## COLOSSEUM.

## ALHAMBRA.

The motion picture version of the all-soldier musical, Irving Berlin's "This is the Army," produced by Warner Bros., is now showing at the Alhambra Theatre to capacity audiences. The film, recently completed in Hollywood, was produced by Jack L. Warner and Hal B. Wallis. Michael Curtiz directed. The entire company of 350 soldiers, who appeared in the musical on Broadway and during its cross-country tour, appears here with the soldiers in their original roles in the picture, which includes the entire stage production of "This is the Army" as well as additional material from Irving Berlin's World War I soldier show, "Yip, Yip Yaphank."

## ODEON and CURZON.
