

JEWISH GIRLS' RESIDENTIAL HOME.

The movement undertaken by the Jewish Ladies' Communal League for the foundation of a Jewish Girls' Residential Home, to which reference was made a short while ago in these columns, is now assuming concrete form. Lady Oppenheimer, who has taken a live interest in the movement, is devoting much energy and time in bringing the idea into being. Assisted by an energetic Committee, funds are being collected for the project. The League has purchased the very imposing house and property situated at the corner of Harrow Road and Hendon Street. It is certain that this residence will make an ideal home for young Jewish working girls, and applications have already been received for accommodation. Lady Oppenheimer, with her usual generosity, has, besides a gift towards the purchase of the Home, advanced a further loan, so that the purchase could be completed, and it is hoped that the public will help the Committee to repay this loan at a very early date.

It is proposed that the Home shall be opened at the commencement of December next when Mrs. Heymann, the President of the League, who originated the movement, returns from Europe. It is advisable that those who desire to avail themselves of the opportunity of reserving accommodation should apply to the Hon. Secretary, P.O. Box 2697, Johannesburg, without delay.

The promoters of the movement have entered into the scheme with the same whole-heartedness as they did when, under their auspices the South African Jewish Orphanage was started, and are convinced that Johannesburg Jewry will in due course be very proud of the new Home which, it is felt, will supply a long-needed want.

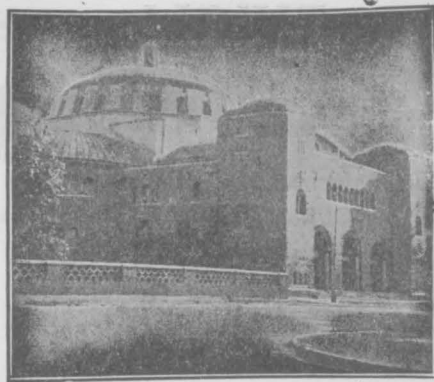
