CITY COUNCIL UNABLE TO TAKE ACTION.

It is learned that the City Council of Cape Town is unable to take any official action to remove the huge swastika which has been laid out in whitewashed stones on the slopes of Table Mountain just above the Devil's Peak Estate.

The discovery of the swastika caused a great deal of resentment in the city and complaints were lodged with the municipal authorities.

It has been ascertained, however, that the swastika is laid out on private property and the City Council have, therefore, no jurisdiction in the matter.

Rosh Hashonah in the City

A Brief Impression

JOHANNESBURG on Monday and Tuesday last presented an unusual appearance to the person passing through. The city was strangely subdued, as though the great throbbing song of commerce and industry had for the while been stilled. For it was the New Year, and hundreds of businesses were closed.

In all the synagogues of the city there were crowds of people, young and old, who gathered to celebrate these solemn days of Israel—festive days into which there is introduced somehow a note of austerity; for is not the great White Fast at hand, the dread Yom Kippur on which the people of the world pass before the throne of diving judgment for their fate during the coming year?

Men and women were dressed in new clothes, the women presenting a gay symphony of bright colours in this land where Rosh Hashonah coincides with the first weeks of Spring—a mystic herald, as it were, of the new year of the seasons.

And during two days and two nights there was a massed humanity praying before Almighty God, and the white-robed cantors, decked with long talisim as with stoles, sang to the hushed gatherings in the Synagogues the beautiful melodies of their people—grand and wistful melodies that have survived through two thousand years of martyrdom.

And then, on the evening of the second day, the concluding services of the Rosh Hashonah Holy Days were held, and the nation gathering in strange communion far and wide, went back again to the small worlds in which they had their life, to resume on the following day the ways of those worlds in peaceful co-operation with their neighbours.

The Services in Johannesburg.

AT the great synagogue in Wolmarans Street the sermon was preached by Chief Rabbi Dr. J. L. Landau, M.A., Ph.D., who delivered an eloquent and impressive oration, which was received by a crowded hall. The services were conducted by Chief Cantor Inspektor, assisted by a carefully trained choir under the baton of Mr. G. Grosberg, who was also Second Reader.

As on previous occasions, the beautiful voice of Cantor Berele Chagy attracted a great crowd to the Beth Hamedrash Hagodel. Cantor Chagy was assisted by Mr. Kapelovsky and a fine choir under the baton of Mr. Ichilchik. The sermon was preached by Rabbi I. Kossowski, Rabbi of the Federation of Synagogues.

At the Yeoville Synagogue the sermon was preached by Rev. A. T. Schrock, B.A., and the services were conducted by Cantor Lopato, assisted by Mr. M. Shapiro and a full choir under the baton of Mr. J. Kantor. The choir earned the highest praise from the congregation.

Cantor S. Steinberg officiated at the Berea Synagogue assisted by Mr. I. W. Cohen and a well-trained choir under the baton of Mr. Solly Steinberg.

The services of the Johannesburg Reform Congregation were conducted by Rabbi M. C. Weiler, and a fine choir under the baton of Mr. J. Idelson. Here on the second day the Haphtarah was read by a youth of fourteen, Master Montague Gordon.

At the Jeppe Synagogue the services were conducted by Rev. A. M. Kaplan, who was assisted by a well-trained choir.
