High Standard of Matthews Recital

IT is many years since we have had with us an overseas violinist of the standard of Thomas Matthews. His control of tone, the delicacy and beauty of his playing and his inter-pretation delighted a large audience on Sunday night.

The concert opened with a Purcell suite and was followed by Beethoven's Spring Sonata for violin and piano. Thomas Matthews and Ashley Hart-ley combined to make this Sonata a memorable performance. This work has a lyrical first movement, is fol-lowed by an impressive and melodious slow movement, and closes with an original scherzo and rondo played with freshness and brilliance.

The highlight of the evening was Bach's well-known Partitur in E Major, to which the violinist gave all the strength and flawlessness of his bowing.

Matthews versatility was well dis-played in the second half of the pro-gramme, which varied from the dreamy Chopin Nocturne in D Flat, a dainty Haydn Menuett, the Cap-rice Vionnois to Paganini's brilliant Caprice No. 24.

Ashley Hartley's accompaniment was excellent throughout the concert.
