

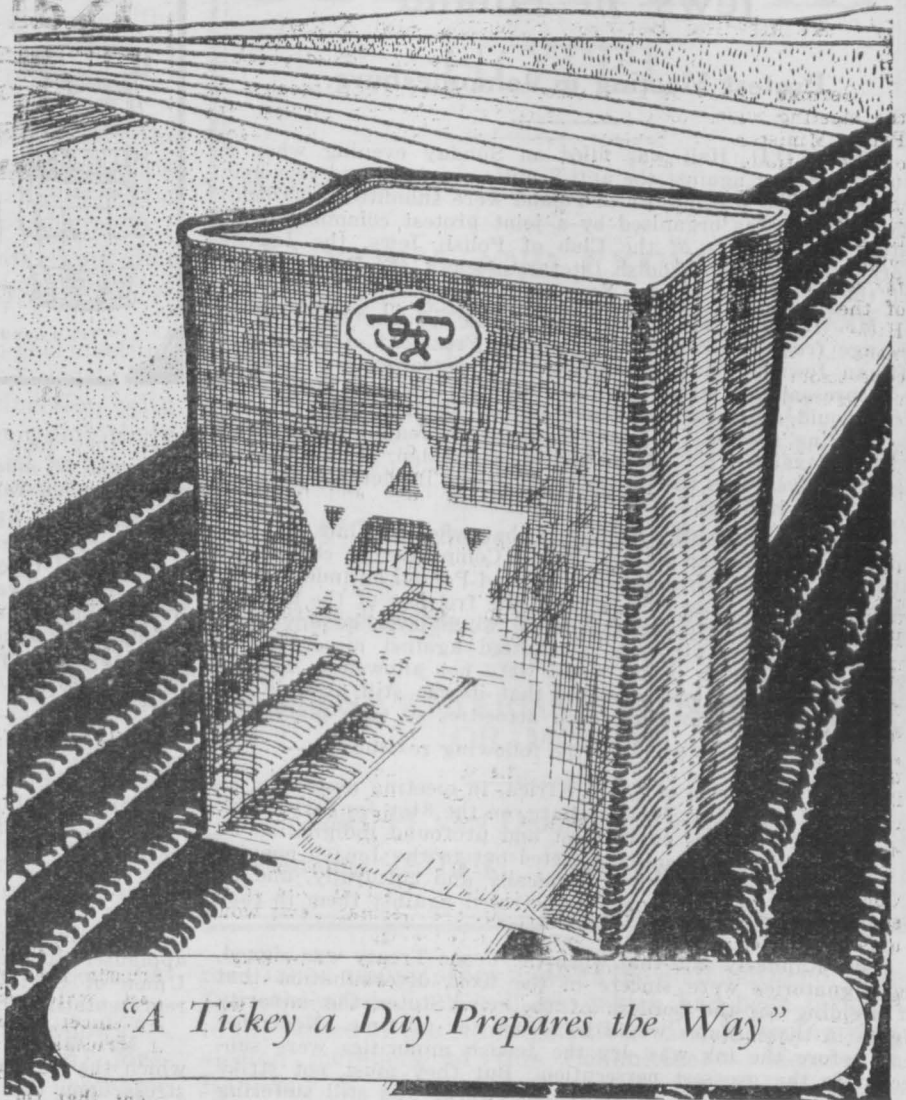

L'Amitie Francaise.

Interesting Lecture by Dr. A. Shedrow.

On Monday evening at the Carlton Hotel in Johannesburg, Dr. Adolphe Shedrow read a paper on Anatole France before a well attended meeting of members of the L'Amitie Francaise. Mr. Daly, the president of the circle, presided.

In the course of a critical study of Anatole France, the lecturer stated that this writer revealed a spirit of revolution which ran as a continuous thread in his life from youth to mature age. The style of Anatole France was unique and indefinable. Irony and satire impregnated all his works and his conception of life was totally different from his contemporaries. The address proved a lucid analysis of the philosophy and work of the great French writer.

L'Amitie Francaise—of which Mr. Britain is the honorary secretary—meets once a month at the Carlton Hotel and the next meeting is due to be held on March 7. The circle contains quite a percentage of members of the Jewish persuasion, who at some time in their lives lived in France or Belgium and a cordial invitation is extended to other French-speaking people to attend the functions of the circle.
