I shall be glad if any of your readers will be good enough to enlighten me on a matter which is puzzling me at the moment. During the last few weeks the daily press has been carrying an advertisement in which it is stated that there are advertisement in which it is stated that there are available at a certain firm dried fruits which have been declared by Rabbi E. Kirzner to be kosher l'Pesach. I have never yet heard that fruit could be anything but "pesachdik," and I cannot, for the life of me, see how dried fruits could be put into a different category. On making enquiries from some of my more orthodox friends, I was told that it was quite possible for "chometz" to attach itself to the fruits whilst being dried and packed and having to pass through so many hands in the process. If this is the case, I still fail to see how Rabbi Kirzner could declare the fruits to be kosher l'Pesach. Did he inspect every detail of the drying and packing, and did he examine every single piece of fruit to see whether it had by any chance become "chometzdik"? I cannot believe that he managed to do all this. On what grounds, therefore, did he declare the fruits to be kosher l'Pesach?—I am, etc..

## S.A. Hebrew Teachers' Conference.

A conference of Hebrew teachers of South Africa was held at the Coronation Hall, Johannesburg, on 1st and 2nd March. Over 50 delegates from various parts of the country assembled to discuss vital questions of Hebrew education as well as the economic position of the Hebrew teachers.

Reports were submitted by Mr. Rybko, Executive Council; Rev. Altshuler and Mrs. Lurie, Transvaal; Mr. M. Wolozinsky, Free State; Mr. Berezinsky and Mr. Shalit, Cape; and Mr. Marshak, Natal. The delegates stressed the necessity for a strong united Teachers' Union in South Africa. Africa.

A session was devoted to the relationship between "Hashachar" (Munisters' Association) and the Hebrew teachers. It was accided that these two bodies should work in harmony.

The official opening took place on Thursday night, 1st March, at the Coronation Hall. Among those who brought greetings were Rabbi Dr. L. I. Rabinowitz, senior minister to the United Hebrew Congregation, who promised his help to raise the prestige of the teachers and to improve their position.

The Conference welcomed with acclamation the message of Mr. J. H. Hofmeyr, Minister of Education, who wished the Conference every success and apologised for his inability to attend.

Resolutions were passed dealing with European Jewry, employment of teachers, education policy, pension funds and syllabi.

The newly elected Executive is as follows: Mr. J. Rubik, President; Rev. O. Altshuler, Messrs. Wynick, Dumas, Berezinsky, Melamed, Silpert, Shadchin and Mrs. Lurie.

Mr. Wolozinsky is to represent the O.F.S and Mr. Marshak, Natal. Representatives for the Cape, Rhodesia and Eastern Province will be elected by these provinces. elected by these provinces.
