On the whole, Sir, we have reason to be satisfied with the conduct of our friends upon the frontier, and with the writings and speeches of our enemies in Cape Town. In a few days we shall be over the border under the command of a soldier "à la mode."

AN ENGLISH SETTLER.

Hottentot's Holland, March 28, 1835. Sir,—Having seen in the Graham's Town Journal of the 27th ult. a letter from Somerset, signed George Morgan, contradicting an assertion made by the Editor of the Commercial Advertiser, as to that gentleman being his authority for publishing the actual numbers of Chiefs and Caffers engaged in the invasion of the Frontier, and having subsequently seen another letter in the same Journal, of the 20th inst., signed A. C., calling upon that "faithful recorder of public events" to answer Mr. Morgan, &c., at the same time recommending him to peruse his own article on lying;—in addition to that recommendation, permit me to add also, for his perusal, the quotation at the head of his leading article of the Advertiser of the 31st August, 1825. For the information of the public I transcribe it:—

"Whoever reports, or otherwise publishes, any thing which it is possible may be false, that man is a slanderer—he is a worthless slave—avoid him, good countrymen, even the least misrepresentation or aggravation of facts deserves the same censure in some degree." I am, &c. A FARMER.

Cape Town Committee for the Relief of the Destitute Sufferers by the Caffers Invasion.

At a Meeting of the Committee held on Thursday, the 19th March, 1835.

Present, Messrs. F. Still—S. B. Venning—J. Marshall—H. E. Rutherford, and J. H. Tredgold.

The Treasurer submitted a communication from the Hon. Col. J. Bell, dated the 18th inst., stating that the Government of St. Helena had notified that an amount of £265 had been collected in that island for the relief of the sufferers at Graham's Town, to be paid by the Hon. E. I. Company's Agent at the Cape, to such person as the Governor of this Colony may be pleased to appoint to distribute the same: this communication was accompanied by a letter to the Agent, W. Hawkins, Esq., requesting him to pay the amount into the hands of the Treasurer of this Committee.

The following communications addressed to the Secretary were read.

A letter dated the 13th inst., from the Rev. John Heavyside, Chairman of the Board of Relief for the Destitute at Graham's Town, acknowledging a communication from the Committee of the 5th inst., which authorized the Board to draw for a further sum of £350, and expressing the thanks of the Board of Relief, for this additional proof of the sympathy of the Committee, with the sufferers in that part of the Colony, and assuring them, that the Board is prepared to pay every attention to the recommendation of the Committee in respect to dispensing their bounty to the most destitute and helpless sufferers, without any distinction of Nation, Sex, or Color; and likewise in giving a preference, ceteris paribus, to the claims of Widows and Orphans;—these being the principles on which the Board has endeavoured to act, ever since the commencement of its labors.

And stating that in the course of a few weeks the Rev. Gentleman may be able to furnish the Committee with some details of their proceedings, which, he has no doubt, will be interesting.

A letter dated the 16th inst., from the Rev. H. Frazer of Simon's Town, acknowledging the receipt of a communication from the Committee, and expressive of his deep sympathy in the misfortunes of the sufferers on the Frontiers, and stating that he had availed himself of the talents, piety, and christian benevolence of the Rev. Dr. Oke, to have a Sermon preached in their behalf, at Simon's Town on Sunday next.

A letter dated the 17th inst., from John Osmond, Esq., of Simon's Town, stating, that since his last remittance, he had succeeded in adding £13 to the Subscriptions, and enclosing a cheque for the amount, with the names of the subscribers, and that he had seen a Subscription list on board the "Thalia" where he had great hope further contributions would be made.

Resolved,—That the thanks of the Committee be given to Mr. Osmond, for his benevolent endeavours to promote their humane object.

The Treasurer reported the present amount of Subscriptions on his list to be £801. 5s. 10d.

Resolved.—That the next Meeting of this Committee be governed by advertisement as usual, for the second April, and that the meetings in future be held monthly, but that the Secretary or Treasurer be empowered to summon special meetings when necessary.

Extract from the Journal "De la Haye," dated Dec. 3, 1834—EGYPT.—ISRAELITES CAPTURED AND RE-CAPTURED BY JEKESAH.

The following Extract of a letter written by a traveller to his parents at this place, contains very interesting news:—"Jerusalem, July 16, 1834.

"My stay in this town, and particularly my excursions among the Arabs, have enabled me to ascertain that they people are very displeas'd with Ibrahim, and particularly very

angry, because young men have been pressed to recruit the army. I heard that a great conspiracy was on the point of breaking out, and that I would do well to quit Palestine. It was unfortunately too late, and I was obliged to remain. Scarcely had the Pacha gone to Jaffa, ere the revolution began. The garrisons of Herek and Soltah were cut to pieces; and the Arabs of Samaria and Hebron marched to Jerusalem. The Pacha had only left a garrison of six hundred men in this town, and the assassins by whom they were attacked amounted to forty thousand men. A few pieces of cannon posted on the walls would have been sufficient to awe these hostile hordes, who had no other arms but lances and muskets: but the Arabs had discovered a subterraneous passage which was not guarded. They entered at midnight; and the soldiers, after a gallant resistance, were obliged to retreat to the castle. All the Christians fled to the convents, where they were safe. During five or six days the town was given over to pillage: it was a horrible sight. The Jews, who had no place of shelter, suffered mostly; their houses were plundered, and their furniture scattered about; the women and young girls became the victims of the brutality of these ferocious assailants;—the heart trembles at the recital of so many atrocities.

