Annual Branch Meetings.

The Annual General Meeting of the Gardens Branch took place at the Minor Zionist Hall on Thursday evening, 7th March

Mrs. Segal emphasised the importance of cultural work in addition to fund-raising. She also dealt with the shekel and urged members to help to make Shekel Day a success.

Mrs. Segal referred to the forthcoming Keren Hayesod campaign and pointed out that it was not enough to buy land. Money was needed to settle the people on the land in Palestine.

Mrs. Alexander thanked Mrs. Segal for her inspiring address.

Adv. G. Gordon then addressed the meeting on the Land Regulations.

Out of the last war, he said, had come the Balfour Declaration. Since then we have seen Commission after Commission trying to take away the rights of the Jews to their National Home.

The land in Palestine has been improved tremendously by the Jews. Their money, energy and resources had converted malarial swamps into smiling plains. Jewry would remain on the land because of their rights from time immemorial.

With the help of the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth the Jewish people would push forward their frontiers. Zionism was older than the Mandate and would outlive all restrictions. - Mrs. Alexander thanked Mr. Gordon for his address.


