

An Old Pioneer Passes

Mr. SIMON S. FEINBERG (Pretoria).

The death occurred on Sunday of one of Pretoria's oldest pioneers, in the person of Mr. Simon Solomon Feinberg, who passed away at the age of eighty years.

The deceased came to this country nearly sixty years ago. He served with the Grahamstown Rifles in the early days, and participated in various Kaffir wars. Later he came to the Transvaal and served with the Burgher forces (Pretoria Guard) during the Anglo-Boer War. He also took part in the Barberton gold rush.

For the last fifty years Mr. Feinberg was a resident of Pretoria and was closely identified with many Jewish institutions. He was the honorary life president of the Pretoria Jewish Helping Hand Society.

Mr. Feinberg was a well-known character and highly respected by a large circle of friends, who with his relatives, mourn his passing. He is survived by his wife and three daughters, Mrs. J. E. Manasewitz and Mrs. R. Prades, of Pretoria, and Mrs. M. Lewison, of Johannesburg.

The funeral on Sunday was attended by a large number of mourners.

An Interesting Production

An unusual play was presented by the Johannesburg Repertory Players at the new Library Theatre. It is a Biblical tale written by James Bridie from the apocryphal Book of Tobit. The transcript prepared for the theatre, brings to life in a scintillating manner the characters of an old story. Altogether an unique affair.

It is obvious that great difficulties confronted amateur players in the production of a play of this nature, requiring Biblical costume and the atmosphere of an unusual period. Such atmosphere, however, was well brought out. The acting, too, was on a fairly high level. Although there was no outstanding individual performance, the players worked in chorus to give effect to a strangely beautiful production.

The bulk of the labour fell upon Maurice Horwitz in the character of Tobias. Unfortunately, Mr. Horwitz, who is one of our most talented amateur players, is unable to hide himself properly in any great characterisation. Whilst able and clever, he is always still Maurice Horwitz. It is just the delicate art which conceals art that appears to be missing.

Good work was rendered by Arthur Hoffman in the character of an elderly orthodox and pious Jew. It was a fine portrayal in which the player's own personality was entirely lost in the character depicted.

The acting of Phyllis Orkin and that of Leo Heilbronner and H. Isenberg deserves special praise. The production by Miss Muriel Alexander was a delightful one, and credit is due to Miss Lucy Bowditch for some delightful costume designs and to Mr. Bruce Meredith-Smith for most attractive scenery.
