Bank read Mr. Winston Churchill's speech in the House of Commons in 1939 denouncing the White Paper. The Chairman, Mr. J. Bobrov, then introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr. A. Birnbaum, as an old friend of Massadah. Dr. Birnbaum gave a thoughtful and illuminating lecture on "Reform Tendencies in Judaism," defining first of all the idea of revolutionary reform as opposed to natural evolution. The first reform movement was actually the introduction of Christianity an endeavour to spread duction of Christianity—an endeavour to spread a modified and easy form of Judaism among surrounding peoples. The next great revolution was the Chassidic movement. This largely succeeded and existed to the present day because it did not

and existed to the present day because it did not touch or violate any of the prescribed laws.

Dr. Birnbaum then gave a short history of the present reform movement, which started in Germany about the beginning of the 19th century. It was caused largely by Jewish emancipation and its cause and effect could be summed up by the phrase "How to be happy though a Jew." The speaker stated that most of the descendants of the leaders of reform embraced Christianity. Dr. the leaders of reform embraced Christianity. Dr. Birnbaum concluded by showing that Zionism was a definite answer and alternative to the ideas behind reform—how to live among the nations and

still retain our Jewishness.
