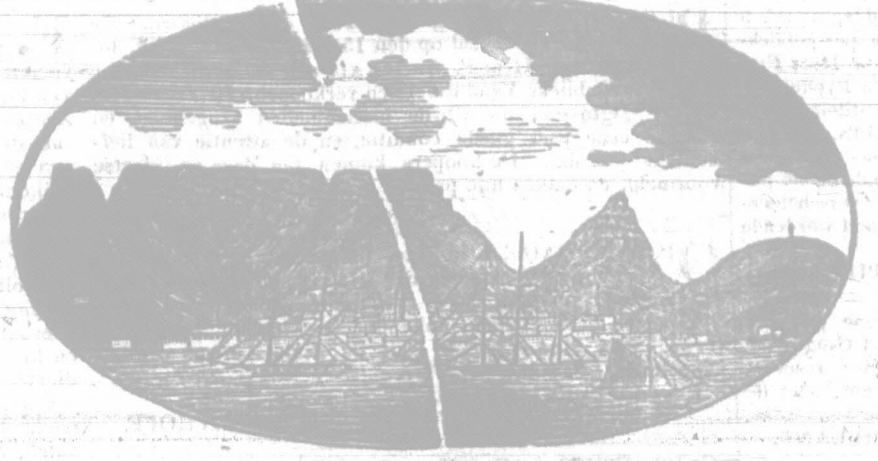

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THE NEW GUNPOWDER TREASON.

Sir,—A most tremendous fuss is now making both in Cape Town and in Graham's Town about the sale of Gunpowder and Arms to the Caffers. FAIRBAIRN who has long recommended a "free trade" in these articles, (in which for once I join that otherwise wretched renegade), would now gladly cast blame upon the Frontier Traders who are supposed to have furnished the savages with weapons of offence against themselves, could he forget his approval of that traffic, but that, luckily for them and unfortunately for the weathercock Editor, is impossible. A few merchants here, too, pretend to bristle up with indignation at the illicit supply of such "grain and fire engines" to the foe—but let it be remembered that if such a trade existed it was previously to the Caffer becoming a foe, and while he was unknown to the Colonists preparing most treacherously his means of offence. The Traders if they sold these dangerous articles, could never imagine they would be directed against themselves, but, doubtless, believed, that while they secured to themselves an advantageous trade, they were advancing the civilization of their neighbours; for that the use of such weapons has that effect, I could appeal to numerous authorities, and to none less influential than the late Sir John Malcolm, who has regularly discussed the subject, and returned an affirmative in its favor. Its Honor the public, too, I mean John Fairbairn's public—the "minor" public—has also "roared," "like any sucking dove," against its own agents, and "opines" that Caffer traders are the most guilty traders in the world,—it attempts to look wondrous wise, shakes its very assiduous head; "but there's nothing in it," and fancies "alas the fancy!" that none of its own members would be sinful enough to drive a profitable bargain.

And now, Sir, I also "opine," that had the Caffers been long ago used to guns and gunpowder, they would have been respected as an enemy, instead of having been (fatally for ourselves) despised and represented by Mr. Fairbairn as naked and unarmed Savages. And I "opine," that if our traders did not choose to supply them, they would go to a cheaper and better shop, Port Natal or elsewhere. And I "opine," that could sundry merchants be put on oath, they would be forced to confess, they the indignant, the virtuous merchants, the friends of Philip, Fairbairn, and Tom Foolery; that they had procured large quantities of the "explosive mixture" for the Frontier, regarding the use of which they cared not a rush, so that they were not "blown up." I "opine" farther, that there never was any trader, trafficker, or merchant anywhere (including those who breathe the moral atmosphere of South Africa), or at any time (including even those mischievous intellect days), who, when great profits were in one scale, and what he would consider the infringement of an absurd law in the other, would hesitate to infringe its regulations. And I "opine" once more—"thank thee," Kennedy, "for teaching me that word"—that the guilty must rank as follows:—First, the enactment which prohibited an impracticability; secondly, the merchant who imports and sells to the trader that dangerous commodity; and lastly, the trader who takes it to the best market he can find.

