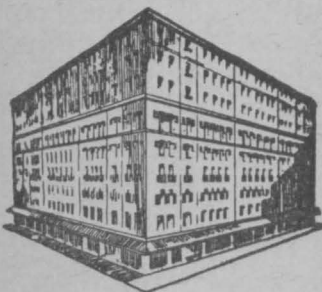

Enlightenment Drive

NEW SPEAKERS TO THE FORE

The hearty welcome accorded to speakers everywhere, gives some indication of the success of the Enlightenment Drive being run by the S.A. Zionist Federation. (Thanks to the Drive, thousands of Zionists have been given the latest information about the Zionist Movement. More and more territory is being covered and meetings are to be held in Rhodesia and the Belgian Congo.

Mr. Herbstein to Deliver M. I. Cohen Memorial Lecture in Bulawayo

The well-known South African Zionist, Mr. Herbstein, K.C., of Cape Town, has left the Mother City on a tour of the three principal Rhodesian cities, namely, Bulawayo, Salisbury and Livingstone. He is due to arrive in Bulawayo on Saturday. Mr. Herbstein has gone to Rhodesia for the dual purpose of delivering the annual Rev. M. I. Cohen Memorial Lecture and of addressing meetings in the interests of the Enlightenment Drive in particular, and in the interests of Zionism in general.

The Annual Rev. M. I. Cohen Memorial Lecture was instituted last year by the Bulawayo Zionist Society as tribute to the late Rev. M. I. Cohen, in consideration of his outstanding work for Zionism. The other addresses to be delivered by Mr. Herbstein are a follow-up of Mr. Israel Dunsky's recent highly successful tour and are in keeping with the aims of the Organisation and Information Department to obtain the services of highly informative and authoritative Zionists to tour various centres in the country.

Mr. Herbstein will deliver the Annual Rev. M. I. Cohen Memorial Lecture in Bulawayo on Sunday evening. On Tuesday night he will deliver a lecture to the Salisbury Zionist Society, and on Wednesday night he will deliver a special address to the Salisbury Zionist Youth Society. On Sunday night, July 2, he will address

the Herzl Zionist Society, Livingstone, and on Thursday night, July 6, he will be the principal speaker at a special Youth Meeting in Bulawayo, where he will deliver an address to the recently reorganised Zionist Youth Society. On Friday, July 7, he will be the guest speaker at the Luncheon meeting of the Bulawayo Rotary Club.

Mrs. I. R. Rosin to Visit Belgian Congo

Mrs. I. R. Rosin, the well-known Zionist worker of Salisbury, is paying a visit to Elizabethville, Belgian Congo, in the interests of the Drive. She will arrive in Elizabethville today (Friday), and will stay there till Monday. She will address the very large Jewish community of Elizabethville on Sunday evening, and will also address a special meeting of the Elizabethville WIZO.

TREATMENT OF AGED HOME INMATES

Animated Discussion at Annual Meeting

A HEATED debate as to whether the inmates of the Jewish Old Aged Home were sufficiently well-treated or not, took place at the annual meeting of the institution last Sunday morning. Mr. Sadowsky asserted that some of the inmates were definitely not receiving the treatment they deserved. He was speaking from experience, he said, and cited cases in support of his statements.

Mr. Shapiro suggested that a sub-committee of men and women be appointed to investigate all complaints.

Mr. H. Kroomer said that those who came to the Aged Home realised that this was their last abode, and the least that could therefore be done was to see that they received the best care and treatment.

Replying to the discussion, Mr. A. W. Katzen, who presided in the unavoidable absence of Mr. I. Heyman, said that the Executive Committee was doing everything possible to make things comfortable and pleasant for the inmates. "We are dealing with the problem of old age," he said, "and appeal to you to be a little more tolerant, as this is a very complex problem." Mr. Katzen also pointed out that a House Committee existed for investigating all complaints. The members of this committee were also members of the general committee. The advisability of procuring a new site for the Home would be considered at a future meeting of the Executive Committee.

Mr. A. W. Katzen presented the annual report, which revealed a year of much activity and progress. The Home had catered for 216 aged people, and in spite of the many rumours that were current, he gave the audience his assurance that everything that could be done for the inmates was being done. Further investigation had given the lie to all the false rumours that were being spread.

The Home, he said, had a competent nursing staff, and a doctor was in attendance for two to three hours each day. Special thanks was due to Dr. Getz and the hon. secretary, Mr. A. I. Heyman, for their invaluable services in interviewing applicants and selecting the nursing staff. He also thanked the ladies for their efficient supervision of the kitchen.

He paid a special tribute to Mr. I. Heyman, Hon. Life President of the Home, who had been a member of the institution for the past thirty years, and chairman for half that period.

Mr. Treisman, the hon. treasurer, presented the financial statement.
