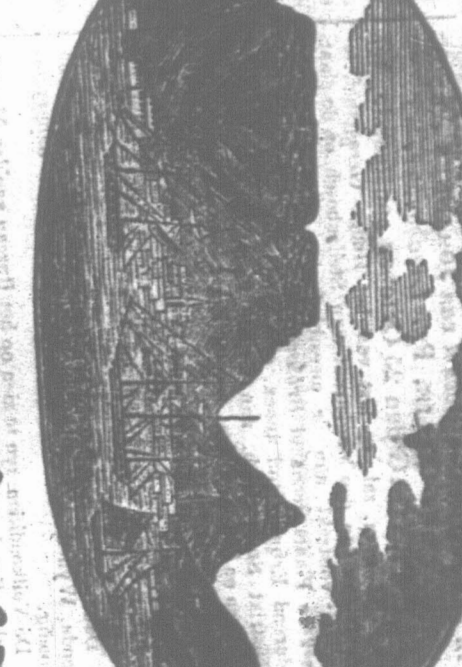

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DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN.

The unprecedented and extensive failures which have taken place during this year, have been founded upon The Commercial Advertiser, but, are at once got rid of with a piece of sophistry excelled by none, for which they, however, have not shaken public confidence in all money transactions, and that they do not form a criterion of a fall in general prosperity of the Trade. It therefore becomes our duty to guard the Public against this extraordinary delusion, and to point out the incontestable fact of the state of our present trade, and of the causes which have inevitably led to that result. In the preceding year we were already over and over implored the attention of the Government, and entreated that some substantial relief should be afforded, for the relative situation between Commerce and Agriculture and their intimate independence upon each other in this Colony, are too manifest to be felt by every one.

The Merchant is almost entirely dependent for his profits on the favorable condition of the Agriculture, for the supply of a few Indian dials in Cape Town and a few in the Public, which occurred with sudden determination to the head, and violent vomiting. Growers were almost compelled to abandon their Vine ards, and were not nearly so paid for the cost of the carriage of their Wines to Market. It was easy to foresee that this would have a deplorable effect upon the prosperity of our Trade; and when even now the Growers are hardly repaid for the cost of production and labour, under an alarming scarcity of hands, it became manifest that both these classes of consumers, on whom the Merchant can alone look for profits, were reduced to the bare necessities of life. The Merchants not being able to obtain the result, have been obliged to close their doors, and to seek refuge in the hands of the Public, which occurred with sudden determination to the head, and violent vomiting. Growers were almost compelled to abandon their Vine ards, and were not nearly so paid for the cost of the carriage of their Wines to Market. It was easy to foresee that this would have a deplorable effect upon the prosperity of our Trade; and when even now the Growers are hardly repaid for the cost of production and labour, under an alarming scarcity of hands, it became manifest that both these classes of consumers, on whom the Merchant can alone look for profits, were reduced to the bare necessities of life.

Discounts under questionable securities or circumstances, and far from finding fault with their proceedings, we only conceive it a duty to state these facts, and only to expect a greater apparent liberality in their proceedings when the Government shall at once set at rest the heavy personal responsibility which (It is asserted) may await the Directors individually, and to declare at once by a public enactment, that they are only liable in cases of fraud, embezzlement, gross neglect, or direct breach of their instructions, when it may be reasonably expected, that the Directors may fairly use a wider discretion, than they would be justified in doing at the present crisis.

It is with deep concern we have to announce the sudden death of Mr. F. H. Stradell, Notary Public, which occurred on Wednesday last. It appears that being afflicted with sudden determination to the head, and violent vomiting, he took a walk about that morning, upon the recommendation of his medical adviser, where his body was found drowned along the beach. Some marks of violence were visible upon the head, which appears to confirm the supposition that he fell down in one of these fits.

Extracts from the "Nieuwe Amsterdamsche Courant" of July 8. AMOENA, June 19. Yesterday a merchant ship arrived here from Corfu, bringing accounts of a horrible event, which took place in the town of Arta (in Epirus), on the 25th, 26th, and 27th May last. In the night of the 26th May, some thousands of armed mountaineers suddenly surprised the town of Arta, committing every where murder, to save their lives, were obliged to submit to the payment of large sums of money, and those unable to comply with the extortion, unmercifully murdered in their houses; women and girls were violated in the most shameful manner, and the children killed.

Several rich and respectable inhabitants were carried away as hostages in order to obtain money from their family, and many killed after the receipt of the money. Several houses were consumed by fire. The Russian and English Consuls to pay large sums for their lives; the Russian Consuls has been obliged to pay 6,000 Francs. This gang of robbers, many inhabitants save their lives to having taken refuge in the house of the French Consul. The Turkish authorities and the few troops composing the garrison fled to the mountains.

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
