In presenting the certificates Mrs. Winokur pointed out what a distinction it was to be inscribed in the Book of Merit, where was recorded distinguished service to the national cause. She hoped the honour would spur them on to continued and even greater effort.

Certificates were also presented to Gardens, Maitland, Claremont-Rondebosch, Green and Sea Point, Oranjezicht, Muizenberg and Woodstock-Salt River, which had participated in the universal tribute to Henrietta Szold on the occasion of her 80th birthday by inscribing her in the special Golden Book opened in her honour.

The musical programme which followed was a very pleasant and enjoyable feature of the afternoon. Miss Freda Sagov, who was accompanied by Mrs. Philips, delighted her audience with two songs, whilst the beautiful rendering of Ernest Bloch's "Nigun" by Miss Nella Wissema, accompanied by Miss Sara Gordon, was very greatly appreciated.

Mrs. L. Segal read the speech delivered by Mr. David Ben Gurion, "Test of Fulfilment," at the recent American Zionist Congress. This was received with great interest.

A vote of thanks from the chair to Mrs. Segal and to the artists concluded a very stimulating and enjoyable afternoon.

Zionist Conversazione.

SUCCOTH CELEBRATION.

There was a large gathering at the Zionist Hall on Tuesday night when the fortnightly Conversazione, which took the form of a Succoth celebration, was held.

Mr. J. M. Weinreich was in the chair.

Dr. C. Resnekov in an address on "Ancient Conception of Chalutziut," said that in the history of every nation there came a period when the total energies of the youth were devoted to something that would last; this was the pioneering stage. The Jewish people also passed through this stage. The spirit animating the pioneers was a fixed determination to remain on the land; the soil engendered a spirit of solidarity and stability.

During the Babylonian exile, said the speaker, many Jewish farmers lost contact with the soil and became demoralised. Some were, however, left in Palestine and remained rooted in the soil, otherwise Jewish history might have been very different.

The Romans uprooted the whole Jewish population, and after that the Jews became dwellers in cities. The importance of learning was stressed and the Talmud became the guiding spirit of Jewry.

When Hebrew culture came into contact with Western civilisation the former made many concessions. Thus the Reform movement arose. In Eastern Europe, however, where Hebraism dominated the spirit of the Jews, there were no concessions, and the birth of Chalutziut took place.

The Jewish problem, said Dr. Resnekov, could be solved by a synthesis of village and city life. Succoth symbolised the return to the simple life. Our ancestors laid great stress on the festival, which was essentially an agricultural festival. It was called the Festival of our Rejoicing because the thoughts of the whole people were concentrated on the joys of nature and the pleasures to be derived from contact with the soil.

Cantor M. Katzin contributed greatly to the success of the evening by his renderings of appropriate songs to his own accompaniment. He was in excellent form and his magnificent voice was heard to great advantage.

Others who contributed to the programme were Capt. Lipschitz (songs), Mr. Asher (recitation), Mr. Z. A. Lison (song).

During the evening two volumes of "General Smuts," by Sarah Gertrude Millin, were put up for American auction and a very substantial sum was realised for the Jewish National Fund.

There was community singing and altogether a very enjoyable evening was spent.
