"THIRD SEDER" EVENING.

There was a very large gathering at the Zionist Hæll on Sunday night, when a "Third Seder" Evening was held under the auspices of the Dorshei Zion Association.

Dr. I. M. Hurwitz was in the chair and extended a cordial welcome to all present. He referred to the great victory of the Haganah at Haifa and said it was also gratifying to hear of the magnanimous spirit in which they had acted. They had dealt fairly and squarely with their enemies. He hoped they would continue to show the world that they could live in peace with the Arabs and that a Jewish State would soon be established.

The four questions were asked by Ir. Sam Levenberg. The first two questions were :-

What are the principal spiritual lessons of Pesach?

In what respect is the yearning for freedom basic to Jewish tradition?

Rabbi Dr. A. T. Shrock, replying, said that the basic teachings of the festival of Pesach transcended all other festival of Pesach transcended all other festivals; it was occasioned by a tremendous event in Jewish history and was the fons et origo of all that followed. Through Pesach we came into existence as a people. Pesach underlined the important teaching of freedom—the revelation of God came through the necessity of freedom. Moses approached the burning bush and first beheld the Divinity, because of the need for freedom. Then came a message of hope and comfort.

The Jewish people would come into their own. Freedom was a divine law and anyone who set himself up as a power above this law would fail. With the Exodus of the past as an inspira-tion and with God's help, the Jewish people would win through.

The next two questions were:

What parallels would you draw bostween the Exodus of the Jews from Egypt and their present struggle to achieve nationhood, with particular

- (1) The comparative circumstances of Jewish life.
- (2) The prospects of ultimate success and independence in Eretz Israel.

Adv. Dave Cohen, replying, said that Moses found that the Israelites were physically enslaved—bondsmen to Pharaoh. To-day the Jews were slaves, not physically but spiritually. Zionism came in Jewish history after emancipation and assimilation. Today, like the children of Israel, Jews worshipped the calf of gold and were en-slaved by the ghetto spirit. Moses had to deal with slaves in the spiritual sense and with dissident elements, who did not believe that by our own efforts we could gain freedom. Zion-ism had to face the difficulty of the dispersion, which made unification difficult. When the Jews began to feel outwardly the bonds of slavery they responded to the call of the modern

The Jews had the advantage to-day that they did not have to be invaders. They had to battle but had fortresses already created which could never be destroyed. There were

700,000 Jews in Eretz Israel prepared to fight for us. Moses had had to act as an invader. Moses had to carry the Tabernacle wherever he went; to-day the Jews did not have to do this because the true Jewish spirit already existed in Eretz Israel.
