Zionist Socialist Party.

A reception in honour of the fifth anniversary was held at the Zionist Hall on Sunday night.

Mr. Achron was in the chair, and said that though the beginnings had been difficult, the Party had achieved a large measure of success and was responsible for the spread of the ideal of labour. He gave a survey of the influence of the movement on the Jewish world.

Messages of congratulation were read, including one from the Histadrut.

Mrs. A. Lieberman, on behalf of the Bnoth Zion Association, extended hearty greetings. The Bnoth Zion, she said, were greatly interested in working woman in Palestine and owed the Labour movement a great debt of gratitude for all they had achieved. They were all working for the same ideal and the most essential thing was harmonious co-operation.

Adv. M. S. Comay, on behalf of the Dorshei Zion Association, said it was a great privilege to express congratulations on behalf of the pioneer Zionist Society in South Africa. In presenting their good wishes, however, he had to stress that actually there was very little difference between the aims and ideals of the Dorshei Zion Association and the Zionist Socialist Party. The sole function of each group or party was to help forward Zionism. Unless the small groups of South African Zionists worked together, Zionism here could not be effective.

Mr. Smith, on behalf of the S.A. Labour Party, said it gave him great pleasure to convey the heartiest congratulations on their success during a period of five years and hoped their future efforts would meet with even greater success. He hoped they would be able to co-operate in many directions to the benefit of all the people of South Africa.

Dr. J. Sachs, on behalf of the League for a Working Palestine, in conveying congratulations, said that the labour of the Jewish worker in Palestine was national. The labourer was an idealist and capitalism was inimical to the ideal of national labour and the historic realisation of an ideal. He wished the Party success and fruitful work in the future.

After the tea interval Mr. Z. Avin and Mr. L. Tager (of Johannesburg) addressed the gathering on the work and achievements of Labour in Palestine.

The musical programme consisted of duets by Bernard Friedland, Benjamin Rabinowitz, Millie Glassman and Clara Friedland, pupils of Miss Kessel, recitations by Miss H. Oblovitz and songs by Mr. Bloom.

Cape Jewish Aged Home.

Sunday night's concert at the Home was a well-organised affair, and reflects much credit on those responsible for the arrangements.

Mesdames N. Stoller, S. Lear, Miss Stoller and the Matron, Mrs. S. Franks, had worked indefatigably to provide the inmates with an evening of real entertainment.

Many members of the committee and several friends and supporters of the Institution were present, including the Mayor and Mayoress (Mr. and Mrs. Louis Gradner), the President, Mr. L. Pinn; the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. S. B. Hersman; Mr. and Mrs. M. Rosen, Mr. H. Rosen, Mrs. A. Stodel, Mr. and Mrs. I. Ochberg, Mrs. S. Zuckerman, Mrs. S. Feitelson, Dr. Rebecca Katz, Mr. A. Gelb, of Setellenbosch, and many others.

He felt sure they realised how much the inmates looked forward to such programmes of music, and also to the presence of members of the committee and of the public. He would like it more generally known how comfortable the inmates were. To them all it was a real Home and the many kindnesses they received and the general comfort which was provided for them made the Institution supreme, not only in South Africa, but in other parts of the world, so far as such institutions are concerned.

Refreshments were handed round by the matron and staff, and a very pleasant evening was brought to a conclusion by the singing of Hatikvah and the National Anthem.

Union of Jewish Women.

A meeting took place at the Zionist Hall on Tuesday afternoon, 11th inst. Owing to the inclement weather the attendance was not as good as usual. Mrs. Berezowski presided. After the minutes of the previous meeting were read by Mrs. Cristol and Mrs. L. Burman gave a report of the monthly meeting of the National Council of Women. Mrs. P. Clouts reported on the recent Conference of the S.A. Jewish Board of Deputies.

Mrs. Clouts thanked the Union for having elected her as their delegate to the Conference. She was pleased to find a large increase in the number of women delegates—seventeen in all. She felt that the influence of women was being made evident to a great extent.

Speaking of the work of the Congress, Mrs. Clouts analysed the various resolutions that were passed. She also reported that the Board of Deputies was doing good work by means of personal contacts with the people in power. Through its activities, the Board helped to keep up the morale of the Jewish public.

The Mayor, Mr. L. Gradner, made an eloquent appeal on behalf of the Polish Jews. He said the plight of the Jewish people in Poland was due to economic stress and to anti-Semitic discrimination against them. There was a strong Nazi movement in Poland and its friendly relationship with Germany did not augur well for the Jew.

Mrs. Berezowski thanked Mr. Gradner for bringing the matter of Polish Jewry's distress to the notice of the women and she assured him that they would do all in their power to help the cause.

Mrs. Nussbaum proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the Mayor for his stirring address and also to Mrs. Clouts for her report on the Congress.

The meeting then adjourned for tea.
