Obituary.

Rev. A. ROBINSON.

The death took place at his residence on Saturday afternoon of Rev. A. Robinson, a former minister at the Great Synagogue.

Mr. Robinson came from Ireland with his family in 1902. He was a noted scholar and a great lover of Hebrew literature. He was for many years a teacher of Hebrew.

A few years after his arrival here, Rev. Robinson was appointed a minister at the Great Synagogue, a post from which he retired a few years ago. He was highly respected and greatly loved by his pupils and members of his congregation.

The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon and was attended by a large gathering, and at the graveside a tribute to the deceased was paid by Rev. Bender.

Rev. Robinson leaves a widow, three sons and four daughters, to whom the deepest condolences are extended in their bereavement.

An Appreciation.

The death of the Rev. A. Robinson has robbed the Jewish community of the Cape Peninsula of a well-known and highly respected member. Coming to South Africa from Ireland in the year 1902, he soon gathered round him a large circle of pupils in whom he inspired a love and reverence for their religion and traditions, for as a teacher of Hebrew Mr. Robinson not only inculcated a knowledge of the language into those who were fortunate enough to come under his guidance, but also imbued them with the ideals of Judaism. Some years after his arrival he was appointed as one of the ministers at the Great Synagogue, which he served with a zeal and devotion that were characteristic of all that he did. His kindly disposition, his earnestness and sincerity endeared him to the hearts of all those with whom he came in contact. The deepest sympathy is extended to his widow and family.

Cape Town Young Judeans.

7th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION.

There was a large and representative gathering at the Zionist Hall on Sunday evening last to celebrate the seventh anniversary of the Cape Town Young Judeans. Delegates of many of the neighbouring Judean and Zionist Societies were present, as well as the parents of the members. The hall was very prettily decorated and the tables were well laden with refreshments.

In opening the function, Mr. H. Zuckerman welcomed the guests. He gave a short resumé of the growth of the Society and pointed out the advantages to be gained by becoming a member of it. It helped the youngsters to gain a broader outlook upon life and Judaism. In concluding, he read a note from Rev. A. P. Bender, who apologised for his inability to attend, but who complimented the Society on its development and expressed pleasure at its good work. The Deputy Mayor, Mr. L. Gradner, wrote in similar terms.

Mr. G. Gitlin, the Chairman of the Society, stressed upon the audience the urgent necessity for new members in order to promote the growth and strength of the movement. With the atrocities in Germany and with the ever-growing fear of anti-Semitism throughout the world, there was a dire need for the advancement of Zionism and the establishment of a National Home in Palestine. The work of the Society had to be recognised not as a pastime nor as a business, but as educational. Here the Zionist spirit was instilled into members so as to help them to build Eretz Israel.

Dr. J. Mibashan congratulated the Society on attaining its seventh birthday and urged it to carry forward the Jewish flag and the Zionist cause with renewed vigour and enthusiasm. "It must be the aim of every boy and girl to learn more of Judaism. Now with racial strife in many countries the Jewish youth are the torch-bearers of the Jewish nation. Youth is the tender age for inculcating knowledge of Judaism and Zionism." The Society had achieved a certain amount of success, and the only appropriate thing to do now was for members to redouble their efforts for the movement.

A very entertaining musical programme followed, in which Mr. Max Bellon sang, Miss Freda Fernandez danced, Miss Cecilia Rogoff played the piano, Miss Hannah Oblowitz recited, and Mr. C. Kreitzer played the violin. The pupils of the Misses Elvira and Miriam Kirsch's Dance Studio also gave two turns. Refreshments were then served.

Mr. S. Levine proposed the toast of the seniors.

Dr. S. E. Kark, replying on behalf of the seniors, said the youth of this country had to be prepared for stormy times; the only way to become so was by adequate organisation of the Junior Societies and by practical work in addition to theoretic argument. He extended his best wishes to the Society for its success in the future.
