"Our Young Writers."

"Our Young Writers," edited by Frank de Freitas (aged 16) and Lionel Hodes (aged 16) and published by Unie Volkspers Beperk, Cape Town, is an anthology of stories and poems by South African girls and boys between the ages of nine and seventeen. It is divided into two parts—"War" and "South Africa." Some of the contributions have been reproduced from the juvenile pages of the "Cape Times" and "Sunday Express." Many show literary gifts of a high degree and much promise for the future. There are a number of excellent illustrations, also the work of boys and girls.

The book is excellently produced and reflects great credit on the young editors who have evidently gone to a great deal of trouble in their undertaking. The book is being sold in aid of war funds and as the editors state in the preface "the success of our scheme now rests upon the general public." It can be strongly recommended as a gift-book for children by whom it will be greatly enjoyed.

POPE'S PROTEST.

Reliable information reaching Berne says the Pope has made a formal protest against the Jewish measures enforced in Italy. In an audience granted to the Reich Ambassador on Tuesday, the Pope is reported to have stated that although the mass arrests of Jews in Italy were being carried out by the Fascist authorities, the orders had been issued by the German occupation forces, and there was no doubt on whom the blame must be placed.

Although the semi-official Vatican daily, the "Osservatore Romano," had already published a strong protest against the anti-Semitic measures, the Pope's demarche is the first official move on the part of the Vatican since the racial laws were enforced in Italy.

We have received information that so far ten babies have been born to the internees in Mauritius in recent months, and another 28 are expected in the near future.

We are anxious to send as many babies' garments to Mauritius as we can possibly collect, and I would therefore be very grateful if you would kindly appeal to the Jewish community through the medium of your paper to come forward and to contribute whatever they can spare.

Hebrew Day School.

Sir,—I attended the meeting for parents of pupils on Tuesday evening when the Committee asked for suggestions, etc.

I went to the children's celebration at the Zionist Hall on Sunday morning and I noticed with interest how immensely the children enjoyed the programme and with what gusto and enthusiasm they sang the Hebrew songs. I spoke to a few children—including my own young daughter—and they all said how they enjoyed learning and singing the songs under Mr. Immerman's tuition and how wonderful they thought the film of Daganian.

I think, the showing of films of this nature—depicting the countryside of Palestine, real people at work and real children at play—brings the spirit and actuality of Palestine nearer and more concretely to children than any amount of abstract talks on the subject.

May I suggest that, if possible, once every week or every couple of weeks, an hour or a lesson be devoted at school to the showing of similar films in the hall and community singing of Hebrew songs?

Interest in Palestinian films is not entirely limited to the children. The film shown at the Odeon some considerable time ago for the J.N.F. was a great success and repetitions of the showing of similar films, not only for the J.N.F., would not be amiss to stimulate and evoke interest in the public at large, in the same way as different countries and their peoples are shown in the Travel Talk Series in the ordinary cinema (bi-scope) programme.—I am, etc.,
