Brilliant Symphony Concert

The Johannesburg Symphony Society held its 24th concert at the Wanderers Hall on Thursday last. Miss Elsie Hall gave a magnificent performance of the Schumann concerto in A Minor, opus 54, followed by Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. 7 in E Major, with Mr. Joseph Trautneck as conductor.

This piano concerto, typical of Schumann in his best moods, was handled with skill to the point of perfection. Miss Hall displayed a masterful technique and a perfectly balanced emotional sense. Her tone gradations and smooth legato playing delighted the audience. The many changes of tempo and style were played with complete control. This brilliant work has a colourful background in the orchestral accompaniment. After such an inspiring performance the wholehearted ovation she received compelled Miss Hall to return for two encores.

The other item on the programme Bruckner's Symphony, performed for the first time in Johannesburg, is interesting due to its unusual treatment. Each section of the orchestra was given an opportunity to display itself to advantage in the tremendous technical difficulties presented. The emotional conception reached a very high level, the repeated rumbling of the drums bringing each movement to a terrific climax. Mr. Trautneck, who has widened the musical repertoire of Johannesburg concert-goers, chose this difficult symphony to prove the capabilities of his orchestra and the result was very much worth while.
