Mrs. Gluckman and the Bnoth Zion.

The Bnoth Zion Association were "At Home" on Tuesday, 15th inst., at "Arnville," Oranjezicht, the residence of Mrs. B. Berold when members and friends had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. K. Gluckman (member of the S.A. Zionist Federation) and Mrs. L. Braudo (wife of the President of the Federation). There was a large attendance and a very pleasant afternoon was spent in discussing matters Zionistic and ways and means of strengthening the women's movement. Mrs. J. Herbstein presided, and she extended a very hearty welcome to the visitors.

Mrs. Gluckman emphasised that the chief interest of the Zionist Movement seemed to be centred on women's work. The Jewish mother had the difficult task of passing on the legacy of Israel to her children, who were often tempted by the glamour of the unknown, alien environment.

The Zionist Movement was quick to accept women on equal terms with men in all its activities, and to-day women were holding important positions in Eretz Israel.

Mrs. Gluckman then outlined the scope and activities of the Johannesburg Women's Zionist Society. She had reason to be proud of her organisation and said that the men were not nearly as active as the women of that city. Their society had been inaugurated some seventeen years ago by Mrs. Landau. It had progressed steadily and to-day it was doing most of the national work in Johannesburg. Branches were formed in almost every suburb and the support of all the women was enlisted. Mrs. Gluckman advocated for the formation of women's branches in Cape Town.

The Johannesburg women Zionists were also forming Children's Zionist Groups and these were functioning admirably. But in all their activities they were under the disadvantage of not having a Zionist Hall.

Discussion was led by Mrs. P. Clouts. Hearty votes of thanks to the speaker and to Mrs. Berold, the hostess, were moved from the chair and carried with acclamation.

Maccabean Guild Concert.

The sixth popular concert of the Maccabean Guild Orchestra took place at the Zionist Hall on Monday, 14th inst. The orchestra played very well indeed, and presented the following items: "Selection of Hebrew Melodies," by Phillipson; Intermezzo from "Cavelliera Rusticana," Mascagni; "Valse des Fleurs," by Tchaikowsky.

Miss S. Katz delighted the audience with her singing and Mr. E. Eberlin gave a fine rendering of "Mazur" by Mlynarski, and another violin solo as an encore. Mr. Harry Garfinkel's songs were very much appreciated. After the interval, when refreshments were served, Mr. C. Israel staged the popular farce "Packing Up." Mr. I. M. Grusd as Mr. Chugwater was most entertaining. Miss Carlson played Mrs. Chugwater and Mr. N. Lazarow was the porter.

The concert was altogether a highly entertaining one. Though the audience was a little bigger on this occasion, still the Maccabean Guild Orchestra deserves far greater support than it is receiving.

Muizenberg and Kalk Bay Talmud Torah.

The Annual General Meeting of the Muizenberg and Kalk Bay Talmud Torah School was held at the Muizenberg Synagogue on Sunday, 6th December, at 10.30 a.m.

In his presidential report Mr. I. H. Guinsberg pointed out that a day lost to a child never comes back, and that it is most important to instil love, respect, and pride in Judaism in our children. He further said that Talmud Torah work should be above personalities, politics and all pettiness whatsoever.

In his report Mr. J. Lehrman, the Principal, said that there were at present forty-five children attending classes.

Oneg Shabbos.

An address on "Chanukah" was delivered last Saturday afternoon by Dr. C. Kaufman at the Oneg Shabbos. Dr. Kaufman gave a brief survey of the history of the Hasmonaim and assessed their place in Jewish life.

There was a large gathering present, over

whom Mr. Ch. B. Levinsohn presided. A short discussion followed the lecture. During the course of the afternoon a humorous story from one of Tunkler's works was read by Mr. G. Laden.

At Parow.

On Sunday, the second day of Chanukah, the children of the Parow Talmud Torah were examined in the various subjects taught them during the past year by Rabbi B. Lipshitz. The members of the Congregation who were present expressed their pleasure and satisfaction at the immense progress achieved by the children and thanked the Rabbi for the success attained.

That same evening a Chanukah concert was held in the Talmud Torah Hall in aid of the Parow Hebrew Helping Hand Society. During the first part of the programme one of the children of the Hebrew school lit the Chanukah candles after which songs were sung. Rabbit Lipschitz gave an interesting lecture on "The Jewish Tradition and Chanukah." There were further songs and recitations by the children and the concert concluded with the singing of Hatikvah.

Mrs. Gluckman at the Maccabean Guild Luncheon.

"The Jewish Problem and its Solution" was the subject of an address delivered by Mrs. K. Gluckman at the Maccabean Guild Luncheon at the Carlton Hotel yesterday.

To-day, Mrs. Gluckman argued, there was a great danger that our youth might assimilate. Conditions in the Jewish world were so bad, there was so much persecution and torture, that youth, which liked to seek its own solution to its problems often came to the conclusion that assimilation was the only solution in this case. They were often led to such convictions because of their ignorance of Jewish history and traditions.

Mrs. Gluckman went on to show that assimilation was no solution to the Jewish problem "just as suicide is no solution to the problem of the individual." The only solution, she urged, was Zionism which, in building up a national home for the Jewish people and in reviving Jewish culture and traditions, called for the respect of the whole civilised world.

Miss M. Gitlin presided and a vote of thanks was accorded the speaker by Mr. M. Horwitz.

The Work of Wolf Kibel.

The work of Mr. Wolf Kibel has been the subject of discussion in artistic circles this week. His exhibition of pictures which was opened by the Lady de Villiers last Monday morning at Martin Melck House was very well attended.

Mr. Kibel is a modernist of great promise. A deep emotionalism characterises his pictures. His compositions are original in design and treatment. 
