A Zionist Lecture Tour

The history of the Jews of Northern Rhodesia, like that of Northern Rhodesia in general, began with the completion of the Victoria Falls completion of Bridge in 1904.

When the bridge was completed, the whole of North-Western Rhodesia was thrown open to settlers, and excellent opportunities were there for those prepared to taken them. Only 100 white people lived in the whole country, and pioneers could select land wherever they liked. Every settler was granted 6,000 acres at three-

pence per acre, payable within five years.

By 1911 the population of Northern Rhodesia was 1,497, distributed over 287,950 sq. miles. By 1931 the white population had increased to 13,846.

Jews came to Northern Rhodesia in Jews came to Northern Rhodesia in very small numbers, not for farming, but to open up trading stations. Jewish wholesalers in Bulawayo assisted their relatives and landsleit by giving them goods and oxen so that they could go to the new territory to open shops at railway stations and sidings. Some of them became cattle dealers and others contractors supplying food to the thousands of railway workers.

At present the Jewish population numbers 612 souls in a European population of 22,000, including 3,000 Polish war evacuees and refugees. This Jewish population is distributed over eight towns.

BROKEN HILL

Broken Hill is famous not only for its rich lead, vanadium and zinc mines but, more particularly for the dis-covery of the skull of Homo Rho-desiensis, the prehistoric man, who lived in Central Africa in the dawn of mankind.

If Homo Rhodesiensis were to visit Broken Hill to-day, he would find as I did, that time seemed to be moving backwards. When I was there 19 years ago I remembered a fairly large Jewish community, owners of the shops as well as the hotel. To-day there is only one longly Jewish name. there is only one lonely Jewish name, and all the tradespeople are Indians.

I met Mr. Myer Brin and the two daughters of the late Mr. Ch. Hochstein, these two families being all that remained of the Jewish "old stock" of Broken Hill.

Mr. Brin was able to tell me about the Jewish community only from 1925, the year of his arrival in Broken Hill. He found only 40 people, mostly unmarried. It was a flourishing period in the history of the Jews in Broken Hill, and the community grew in such numbers and force that they were about to build a synagogue.

But since 1936 the situation has changed entirely. British Indians started to come in large numbers and they opened shops all over the town. The Jews could not compete with them, and one by one the Jewish shops closed down and the Jews left Broken Hill.
