

A FORTIETH CONCERT

Johannesburg Musical Society

On Monday, May 20th, the Johannesburg Musical Society holds its 40th Concert at the Selborne Hall at 8.15 p.m. The proceeds are to be devoted to the Red Cross and the Mayors' National Fund.

The Johannesburg Musical Society was founded in June, 1902, by a number of enthusiastic musicians, who desired to foster the art of music in the community, and to improve their own acquaintance with musical works.

At first, members alone performed before members, although occasionally guest nights were held. Professional musicians were admitted to membership "in their private capacity only." Later, the public were admitted to the Society's Concerts, as well as the regular members, a practice which is still kept up; and as the activities of the Society increased, professional musicians, whether mem-

bers or not, were engaged to perform from time to time.

The Society has sponsored musical performances of all kinds during its career, including Chamber and Orchestral Concerts, Lectures, and Historical Recitals; and all the leading Johannesburg performers have appeared on its platform, as well as numerous distinguished artists from other parts of South Africa, and from overseas.

The Society is embarking on an ambitious scheme by means of which it is hoped to present at least three celebrated artists each year. Subscriptions to the Society are as follows:—Joining at any time, £1 1s. for one ticket to 10 concerts; £2 2s. for two tickets to 10 concerts; persons under 21, 10s. 6d. for 10 concerts.

The Society's record of thirty-eight years continuous work in the cause of music is one to be proud of, and one may safely wish it many years of continued prosperity.

FINE ACTING BY REPERTORY PLAYERS

The "Importance of Being Earnest"

Although the dramatic works of Oscar Wilde "date" somewhat to-day the performance of "The Importance of Being Earnest" by the Repertory Players at the New Library Theatre is nevertheless well worth seeing.

The production by Alice Barnett is excellent. She succeeds in getting the correct atmosphere of the period and the illusion is helped by the appropriate "dressing" of the various characters in this most amusing comedy of manners.

The ripples of laughter evoked from the audience are an indication that the witticisms of Wilde are still able to tickle and amuse.

It is difficult to single out any particular player for praise, as every member of the cast co-operates loyally in securing the general effect of excellence.


