IN JEWISH HISTORY

A Famous Orientalist

On the 20th of August, 1905, there died in Paris Jules Oppert, one of the most famous Orientalists of his day. He was born in Hamburg and came to France at the age of 22, being received at once into the circle of Oriental scholars which had its centre in Paris. Four years later he was sent by the French Government on a journey of exploration in Central Asia and his report was so impressive that he was immediately accepted as the leading Assyriologist of France. He was awarded a national prize for the work of discovery considered to be of the greatest honour or benefit to France. His identications of the state of Pohylon. He was later awarded the Cross of the Legion of Honour. Oppert however did not give the whole of himself to France and learning. He remembered also the community in which he was born and gave much time and thought to Jewish interests and institutions. Two of his brothers also distinguished themselves in the field of Oriental learning. Ernst, although engaged in business, had explored Corea and written on his experiences there. Gustav specialised in the history and languages of India. He was for a time on the staff of the Bodleian and in the library of Windsor Castle. library of Windsor Castle.

SPEAKING in the constituency of Mr. Kentridge, Mr. Hofmeyr declared:

"I do not believe this anti-Semitic crusade of Dr. Malan's is going to help him. The people of South Africa as a whole welcome the contribution made by the Jewish community to the building up of South Africa They welcome them in the spirit of 'live and let live.' "

Mr. Hofmeyr added that anti-Semitism in other countries had been used as a means of paving the way to dictatorships, and added that when the people of South Africa realised that anti-Semitism was a precursor of dic-tatorship, they would have nothing to do with it.