The expectation, no doubt of obtaining strong ransoms made them respect the convents. In addition to all these disasters a violent earthquake overthrew many houses, and destroyed part of the wall adjoining the Mosque; nearly the whole of the convent at Bethlehem fell in, and almost all the inhabitants were buried under the ruins. The shocks continued successively for ten days, but were not so violent as the first. The Pacha, on hearing what had taken place, immediately marched with 5000 men from Jaffa. The distance from Jaffa to this place is only 12 hours, and the Pacha was there three days, and a half on the road before he reached this place to succour us. More than 30,000 Arabian peasants were posted on the heights, and when the soldiers were engaged in the ravines and narrow defiles, the Arabs, profiting by their superior position, rolled down on their heads enormous masses of rocks, by which the passage became impassable for the cavalry and artillery. The activity and the courage of Ibrahim triumphed, however, over these obstacles, and he entered Jerusalem victoriously. The murderous war which the Pacha continues to wage with the Arabs, does not allow me to quit the town; but I will, on the first occasion, mount my Dromedary, and cross with the swiftness of wind the desert leading from Cairo to Alexandria, and pass over to Europe."

Extracts from English Papers.

The arrival of a packet from Jamaica has put us in possession of papers from that island to the second ult. It appears by their contents that much uneasiness prevailed in Kingston in consequence of accounts received from St. Ann's, stating that the apprentices on two estates had struck work, and were in a state of rebellion. It was greatly feared that their example would be followed in other parts of the island. The Governor had, however, called out the military to protect property as much as possible.

On the 26th of November the House of Assembly presented an address to the Governor, requesting him to increase the number of local magistrates in each parish, so as to carry the provisions of the Abolition Act into operation, and everywhere enforce due order and subordination. The Governor, in his answer, told the House that he had already appointed as many magistrates as he had the power to name, and therefore was obliged to forward to the Government at home a copy of the House's address, with a request that he should be authorized to do as the House desired. He added, however, that he considered the adoption of such a measure to be in direct opposition to the spirit of the Abolition Act, and the intentions of the Government.

On this answer the House of Assembly adopted the following resolutions:—

- 1. That this House in all their proceedings have evinced the most anxious desire to co-operate, by every means in their power, with the Executive, and the other branch of the Legislature, which seemed calculated to carry the provisions of the Abolition Act into execution, and with this view the House has, during the present session, passed two bills, the effect of which, if either of them had become a law, this House confidently asserts, would have been to promote the industry of the manumitted slaves, to carry the provisions of the Abolition Act into execution, and to preserve the peace and tranquillity of this Island.
- 2. That inasmuch as it appears by the answer of His Excellency to the united address of the Council and Assembly, that some of the local magistrates of this island had already been appointed by him to the special commission, this House cannot but express their astonishment and grief that his Excellency should have thought proper to state that it was impossible for him, consistently with the tenor of all his communications with the Colonial Office, to assent to the prayer of the united address of the Council and Assembly, requesting him to invest with special commissions such a number of the local magistrates in each parish as he might deem sufficient to carry the provisions of the Abolition Act into effect, and to enforce due order and subordination among all classes of his Majesty's subjects in this Island.
- 3. That the communications or instructions emanating from, and expressly alluded to by his Excellency, as those of the Colonial Office, are in direct opposition to the Abolition Act, and calculated to neutralize all the endeavours on the part of the Colonial Legislature to carry its provisions into effect.
- 4. That this House can never recognize the unconstitutional principle, that any law which has received the sanction of His Majesty can be suspended, abrogated, or annulled by any communications between the Colonial Office and the Executive of this Island.
- 5. That whatever may be the nature of the communications and instructions received from the Colonial Office, this House think that his Excellency might have considered himself fully justified in yielding to the pressure of circumstances, and to the wishes of both branches of the Legislature, and thereby have incurred a responsibility with the Government at home less awful than that which rests upon him.
- 6. That this House, and the proprietors of the Island, actuated by self-preservation, have given and are giving their most anxious and zealous co-operation to promote, if it be possible, the success of a measure in which everything dear to them is involved—their homes, their families, their property, their existence.
- 7. That under these circumstances, this House consider His Majesty's Government the responsibility of answering for the consequences which may result from a measure in which the peace and prosperity of this island are so deeply involved.
- 8. That the House of Assembly thought it worth its while to devote a very long sitting on the 21st of November to the discussion of the question as to whether Mr. Abbott, a baptist

missionary, had committed a breach of privilege in refusing to be examined on oath by a committee of the House on matters of inquiry relating to the apprentices. Mr. Abbott's refusal was founded on divers grounds; among others, that the House of Assembly in Jamaica has no more the power of examining witnesses on oath than the House of Commons in England. The House, however, decided that it does possess such a power, and sentenced Mr. Abbott to be imprisoned in the county goal.—Times, Jan. 1835.
