"Black Book" Committee.

Women, many of whom could have participated in the actual Parade themselves, immaculately dressed from head to foot, bright young women, middle-aged women and sedate elderly

women, all a pleasure to gaze on.

Then the Parade, which all enjoyed. Which women does not love beautiful clothes? Lovely girls, beautiful clothes, and for a few hours one forgot the realities of life, one forgot that there were millions of women in Europe, women who also love beautiful clothes, women who once wore gorgeous frocks, luxurious furs, and who to-day were solely dependent on second-hand clothing from privileged women, privileged by mere Providence. One forgot all this watching the mannequins—perhaps some of us did not quite forget, perhaps someone's conscience was secretly roused, but one did forget until one came home and read the evening paper and one again remembered the Jewish War Appeal and one was glad to remember it, because one was thankful that one could enjoy beautiful clothes and that one was still in a position to do some-thing for one's less privileged sisters
