MANY BEQUESTS TO CHARITY

The Late Mr. Benjamin Cohen's

Will

ACCORDING to the joint will of the late Mr. Benjamin Cohen, and his widow, Mrs. Dora Cohen, about £14,000 have been left to charities in this country and overseas.

Of this sum, £3,150 has been bequeathed to charitable institutions in South Africa, £925 to Kimberley and Capetown, £500 to England, and £6,400 to Palestine. In addition, a sum of £1,450 has been left for general distribution to unspecified Jewish charities in South Africa, the distribution being left to the discretion of the executors.

Among the non-Jewish institutions in this country which benefit under the will, are the Johannesburg Hospital, which receives the sum of £350; the Crippled Children's Home, (£200); the Civilian Blind (£200), and the Kimberley Hospital (£100).

Of the Palestinian bequests, the greater number have been made to various charitable institutions, such as aged homes, hospitals, orphanages, in Jerusalem and Tel-Aviv, the bulk of the bequests, however, going to Jerusalem. The largest legacy, a sum of £2,000, is to be devoted to the erecting of houses for needy and deserving Jewish immigrants. Another interesting bequest is a sum of £500 which is to be spent on the planting of trees in or near Jerusalem.

Councillor A. Schauder, J.P.

AN interesting official ceremony took place on Sunday afternoon last at New Brighton Village, Port Elizabeth. The occasion was the marking of the commencement of building operations in connection with the Municipal Council's slum elimination and rehousing scheme.

Councillor A. Schauder, J.P. (Chairman of the Housing and Slum Elimination Committee) turned the first sod as a preliminary to the commencement of the erection of three thousand houses proposed to be built in this area under the Council's five year plan.

Judge Frumkin to Visit Chief Centres

Successful Meeting in Pretoria

A JEWISH GUILD LUNCHEON

In Pretoria.

ON Tuesday evening, 16th November, Mr. Justice Frumkin visited Pretoria and addressed a representative gathering of local Jewry at the residence of Mr. Ivan Solomon, M.P.C.

In the course of an illuminating speech he dealt with the aims and aspirations of the Hebrew University, its remarkable achievements in the short period of its existence and its place in the Yishuv as a vital source of knowledge for the upbuilding of the Jewish National Economy. He continued to dwell on its significance to the Diaspora as a great cultural centre in the regeneration of Jewish national life and finally on the necessity for giving practical support to the University. The very interesting and informative address was followed with keen interest and appreciation by those present.

It was decided to establish a branch of the South African Friends of the Hebrew University in Pretoria and the following inaugural Committee was elected:

Mr. I. Solomon (chairman); Dr. Taback (hon. secretary); Dr. G. Friedland, Mr. S. Katzen, Mr. M. Balzam, Mr. J. Goldin, Mr. J. Liebson, Mrs. Ben Cohen, and Mrs. J. Janover.

Immediate steps are being taken to canvass the community and enrol further members for the Hebrew University. Before the conclusion of the meeting, Rabbi W. Hirsch proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the Judge for his very inspiring address.

Tour of the Country.

After an extensive stay on the Rand during the course of which the work was concentrated mainly in Johannesburg and the Reef centres, Mr. Justice Frumkin has now left on a short tour of the leading centres in the Union. He was due to visit Kimberley on Sunday, 21st November, and to address a meeting of the local community at the Savoy Hotel the same evening. From Kimberley Mr. Justice Frumkin will proceed to Bloemfontein where similar arrangements have been made. Thereafter he will go to the Eastern Province and will spend a few days at Port Elizabeth and East London, after which he will fly to Durban where a week's very extensive programme has been arranged. Reports received from all centres to be visited indicate that preparations are well afoot for a very successful effort.

In Johannesburg.

On Friday last there was a representative gathering present at the Jewish Guild, Johannesburg, when Mr. Justice Frumkin and Mrs. Frumkin were the guests of the institution at a special luncheon given in their honour.

Mr. W. Wolpert presided and extended a cordial welcome to the distinguished guests. He referred to the great distinction brought upon the legal bench in Palestine by Judge Frumkin and spoke of his loyal devotion to the development of the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus.

On rising, Judge Frumkin was cordially received. He said it was an extraordinary thing that until a short time ago the Jewish people had not had a university of their own. Although the Jews had contributed so much to the culture and learning of the world, they had even allowed the subject of research and study of particular interest to Jews to be carried out by Gentiles.

Thirteen years ago, however, their own national university had been established in Jerusalem and it had placed the Jewish people in the ranks of cultured nations. Mr. Frumkin added that the university was benefiting Palestine not only culturally, but economically in that researches carried out there were of importance in the agricultural development of the country and in the health of the people.

Mr. B. A. Ettlinger, President of the Jewish Guild, expressed thanks to Judge and Mrs. Frumkin for having accepted the invitation to the luncheon. Besides representatives of the Jewish community, there were present a number of prominent non-Jewish members of the legal fraternity in Johannesburg.

JOHANNESBURG SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA.

At the next concert by the Johannesburg Symphony Orchestra, at the City Hall, on Tuesday, the 30th inst., at 8.15 p.m., Rose Alper, South Africa's coloratura soprano, will appear in her farewell concert before her departure to join the Carl Rosa Opera Company in London.

The orchestra, which will be conducted by Mr. Joseph Traunek, will present Mendelssohn's "Scotch Symphony," Smetana's "Bartered Bride" and Liszt's "Les Preludes." It is anticipated that the numerous lovers of good music will be present at this fine concert.
