**Personal Appearance at Sea Point
Pavilion Saturday Next.**

The City of Cape Town announce that Harry Thurston, the famous English Character Comedian and the original stage creator of Bairnsfather's "Old Bill," has finalised arrangements to appear personally at the Sea Point Pavilion on Saturday night next, where he will present his famous "Character Studies of London Life on the Thames Embankment." "Old Bill" will be supported by an all-star bill of talented vaudeville artistes including popular Vic Davis and his Merry Band of Melody Makers with that resourceful humorist "Little Alix" presenting new capers.

Mr. Thurston, who appeared at the Muizenberg Pavilion on Saturday evening last, scored one of the biggest successes of any Headline "Star" who has visited South Africa during the last 20 years. On both evenings packed and enthusiastic audiences rocked with laughter during the whole time this distinguished entertainer occupied the stage in both parts of a fine programme, and between each of his offerings the applause was deafening. At the conclusion of Mr. Thurston's performance he was not permitted to retire until he had satisfied his audience by making a curtain speech.

Mr. Thurston's Sea Point appearance will be for one night only.

Some of the most spectacular sequences ever to be taken in a British film studio were filmed for the new Radio release; "Victoria The Great," in which Anna Neagle and Anton Walbrook have the co-starring roles.

For the filming of Queen Victoria's coronation, a perfect replica of Westminster Abbey as it was at that time had to be reconstructed. Boxes and stands crowded with peers and peeresses in full regalia, members of the Diplomatic corps and officers of all the European forces gave a background of flashing colour to the picture of the Queen seated on St. Edward's Throne above the stone of Scone. The Earl Marshal, with Gentlemen of the Guard added to the imposing spectacle.

From there the scene was switched to the ballroom of Buckingham Palace on the occasion of the ball given in honour of Prince Albert on his arrival in England with his brother. The great ballroom with marble and tapestried walls, huge cut-glass chandeliers overhead and life-guards with corselets and halberds gave another colourful vista of a hundred years ago.

"Victoria The Great," which was produced and directed by Herbert Wilcox, contains one of the largest casts ever assembled for a single film.
