To Mr. Hamilton, Consul of His Britannic Majesty at Boulogne.—*Bell's Weekly Messenger*, Nov. 22.

The St. Petersburg Gazette sums up the amount of trophies obtained at Warsaw, at 182 cannon taken in that battle, or in the city and Praga; 2000 serviceable muskets, besides a great number more or less damaged; 8000 side-arms of various kinds; 2,000,000 cartridges; and a great quantity of artillery ammunition. They found in the city an arsenal, a powder mill, a saltpetre factory, and a hospital, containing 11,000 men sick and wounded. In the battle 3000 Poles were made prisoners, including thirty superior officers; a still larger number must have fallen during the assault, by the destructive fire of the Russian artillery, or the bursting of different houses. In the two days the Russian artillery used 29,000 cartridges, and 2,300 shells. Besides the prisoners, 4,000 Polish soldiers surrendered, and nearly 1,200 officers of all ranks have returned to their allegiance. The Russian loss was considerable. Generals Van Briggen and Japowinow, nine colonels, and several staff officers of artillery were killed. The total loss in killed amounted to 2000, including sixty-three officers; 2,500, including 445 officers, were wounded. The whole number put hors de combat, was 10,500, including 618 officers. A great number of the wounded have recovered. A proclamation by the Emperor mentions that he talks of having recourse to mild measures. Reports from Poland are not so favorable; and emigration is going on there to a great extent.—*Bell's Weekly Messenger*, Nov. 13.

It is stated in the Brussels papers that the King of Holland has sent instructions to his Plenipotentiaries in London to demand from the Conference a delay of four months for giving his definitive answer respecting the acceptance or refusal of the 24 articles, and that M. Van der Weyer has been directed to oppose such request as highly injurious to the interests of the Belgians. The son of Baron Van Beekere has been dispatched by the King of Holland on a special mission to St. Petersburg.

The following piece of news (says *L'Industrie*, a Belgian paper) is given us as certain. The Chamber of Malines had presented to the Pope, as candidate for the Archdiocese, the Abbé Sterckx, formerly Curé of the Church of Notre Dame, at Antwerp. The Canon, long since accustomed to entertain no doubt of their own omnipotence, confiding in the marks of favor shown them by the new Sovereign of Belgium, expected with certainty the ratification of their choice, and the investiture of his Holiness. But, lo and behold! Rome rejects the candidate, because he is proposed by the Chapter only, and because his Holiness declares that he recognizes only His Majesty the King of the Netherlands.

The Warsaw journal contains manifestoes of the Emperor Nicholas, prohibiting the officers of the corps of Romani, Kamiński, Rzeczycki, and Rybicki, from returning to the kingdom of Poland, or any other part of the Russian empire, because they continued in arms after the capitulation and submission of Warsaw, in contempt of the orders of the Polish Commander-in-Chief.—*Courrier*, Nov. 14.

The French papers of Saturday and Sunday, which reached us last night, contain intelligence of some interest, though not of much novelty.

The project of law for the perpetual banishment of the Bourbons was carried on Friday afternoon by a majority of 251 to 69, after its most objectionable clause—namely, its infliction of a capital penalty in case of a return—had been set aside by an amendment. The same exclusion, with the omission of the same penalty, is applied to the family of Napoleon, though, by an alteration of the words and the form, the legal ignominy implied in the term banishment does not extend to the latter. For the wording of this part of the act, the liberal members of the Chamber take great credit of their own dexterity. M. Comte, the Editor of the *Conseil*, and the constant antagonist of Napoleon's despotism, suggested this amendment, which was received with great applause by the movement.

It might naturally excite surprise (without a short explanation) that the majority against the amended bill should be so great. "What," it may be said, "are there 60 Deputies who can openly vote against a law for banishing a family already in exile—family so detested as its attacks on the national liberties, and whose return would be the signal for a civil war?" No; there was not one deputy who would allow such an interpretation to be put on his negative vote; but the minority declared against the bill, because they thought it superfluous if not absurd, and that minority consisted not of those whose opinions have a royalist tendency, but chiefly of those who are extreme liberals. Their argument was, that a special proscription against the Bourbons, under capital penalties, was in fact an acquittal, for nobody would betray a returning member of the family, if an instant and ignominious death was to be the consequence of his arrest. This party likewise argued, that the existing law in the criminal code against persons who engaged in treasonous plots, who raised the standard of rebellion, or who troubled the public peace, gave sufficient security against the return of the exiled family and their partisans, so long as the Government was able to make itself respected; and, when it ceased to have power to repress their efforts, it must then cease to exist.—The recent history of France supplied abun-

dant examples of this truth. The Bourbons have been already several times banished and restored, notwithstanding their exclusion under a capital penalty. Napoleon himself returned from Elba, and advanced to the Tuilleries, while a price was set on his head; and if he did not return from St. Helena, it was not because he had been banished, but because he was guarded with sentinel.

The Ministry seemed to take no part in the discussion; and we have not learnt how they conducted themselves on the vote.

#### FIRE DAMP IN COAL MINES.

A dreadful accident has occurred in the explosion of hydrogen in one of Lord Londesborough's collieries. The *Whithaven Herald* thus describes the melancholy catastrophe:—About half past 9 on Saturday morning an explosion took place in Croft pit, about a mile to the South-west of Whithaven. Various reports of the nature and extent of the accident were, in the course of the morning current in Whithaven, and excited an intense interest. But though the interest in the event, at the sympathy with the sufferers and their families, was great, candour obliges us to state, that nothing seemed so extraordinary to us, as compared with strangers in Whithaven, as the very little excitement it occasioned. An event so awful in its nature, and so dreadful in its effects, would, it appears, have been visible, in the most inequitable manner to the most cursory observer; but though the event was indeed a subject of general conversation it did not seem in the least to disturb the ordinary course of business, and the destruction of twenty to thirty individuals seemed to excite less interest than in other places we have seen occasioned by the untimely death of a single human being.

About one o'clock in the afternoon we learned that the raising of the bodies of the unfortunate sufferers had commenced, and we accordingly repaired to the mouth of the pit. As we receded from the town, we met successively four carts, which contained each something covered with straw, and, as we learned from casual passengers, the bodies of the wretched victims. On reaching the pit we understood that five bodies had been raised, besides two living men, of whom one had since died. Fifteen, or sixteen were collected at the bottom of the shaft ready to be raised, and two or three persons, supposed to have perished, were yet missing and unaccounted for. About fifty-sixty persons were collected on the spot. A number of carts were ready to carry away the bodies as fast as raised, and one was pointed out to us as containing the body of a young man, and waiting to receive the body of his brother, who had perished along with him. Deep agony was painted in many a countenance round us; and one poor creature, who had lost her husband, rent the air with her wailings.

On inquiry we learned that the depth of the shaft was 160 fathoms (one-third the height of Skiddaw!) and that the working, where the explosion took place, was more than a mile, some said two, from the bottom of the shaft.

The number of victims of this unfortunate accident amounted to twenty-two. Many of them appeared much burnt and bruised.

A coroner's inquest was held on Saturday afternoon; but the inspection of the bodies, which had been removed to their respective homes, took up till a late hour in the evening, by which time the principal witness (the colliers) were in such a state of intoxication that it was judged necessary to postpone the inquiry to Monday.—*Atlas*, Nov. 26.
