the evening. The following day, Saturday, 27th April, he delivered a "Drosha" at the Orthodox Beth Hamedrash, in Fox Street, and proved himself to be a fine orator.

UNITED TALMUD TORAHS. A short while ago it was announced that the Council of the United Talmud Torah Schools of Johannesburg had entered into an arrangement with the Berea Hebrew Congregation Classes would be opened in Berea, and it is now reported that these classes will be commenced on 5th May and held at the Corona Lodge, 8 O'Reilley Road, Berea. Hours and days of tuition are Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, 3-6 p.m., and Saturdays and Sundays, 10-12 noon, and enrolment of pupils is now proceeding. The Berea Hebrew School, as the classes will be known, will come under the direct control of the Council, United Talmud Torahs, assisted by a Local Grayania Day the Governing Body to be elected by the members and parents (of pupils), and will be inspected periodically by he Inspector, the Rev. H. Lipschitz.

Schonfrucht, the celebrated Belgian soprano, who was accompanied by Professor Margottini, Miss Suzanne Margolis, the brilliant pianist, and Margaret Stoddart, who gave violin solos and was accompanied by Helen Graham.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sacke are due to leave for England and the Con-"tinent by the "Edinburgh Castle," sailing on May 3rd.



UNGALLANT STUDENTS ANTI-SEMITISM.

Miss Elizabeth Simon, the Jewish girl who was selected as "Miss Europe" at the recent International Beauty Contest in Paris, went through a very unpleasant experience at her home in her birth-town, Kossthsly, Hungary, where her father, Dr. Simon, is in practice as a medical man and serves as a member of the Board of the local Jewish community. A group of students at the Agricultural School went to the cinema of Kossthsly, where a film was being shown, depicting Miss Simon's triumphal entry into Budapest. They created a terrible disturbance there and finally compelled the showing of of the film to be suspended. They then proceeded to Dr. Simon's house and held a demonstration outside against Miss Simon, cat-calling and shouting "Down with the Jewess.".

The Hakoah Jewish football team, which was organised in New York, has won the American Soccer Championship in the final series, playing against the St. Louis Madison Kennel Club.

(The Hakoah Jewish Football Team of Vienna first arrived on a tour in the United States in February, 1926, and played matches with remarkable success against American professional teams throughout the country. Several of the leading players decided to stay behind in America, and organised an all-Jewish soccer team.)