And now, Sir, I ask the question, whether gunpowder and muskets are the causes of war? I used to imagine that one required ignition, and the other manual effort, before either would be effective, and that human will was the motive power. I certainly have known some timid dames and nervous misses who shuddered at the sight of both, fearing they might go off of themselves; but I thought until lately these were feminine fears; I, however, stand corrected, being told that the supply of guns and powder to the Caffers has caused the present war!—out this, Sir, is merely an evasion, it is false, it is absurd, a monstrosity begotten by hypocrisy, and fostered by ignorance. The cause of the Caffer Invasion was not the possession of fire-arms and ammunition, but the more inflammable material, the murderous will of the savage, awake and incited by the everlasting notes of tyranny and oppression sounded by the traitors in our ranks.

Sir,—A letter appeared in your columns the week before last, which has called forth a profusion of abuse and declamation from the Reviewer, "similes horum." The letter to which I allude is signed Balaam. In this the writer ventured to set forth a few opinions of his own, as to the probable tenor of the London papers on the subject of the Caffer irruption, and the circumstances attending it. Aware that his prophecies would be denounced as untrue and absurd by the domestic enemies of the Colony, he assumed the name of Balaam, as being one which, in common parlance, denotes "a false Prophet." With equal candour he declared himself willing to be punished with the appellation of the "Ass," instead of the "Prophet," in case his speculations should prove to be incorrect. So much honesty was above the comprehension of the Reviewer, who first gives a wrong meaning to his concluding paragraph, and then sneers at an imaginary folly—the offspring of his own brain, with unceasing tautology, throughout the whole of his letter. He next gives us to understand that his reason for so doing is because Balaam has taxed him with a "thorough fabrication of the ancient text to serve a stupid theory." Perhaps such an expression, of the one similar to it, "a glaring literary sin," may be somewhat too harsh, but it is not wholly unfounded; since, to support a particular and not generally received theory, the Reviewer gives a version of a sentence from Herodotus different from that given by the Commentators, and which he himself admits may be disproved ("He may, perhaps, prove himself an erroneous one.")

The Reviewer then proceeds to comment upon the ignorance Balaam has shown in dwelling upon a subject with which he is unacquainted. As to Balaam's knowledge of the Greek language I am not prepared to make any statement, but I cannot shut my eyes to the injustice and illiberality of deducing from his supposed ignorance of it, the conclusion, that by eaves dropping, and that only ("for it appears extraordinary how a gentleman like H. O. should be in any sort of habits of communication with such a person as Balaam"), he could have known anything of the matter. Let me assure the Reviewer that I heard all the circumstances of the case from a person to whom the Reviewer related them, and remarked "that H. O. was quite right, but a little too confident." (I presume he must have meant "hypocritical.") For aught the Reviewer may know, Balaam may have derived his information from the same source.

I shall only further remark, that Balaam's letter does not appear to me to warrant the presumption that the writer holds so low a rank in society as to give the Reviewer any pretext for classing him among the "canaille," or "profligate vulgus." That I have been somewhat dilatory in coming forward in defence of Balaam, must be attributed to the idea, that he might have preferred being his own champion. Perhaps he did not think the Reviewer's letter sufficiently important to merit a reply. However that may be, as it remains still unanswered, you will oblige me by inserting mine in your next number.

DR. KENNEDY WITHDRAWS HIMSELF FROM THE COMMITTEE.

Graham's Town, Feb. 26, 1835.

Sir,—It is too much the custom of writers in our Newspapers to assume that all the inhabitants of the Colony are actuated by a Party Spirit, which renders them totally inaccessible to truth.

Dr. Kennedy is evidently of this opinion. He has not told us who he is—how he has become acquainted with our affairs, and from what sources he derived his information respecting the excellency of Dr. Philip's character.

Dr. Kennedy being a person of extraordinary "power," as Mr. Fairbairn tells us, must have known that among men in possession of their sober senses, the credit of a witness would be sadly shaken were he to speak positively to circumstances which he can only know through the representations of others; more especially if it should appear that his informants were interested parties, or desirous of producing particular impressions.

The Public knew nothing of Dr. Kennedy until they saw his letter addressed to the Secretary of the Committee "for the Relief of the distressed Sufferers by the Caffer Invasion," but which was evidently intended for publication. From that letter they will conclude—

1st. That Dr. Kennedy is impatient of opposition, and deems it offensive in a Committee, of which he is a Member, to reject his propositions.

2d. That finding himself in a minority, he discovers that the Committee is a "self-elected Body," and wonders how he got into it.

