## PALESTINE DIVIDED INTO FOUR LARGE DISTRICTS

Jerusalem, November 3rd.

THE "Palestine Gazette" publishes in its last number an order regarding the new administrative division of the country which has been confirmed by the Colonial Office.

According to this new order, Palestine is to be divided into four districts.

The first district includes Galilee and the sub-districts of Safed, Tiberias. The administrative headquarters of this district will be in Nazareth.

The second district includes Samaria and Samaria, and the sub-districts of Haifa, Jenin, Nablus and Tulkarm. The headquarters of this district will be housed in Haifa.

The third district of Jerusalem includes the sub-districts of Bethlehem, Hebron, Jericho, Jerusalem and Ramallah. The headquarters of this district will be in Jerusalem.

The fourth district includes the whole of Southern Palestine and the sub-districts of Beersheba, Gaza, Jaffa and Tel-Aviv. The headquarters of this district will be in Jaffa.

## THIRD MACCABIADE

The Maccabi World Union issued a statement to its territorial organisations stating that the Maccabi Games, due to take place in April, 1938, will be held in London early next year.

The S.A. Zionist Youth Council is acting as the territorial representative of the World Maccabi Union in South Africa in order to participate in the Maccabi Games when they are held. Preliminary arrangements have already been made.

## TEL-AVIV'S NEW BUSINESS CENTRE

### Up-to-Date Bus Terminus Planned

Tel-Aviv, November 5th.

THE construction of a new commercial centre which will contain a central terminus for all buses to neighbouring settlements, will be begun in a few days. Details of the venture, which will entail the expenditure of £110,000, were described by Messrs. Arye and Meir Shafir at a recent press conference held in Cafe Raphael.

The new quarters will be constructed on the site of the Nabulsi citrus grove near the Rutenberg Power Station, west of the Petach Tikvah road. Eleven dunams have been acquired by the Municipality for the erection of a bus terminus and twelve more dunams for additional roads.

The central terminus, which will be constructed by the Technical Committee of the Municipality, will have separate entrances and exits for every line and will be the most up-to-date bus station in the Near East.

The construction of approximately 60 shops in four blocks covering an area of 4,500 square metres will begin immediately.

Five hundred labourers are to be employed on the scheme over a period of seven or eight months, and Mr. P. Abramovitz of Jerusalem, and Mr. Gefstein of Tel-Aviv, engineers, will supervise the construction.

## IMPORTANT ARCHAEOLOGICAL DISCOVERY

Jerusalem, November 5th.

THE French archaeological expedition which is making excavations at Tel Alhariri, has discovered hundreds of Babylonian inscriptions, probably dating from the period of Abraham. The discovery includes Hebrew names, as well as accounts of wanderings of Semite tribes, verifying Scriptural history.

The discovery has aroused great interest in archaeological circles.


## AERODROME FOR TEL-AVIV

Tel-Aviv, November 5th.

THE Tel-Aviv Municipality has allocated 300 dunams of land on the other side of the River Yarkon for the construction of a municipal aerodrome for Tel-Aviv.

A group of Jews are offering to invest in the construction of the aerodrome, and work will be commenced as soon as the Government's approval of the scheme has been obtained.

## SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA TO BE BROADCAST

Jerusalem, November 5th.

AN arrangement has been made between the Palestine Broadcasting Service and the Symphony Orchestra for a relay in part of five of the ten subscription concerts during the coming season. This arrangement will afford an opportunity to music lovers throughout the country, particularly in the villages and settlements, to enjoy a great musical treat.

Negotiations are also in progress between the Palestine Broadcasting Service and Matatei (the Hebrew satirical theatre) whereby regular monthly performances will be broadcast by the Matatei during the Hebrew Hour.

The P.B.S. has placed an order in England for two sets of electrical recording apparatus, one to be installed in the studio and the other portable, and it is hoped that they will be functioning by the middle of December. This will be filling a long-felt want in Palestine broadcasting and will bring the P.B.S. in line with all other broadcasting stations in the world. By means of this apparatus it will be possible to record events taking place during the hours the P.B.S. is silent, and at places where a microphone cannot be placed. These recordings can then be rebroadcast later on.

## ANOTHER HEBREW TALKIE

Tel-Aviv, November 9th.

WORK has begun here on another Hebrew talkie. The film, which is as yet un-named, is based on a story by Zvi Biberman, "The Children's Community," dealing with the life in a Galilean village at the time of the destruction of the Second Temple. It describes the annihilation of all the adults of the village at the hands of the Romans and the attempt of the children to face life alone amidst the ruins.

The local producers had to travel all over the country to obtain the proper settings. School children in Shechunat Borochof, near Tel-Aviv, were given an opportunity of displaying their dramatic ability as they were selected for important parts in the film.

It is expected that the film will be completed a few months hence.

## WELL KNOWN JEWISH DRAMATIST LEAVES PALESTINE

Jerusalem, November 2nd.

MR. H. LEIWIK, the well-known Jewish dramatist, in a statement which he made before leaving the country to-day, said that his visit had strengthened his ties with Palestine. He believed that the Yishuv would overcome all dangers and continue its great work of upbuilding.
