The Nelson Trio.

One of the greatest artistic successes was witnessed last Monday night at the City Hall when the Nelson Trio performed the great master-work by Beethoven, the Triple Concerto. This Beethoven work is an impressive one and it is so rarely played because it is so difficult to find players who can make a success of it as it so necessary for the three artists to have a thorough understanding of one another. It scored



such great applause that the Trio were compelled to give an encore in which they introduced "The Lark" by Glinka, specially arranged by their father.

This concert will be held under the auspices of the "Oneg Shabbos" Society and the Nelson Trio will be assisted by other well-known artists.

This will be the only opportunity for the Jewish community to hear the Nelson Trio in a programme which has been heard only in London and none can afford to miss it.
