## EXHIBITION OF PAINTINGS BY THE LATE HANS LUDWIG KATZ

To be Opened at  
the Gainsborough  
Galleries on 23rd June

Admirers of the work of Hans Ludwig Katz, the well-known artist who died in Johannesburg towards the end of 1940, will be interested to learn that an exhibition of his earliest and latest works will be held at the Gainsborough Galleries in Johannesburg.

Mr. Lippy Lipschitz, the well-known sculptor, will open the exhibition on Tuesday, 23rd June, at 5.30 p.m. This will include a large number of oils, waters, pastels, sketches for architectural purposes, murals, mosaics, etc.

Hans Katz was a master of mural decorations to which the interiors of several large buildings in Johannesburg bear testimony. In his passing, this country lost an artist of note and a craftsman of distinction.

There is no doubt that the exhibition of his works will attract considerable attention and interest.
