FIFTY YEARS AGO IN GERMANY

whereas, so far, the anti-Semitic Press had consisted of a few obscure rags, he now induced some of the influential conservative papers to adopt a hostile attitude.

The Jews of Germany had been so successful in business and in those professions which they could practice, that it was not very difficult to demonstrate their alleged iniquities to a multitude of jealous competitors in a country of

some thirty different States and about as many parties, all intolerant of each otner's opinions and principles. For the first time Members of Parliament were elected on a purely anti-Semitic platform, Stoecker himself, Ahlwardt, Libermann von Sonnenberg and others that would have fitted into the times of Torquemada. Ugly incidents happened at Berlin, and riots, accompanied by violence and destruction of property, took place at smaller towns like Schivelbein and Conitz, while at Xanten on the Rhine there was even a ritual murder riot, although on the

whole the Roman Catholics were quite tolerant.

However, the Government down these troubles an iron hand with and impartial justice, and life went on much as before, but with the unpleasant feeling that the enemy was steadily growing stronger and might at any time break out into aggressiveness. So in the end my father, who had tasted British freedom and felt the call of Africa in his blood, decided to return to the land of his hopes, and the whole family sailed for the Cape in 1882, for which I bless the old man with all my heart full fifty years after.
