Preparing for the Shekel What Women are Doing. Drive.

STRONG JOHANNESBURG COMMITTEE FORMED.

As already announced, Shekel Day has this year been fixed for Sunday, March 21st, and efforts are being made throughout the country to see that a record enrolment of Zionists will take place.

A full awareness of the importance cf the Shekel in these critical times was evident at the enthusiastic meeting of Johannesburg workers which took place at the Coronation Hall to elect a Johannesburg Shekel Committee and make arrangements for the Shekel drive.

Mr. J. Bahr, Chairman of the United Shekel Commission, presided. After referring to the significant political work at present being done by Zionist leaders, he stressed the importance of a maximum Shekel enrolment in order to strengthen our hand now and after the war. The Shekel was the badge of Zionist allegiance; it was the concrete symbol of membership of the Zionist Organisation and adherence to the Zionist cause. Much would depend on numbers and there was vital need to strengthen our ranks. Mr. Bahr made a vigorous appeal to all present to put their utmost endeavours into the coming drive.

Mr. S. Sapire, who was unanimously elected Chairman of the Johannesburg Shekel Committee, dealt with organisation details. He suggested that a departure from the usual practice should be made this year, and that instead of the Shekel enrolment being left to particular organisations in each district, a special Shekel organisation should be created in each district for the task. To this organisation the various Zionist bodies in each area would send a representative. Through this system there would be a better distribution of workers than in the past.

After a comprehensive discussion, in which most of those present participated, Mr. Sapire's suggestion was unanimously adopted.

Mrs. F. Shakinovsky was elected Honorary Secretary of the Johannesburg Shekel Committee and it was agreed that the committee itself be composed of one representative each from the following bodies: Women's Zionist League, Johannesburg Zionist Association, Mizrachi Organisation, Jewish State Party, Zionist Socialist Párty, Zionist Youth, and Habonim.

Medical Aid for Russia Fund.

A meeting, at which Mr. Turok presided, was held in the Zionist Hall, Hope Street, on Sunday, 7th February, when Mr. Zybert delivered a most interesting lecture, "What Next?'-'

During the evening Mr. Asher recited a very moving poem, and a collection was made for Medical Aid for Russia, which resulted in a contribution of £85 to the fund.

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PARACHUTE PACKERS.

Parachute packers are at first trained for a month as fabric workers at a technical air school, where they learn to work with specially prepared parachute fabric. Another month completes their training as parachute packers and they are then posted to air stations. The parachutes hang from the ceiling of a huge loft. Every month the parachutes are opened, inspected and repacked. The girls test the fine silk with meticulous care before packing for they know that a drawn thread, a minute flaw may mean that a pilot will jump to his death. The silk canopy is laid along a nar row table and two packers flick it over expertly, fold by fold, until every square inch has been inspected. It is then folded with mathematical precision and fastened securely in its case.

On air stations after every flight the pilot returns his parachute to the packing room, and it is checked before being placed on the shelf ready for the next flight. The rip cords are inspected frequently so that there is no possible chance of the parachute failing if it is needed. The girls know that it is on their skill and care alone that the pilot must depend if anything goes wrong. and they see to it that the parachute, his one hope of life in the face of catastrophe, is utterly dependable. South African airmen everywhere depend on the efforts of these girls to safeguard them in the event of extreme danger, but more women are needed—"double the number."
