VISIT OF RABBI BLOCH

A GREAT rabbinical personality is at A present in South Africa. He is Rabbi A. I. Bloch, the rav of Telz, Lithuania, and Head of the famous Telzer Yishibah in which 460 students are engaged in an earnest study of the Torah.

The scholastic institution is sixty years old and was originally founded by the famous gaon, Rabbi Eliezer Gordon. He happens also to have been the grandfather of the present delegation, which has come to South Africa in the interests of the Telzer Yishibah. Rabbi Bloch is accompanied by his relative, Rabbi M. Katz, who is Dean of the Yishibah.

In conversation with the two rabbis, a representative of the "Zionist Record" learned that this was the first time that the Telzer Yishibah had sent representatives to South Africa. In the past the institution had been assisted by Lithuanian Jewry and by a large number of exstudents who reside in the United States of America. Unfortunately economic conditions in Lithuania have sadly affected the Jewish community in that country. Added to this is the fact that very little support can now be secured from America in which country an economic crisis is still existing. The delegation trusts that South African Jewry will assist the Yishibah which finds itself in serious financial straits. itself in serious financial straits.

Rabbi Bloch gave the interesting information that there were two rabbinical graduates of the Telz Yishibah in South Africa. They are Rabbi I. Kossowski, of Johannesburg, and Rabbi Mervis, of Capetown. There were also a number of Jewish merchants in this country, who are Talmudical scholars and who spent a period of their youth in the study of the Torah in Telz.

"The thousands of pupils who have been educated in our Talmudical College," said Rabbi Bloch, "have made a deep cultural impression throughout the Jewish world. We have supplied many of the greatest rabbonim during the last generation."

Rabbi Katz pointed out that students at the College came from all parts of the world. At present there were forty young men from Germany; quite a number from America; a few from Palestine and one student had come all the way from South Africa.

"I wish to point out," added Rabbi Katz, "that we are also conducting a seminary for the training of teachers. The importance of this work cannot be exaggerated for Hebrew teachers of the Telz Yishibah are securing posts in Jewish communities throughout the world and thus spreading Jewish orthodoxy. We have also a school for the training of girls in the tenets of Judaism."

Great interest has been taken by the orthodox members of the local community in the arrival of the two rabbonim from Telz and an influential committee is being formed to assist them in their mission.
