IN JEWISH HISTORY

A German Rabbi and Controversialist

RABBI AKIBA EGER, the elder, must not be confused with the far more famous Rabbi Akiba, the younger, the champion of orthodoxy who died in 1837. The younger was the grandson of the elder. Akiba Eger the elder, died on September 17, 1758. Already at the age of 20 he shone as a controversialist and metaphorically crossed swords with the Chief Rabbi of Eisenstadt. This was nine years before he received his first appointment. He left many rabbinical and Talmudical writings but was overshadowed by his far more famous grandson.
