SUCCESSFUL PRODUCTION.

A large and appreciative audience applauded the two-act Yiddish play, written by Mr. Geo. Laden, assisted by Mr. B. Mirvish, which was produced by Mr. Alfred Faclier at the Zionist Hall on Tuesday, 28th October.

The play, a skit on local affairs, was amusingly written, and its kindly satire was directed at modern education, committees and chairmen, chazanim and the political scene. The producer's knowledge of the types that were depicted and the playwright's gift for describing the lighter side of Jewish life in the galuth were very evident.

Mrs. R. Turok and Mrs. B. Lidsky gave excellent portrayals of Jenny and Becky, two "balebostes" with genteel aspirations. Mr. Alfred Faclier and Mr. B. Rodd were the two intrepid salesmen, and appropriately cast in "The Political Debate" were M. Kretzmer as the General Zionist, D. Feinstein as the non-party member, H. Konvisser, Mizrachi, O. Rabinowitz, Revisionist, and I. Glick as the Chalutz. An interesting and pleasing discovery was Mr. A. Horner in the part of the Chazan looking for a job. Mr. G. Figovsky as a Chairman, M. Kretzmer as his deputy and D. Feinstein as treasurer, adequately played their parts.

Diana Lazar and Harold Hart, as members of the newer generation, sang "I'll see you again" from "Bitter Sweet." Mr. A. Rubinstein gave a fine interpretation of the poem "Lokschchenbreit" by Sh. Frug.

The Zionist Socialist Youth Choir, ably conducted by Mr. W. Sher and accompanied by Walter Morgan, gave an outstanding performance which was undoubtedly the best they have yet given in Cape Town. Cantor Boris Rome, who sang with the Choir, gave an unusually subtle and artistic expression to the item "Havdole." The audience was charmed also by "Boimalech" and "The Bird Song." Once again Mr. W. Sher's qualities of musicianship were strikingly in evidence.

The concert was organised by a special sub-committee on behalf of the Zionist Socialist Party in aid of the Moatzat Hapoolot Homes for Refugee Children in Eretz Israel.

The Munro-Inglis Company.

The Munro-Inglis Company scored a triumph during its all too short season in Cape Town. Both plays staged, Terence Rattigan's "The Winslow Boy" and Somerset Maugham's "Lady Frederick" were highly successful and reflected great credit on the director, Noël Willman, and every member of the cast.

In "The Winslow Boy," Edwin Quail was excellent as Ronnie Winslow the little naval cadet who is dismissed from the naval college, Osborne, on the charge of having stolen a five-shilling postal order. Harold Lake, as the father who sacrifices so much to establish his son's innocence, gave a memorable performance. Gwen Nelson as the mother, and Nan Munro as the sister who strongly supports the father in his efforts, were very good. Frances Paston won much applause for her skit on a lady journalist. Noël Willman, in the part of Sir Robert Morton, a celebrated K.C. who fights the case for the boy, was most convincing. Others in the cast were Sylvester Stein as the brother, and Siegfried Mynhardt as the solicitor.

The set and costumes designed by Tanya Moseiwitsch were outstanding and the atmosphere of the period, about two years before the 1914-1918 war, was well conveyed.

"Lady Frederick," the action of which takes place at the Hotel Splendide, Monte Carlo, in 1885, is a play typical of Somerset Maugham, full of scintillating wit and a good deal of cynicism. Nan Munro in the name part gave an excellent performance as the charming, clever, and extravagant Lady Frederick Berolles; the scene with her dressmaker (Frances Paston) was highly amusing and called forth much applause. Noël Willman as Paradise Fouldes was outstanding. Others in the cast were Gwen Nelson as the Marchioness of Mereston, Sylvester Stein as the Marquis of Mereston, John Roake as Sir Gerald O'Mara, and Siegfried Mynhardt as Captain Montgomery.
