Bequests to Charity

Will of Mrs. H. Siew

Bequests to many charities are made in the will of Mrs. Helena Siew, of Beaconsfield, Kimberley, who died recently at Capetown.

The will makes provision for the distribution of nearly £10,000 for charitable and other institutions, of which Kimberley receives £5,650. The bequests include £1,000 to the Kimberley Hospital, £1,500 to the School Board for bursaries, £700 to the Benevolent Society, and £1,000 towards the establishment of a Jewish orphanage in Kimberley, subject to certain conditions.

Among other bequests is one of £3,000, the interest on which is to establish bursaries for deserving schools or universities in Palestine for Jewish scholars. She also left £100 to the Cape Jewish Orphanage, £200 to a Jewish cemetery, £200 to the Cape Jewish Home for the Aged, and £100 to the Johannesburg Jewish Orphanage.

Weiler, of Johannesburg, gave an interesting review of George Sacks' book, "The Intelligent Man's Guide to Jew-Baiting." This was done in defiance of the magistrate's order prohibiting the holding of the meeting by the powers vested in him under the Riotous Assemblies Act.

He was sentenced until the rising of the Court.