3d. That when a Committee is not of his opinion, he declares them "to be in no respect qualified to speak the sense of the community."

4th. That he had "a point to gain;" for says Doctor Kennedy "to meet our opponents half way, and gain our point," &c., I suggested that we ought to "solicit all clergymen at the head of congregations to join our Committee;" that therefore

5th. He is not that straightforward sort of man who objects to get windward by a side wind.

6th. That he most pertinaciously adheres to his own opinions, having compelled the majority of the Committee to get rid of a disagreeable subject by the method found most efficacious in Parliament, where Members persist in running counter to the feelings of the House.

7. That he becomes angry when a Committee will not adopt all his suggestions; for, says Dr. Kennedy, "I consider the person, whoever he was, who subjected me to the risk of running the gauntlet through such an opposition," &c. must have had very erroneous notions of my sentiments upon such subjects.

8th. That he mistakes his position in Cape society, believing that he and Mr. Chase are alike "unknown and influential." Mr. Chase being well known and highly respected both here and in Cape Town, and so influential that the great Mr. Fairbairn actually quoted him largely in a late number of the Advertiser.

9th. That in his own opinion he possesses extraordinary penetration; for having been once, and once only, in a private room with Dr. Philip, he discovered "the talents, the virtues, the active benevolence, and knowledge," of the Doctor, which "rendered him by far the most eligible person in the Colony to have presided in the Committee."

10th. That he does not read law reports, nor rummage amongst old newspapers for local information, being "born for much more," as Mr. Fairbairn tells us; he would otherwise have seen that all the inhabitants of this Colony there are only 2 or 3 who have been convicted of libel, or, in Scriptural phrase, of "bearing false witness against their neighbour," and that Dr. Philip is one of them; that the Government ordered an inquiry into his representations respecting the lands of Theopolis, the result of which was, that Dr. Philip was still further distinguished from the rest of the community by a second breach of the Commandment.

I regret that the limits of a letter do not allow me to throw further lights upon Dr. Philip's character, Dr. Kennedy being obviously a most unpretending gentleman, and highly desirous of obtaining local information before he ventures an opinion on the great question which now engages the attention of the Colonists.—I am, &c.

Sir,—Your clever and witty Correspondent "Balaam," may vie with Palette the Painter, for so naturally did he portray the dirt of the Anti-Colonial faction that the mere sight of it "set the whole style in an uproar."

Sir,—Perhaps you will favor me by inserting in your independent Paper the following Remarks on Advice-giving (extracted from Mr. Bentham's "Dentology") they being so applicable to the Managers of the Advertiser.

Sir,—Referring to the Cape of Good Hope Literary Gazette for January last, I find, under the head of "Colonial Appointments," an account current, entitled—"The Colonial Government in account with the Village of Wynberg," the object of which seems to be, to show, that the Colonial Government is partial in favor of the Dutch Reformed Congregation of Wynberg, by allowing them £120 more per annum than it allows to the English Episcopalians there. To prevent the impression which such a misstatement is calculated, and perhaps intended, to make, is the only object of my present communication.

In the first place, the amount allowed by the Colonial Government to the English Episcopal Congregation at Wynberg has been erroneously stated to be only eighty pounds, it being one hundred and twenty-eight pounds, fifteen shillings per annum.

2ly. The limits of the Dutch Reformed Congregation alluded to is not confined to the Village of Wynberg, as has been maliciously represented, but extends from Roodebloem and Salt-river to Kuyls-river, Hout Bay, and Simon's Town and District; whilst the English Episcopal Congregation alluded to confines itself to the village of Wynberg and its immediate neighbourhood.

3dly. There are, within the limits of the Dutch Reformed Congregation above given,—three Churches or Chapels for the English Episcopalians; to wit, one at Simon's Town, one at Wynberg, and one at Roodebloem. The expense of the Chapel at Simon's Town, which has been estimated at £60, £602 10s. per annum, therefore £402 10s. more than is allowed to the Dutch Reformed.

This will at once show the incorrectness of the account current in the Literary Gazette, which gives a balance in favor of the English Episcopalians of £120 per annum.

But if the payment of taxes gives a title to the support of Government, and if that support were regulated (as in justice it ought to be) in proportion to the number of tax-payers in each Congregation, then the following will be found to be a more correct account than the one given in the Literary Gazette
