Dr. Goldstein then delivered a powerful lecture, which made a deep

Dr. Goldstein ended up by paying a special tribute to the Chaluzim in Palestine; he made a stirring appeal to the girls and boys present to offer themselves for their country! he told us quite candidly of the sacrifices to be made, and so on, but with his earnestness and eloquence, stirred quite a number of young Zionists hearts to such an extent, that it will not be at all surprising if his words will bear very good fruit.

Mrs. Levine expressed the feeling of all present when she proposed a vote of thanks to Dr. Goldstein for his impressive address. A very interesting evening was brought to a close with the singing of " Hatikvah

and the National Anthem.
