Mrs. B. Ben-Arie very ably traced the development of the early Bible teachings of Abraham to the Prophet Ezekeel.

The Ghetto period was vividly portrayed by Mrs. S. Sloman, who also read an extract of Cheder impressions from the biography of Schmarya Levin. Mrs. H. Lieberman's paper on Hebrew education in the Diaspora reached its climax, covering an intervening period of vast interest through the channels of religious and Hebrew schools.

Dr. B. Rabinowitz spoke on Education in Palestine, and stressed the point that children should be encouraged to love and not fear their lessons.

Rev. S. Kassel's humorous reading was enjoyed by all.

During the interval refreshments were served by the hostess, after which a presentation of certificates for trees was made by Mrs. B. Block to Mr. and Mrs. A. Joffe, on the occasion of their marriage.

A vote of thanks to the speakers and the host and hostess, Mr. and Mrs. B. Bloch, was proposed by Mrs. Z. Galloon.

The singing of Hatikvah concluded a pleasantly instructive and successful evening.

He graphically illustrated the developments which have taken place in recent years, and thought that the Yishub has a very sound economic foundation, as 25 per cent. of the total Jewish population are occupied in agricultural activities.

Touching on the political aspects of Eretz Israel, Mr. Englesberg thought that the coming year would be a most difficult important and decisive year, as the question of Partition will have to be decided one way or another. He appealed to his hearers to study and ponder over the question, so that when the time will arise to voice our final decision, we should know firmly where we are.

Many questions were put to Mr. Englesberg at the conclusion of his address to which he replied.

A most interesting and instructive evening concluded with a vote of thanks to the speakers by Mr. H. Dubow.
