Third Rodriguez-Lopez Chamber Concert.

The last of the second series of chamber concerts at Electricity House will take place on Wednesday, 6th December, at 8.15 p.m. A stimulating programme consisting of items nearly all of which will be performed for the first time in Cape Town will be presented.

Madame Anny Lambrechts will sing Hungarian songs by Zoltan Kodály in the original language; the "Quattro Liriche," Italian songs based on Armenian texts of the 13th century by Respighi; Irish songs by Bax; Greek folk songs; and by special request the "Chanson Hébraïque" by Maurice Ravel.

It is gratifying to know that two such outstanding pianists as Jose Rodriguez-Lopez and Dr. Anna Marsh have decided to form a regular combination to present works for two pianos in Cape Town. This time their performances will include two piano works by Mozart, Busoni, Debussy, Stravinsky, and Milhaud. Milhaud, it will be remembered, is the composer of the Jewish songs which were only recently presented in Cape Town.

His "Scaramouche" suite for two pianos is a hilarious work based on jazz rhythms and containing a Brazilian dance called the Samba. Two-piano playing is too rare a feature on our concert platform and therefore this highly unusual programme should interest all genuine music lovers.
