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Gen. Smuts Opens New His Majesty's Theatre

Warm Tribute to Mr. I. W. Schlesinger

In his address General Smuts paid warm tribute to Mr. I. W. Schlesinger, chairman of African Consolidated Theatres, who, he said, had not only taken an enormous interest in the affairs of South Africa, but had no equal with regard to the promotion of entertainment, amusement, education and instruction. It was only right, added General Smuts, that he, on behalf of the Government, should be present on the occasion to pay tribute to the great work which Mr. Schlesinger had performed.

TRIENNIAL CONFERENCE OF UNION OF JEWISH WOMEN

The Triennial Conference of the Union of Jewish Women will take place in Cape Town on January 6 when the activities of the various centres will be reviewed.

The Union of Jewish Women are recognised for their wholehearted support of all national causes, and during the forthcoming Youth Aliyah Campaign they will once again give their active co-operation.

The support given by the U.J.W. to the Hebrew University is well known. For some years now they have been financing a Parasitology Laboratory at the University and all Unions as well as outposts have contributed towards this fund. More recently the Union has taken upon itself the obligation of erecting a hostel at the University and has now successfully raised the sum of £10,000 for its establishment.

Magen David Adom and the Palestine Maritime League have also received support from nearly every branch. During WIZO month recently held throughout the country, the smaller branches and outposts participated fully, while some of the Unions in the large centres made a direct contribution to the establishment of a Mothercraft Training Centre and Baby Home in Jerusalem.

All this national fund raising activity has proceeded in addition to the gigantic task the Union has undertaken in leading the Women's Section of the Jewish War Appeal in almost every centre.
