

FRIENDS OF HEBREW UNIVERSITY IN CAPETOWN

MR. J. HERBSTEIN presided over a representative gathering at a meeting convened by the Dorshei Zion Association at the Zionist Hall on Monday evening, the 29th ult., in order to elect a working committee of Friends of the Hebrew University. Dr. S. E. Kark gave an account of the work done in previous years and a resolution was unanimously passed for the formation of a group of Friends of the Hebrew University. After the election Rabbi Abrahams gave a short address on the significance of the Hebrew University. He said that we Jews have always laid emphasis on the things of the spirit rather than on material values and this has enabled us to live through the exile. This hope is evinced by the spirit of Chanukah. When guns were booming in Palestine the foundation was laid of what afterwards became the Hebrew University.

If University life and achievement is important in any country, then to the new and still nascent Jewish home in Palestine the University in Jerusalem is of treble importance.

It is the symbol of the new spirit of revival of our people and will gather to itself the finest minds in the Diaspora. The work of the Hebrew University is sacred and it will grow to be the glory and source of light to the whole world.

Youth to Celebrate Chanukah

Under the auspices of the Transvaal Zionist Youth Executive, a Chanukah evening, in which societies throughout Johannesburg and the Reef will take part, will be held at Coronation Hall, on Sunday, the 5th inst.

A Fine Play in Aid of the National Fund

A DISTINGUISHED gathering was present on Monday evening at the Standard Theatre when "Theatre Royal"—a clever satire by Edna Ferber and George Kaufman on a well-known theatrical family in America—was produced by the Johannesburg Players on behalf of the Saxonwold branch of the Women's Zionist League. (The function was in aid of the Jewish National Fund). The play was bright throughout and credit is due to Emlyn Norton and Hubert Crane for a most painstaking production. The only scene of the play was most decorative and pleasing to the eye.

A fine performance was given by Eileen Goudvis in the central character of the play. She conveyed an excellent idea of the harassed actress-genius, beset by daily difficulties in the midst of having to perform before an adoring public. The part of her mother—an elder actress—was cleverly portrayed by Carol Levitas and the role of the youngest woman of the three—the daughter of the central character—was excellently done by Elaine Rosenberg. She gave a finished performance.

A vigorous portrayal of the part of an excitable young actor was given by Kenneth Kisch. Fine cameos were given of a theatrical manager by Lionel Kaplan, and that of a business man, by Norman Friedman. These artists acted with ease and grace.

Playgoers are grateful for the opportunity of having witnessed a play which has drawn large audiences in New York and London.

Annual Chanukah Service

An eloquent sermon was delivered by Chief Rabbi Dr. J. L. Landau, in the course of which he declared that Jews brought prosperity to the countries in which they settled. The National Anthem and the Hatikvah were sung at the conclusion of the service.

SPLENDID SYMPHONY CONCERT

Fine Singing by Rose Alper

SOME brilliant performances were heard on Tuesday evening last at the fourth concert of the present season of the Johannesburg Symphony Society at the City Hall. An audience of two thousand was present.

The solo performer was Miss Rose Alper, the gifted Durban singer (who is shortly leaving South Africa to take up an engagement with the Carl Rosa Opera Company in London). Miss Alper is the possessor of a glorious voice, which was given wonderful opportunity in the famous mad scene from the opera "Hamlet" by Ambroise Thomas. This suited her better than the aria from the "Magic Flute" by Mozart. The singer was the recipient of enthusiastic applause and had to render encores at the end of both her items.

The orchestra gave a magnificent rendition of the famous Mendelssohn's "Scotch" symphony. The overture of "The Bartered Bride," by F. Smetana, was presented with all its sparkling qualities fully heralded. The fascination of this lovely composition was well brought over by the players of this orchestra, well attuned under the capable and expert baton of Mr. Joseph Traunek. The playing of "Les Preludes" symphonic poem by Liszt was an additional item to a fine programme of music.

The last concert of the present season will take place on Monday, December 20th.

MR. ENGLSBERG AT PAARL

A well-attended meeting of the Paarl Jewish community was presided over by the Chairman of the Paarl Lemaan Zion Society, Dr. M. Cohen, when an address was delivered by Mr. N. Engelsberg (propagandist of the S.A. Zionist Federation), on Sunday evening, 21st ult., at the Paarl Talmud Torah Hall.
