SOCIALISTS BID  
FAREWELL TO MR. HANOCH**

A meeting to bid farewell to Mr. G. Hanoch, who sailed for Palestine on Friday last, was held under the auspices of the Zionist Socialist Party at the Zionist Hall on Thursday evening, August 18th. Mr. G. Telem, the newly elected Chairman of the Party, presided.

Mr. Ch. Achron expressed appreciation of the work done by Mr. Hanoch, who, he said, had succeeded in arousing considerable interest in the work of the Zionist Socialist Party, and in attracting to it the sympathies of a wide public.

He had also influenced youth circles to have a proper appreciation of the significance of political Zionism.

Dr. J. Sachs, in the name of the Arlosoroff Circle which had been established in Cape Town by Mr. Hanoch, and Mr. W. Yasvoim in the name of the Zionist Socialist Study Circle, paid tribute to Mr. Hanoch and extended good wishes to him.

On behalf of the Party Mrs. M. Ben Arie made a presentation to Mr. Hanoch.

Mr. Telem said that it was difficult to ask Mr. Hanoch to carry a message to Eretz Israel. It was not enough to express sympathy with the Yishuv and with the families of those who had suffered personal loss. The best message he could take with him was that everyone here was resolved to forward the National cause to the best of his ability.

In voicing his appreciation of the goodwill of the Party and of all those with whom he had come in contact, Mr. Hanoch said that he had been impressed by the sincerity of the work done in South Africa, but the scope of activity needed to be widely extended. There was need for a deeper appreciation of the cultural value of the ideals of the Party, which must advance together with the constructive work. Real socialism could only be achieved by the work and sentiment of the mass of the people. While in Palestine the basis of all development was the land and the National Funds, so in the Galuth culture and knowledge were necessary for the development of Zionism. Mr. Hanoch appealed for the revitalisation of Zionist work in the Galuth.

During the course of the evening Hebrew songs were sung, and the meeting concluded with the singing of the Techezaknah.

**A BALL AT DURBAN**

On the evening of the 18th August was held one of the most attractive events of the year, when under the auspices of the Durban Zionist Youth Society, the first annual Zionist Youth Ball took place at the Jewish Club. The floor was crowded and the charmingly decorated hall, with blue and white streamers suspended from the walls, added to the gaiety and happy atmosphere of the occasion. On the stage, with a Mogen Dovid on either side appeared the new Zionist Youth banner, a magnificent and beautiful work of art, designed and made by Miss Joyce Moss-Morris.

Amongst the guests were Mr. N. Kirschner (Chairman of the S.A. Zionist Federation), Mrs. Kirschner, Miss Z. Kirschner (who had arrived that day from Eretz Israel), Mr. Leon (Salisbury) and the Rev. and Mrs. Menachemson.

During the evening an outstanding exhibition of ballroom dancing was given by Miss Joyce Donovan and one of her pupils.

## MR. KIRSCHNER TO SPEAK IN DURBAN

Mr. N. Kirschner will address a mass meeting on Tuesday, 29th instant, during the Hebrew week arranged by the Zionist Youth Society.

## INTERESTING LECTURE BY MR. SARON

Mr. G. Saron addressed a combined meeting of the Association of Jewish Groups on Monday last at the residence of Mrs. Green, Constantia, First Street, Lower Houghton, Johannesburg. Taking as his subject "Some Problems of South African Jewry," the lecturer dealt with various facets of Jewish life in this country. He analysed the reaction of Jews to anti-Semitism, and pointed to the danger of Jews withdrawing too much into themselves, closing their ranks and so creating artificial barriers between them and their non-Jewish fellow citizens.

He strenuously contested the proposition that the fate of the Jews in Nazi Germany had proved the bankruptcy of Jewish emancipation or the undesirability of Jews associating themselves fully with all phases of the life of the country in which they lived. On the contrary, he urged that Jews must fight unremittently for their fullest civic rights and identify themselves with all the aspects of national and civic endeavour.

He expressed the opinion that there was a tendency in certain Jewish circles to give too little attention to specific South African problems, as a result of their preoccupation with international Jewish questions. Pleading for a broad South African outlook, he urged that all Jews should be bilingual and able to associate themselves with the cultural aspirations, not only of English-speaking South Africa, but also of the Afrikaans-speaking section.

The address was followed by an animated discussion.
