So far back as 1702, fifty years after the establishment of this Colony, Governor van der Stoll, who made a Journey into the country of the Amaguas with a party of Boers, found there no kraals except herds of Bushmen.

Besides such real and presumptive proofs of their ancient existence in the present situation, we also find that at the present day scattered over all the deserts of Great Namaqualand and the Bitchuana country, and observing there a similar line of conduct towards the Hollentals, Danaras, and Caffers in their vicinity, that those within the Colony do towards the inhabitants.

WHEREAS, Bushmen are found in positions perfectly unassailable by the "Wicked Boers"—as north, beyond Lita-koo, according to all travellers there.—at Angra Pequena, according to the very consistent traveller Dr. John Phillip himself, and even in the vicinity of Benguela, Eastward, beyond the Onzimircooboo or St. John's River, and beyond Port Natal, according to Green and Cowie, Bain, &c. &c.

WHEREAS, depre-dations of the Boesjemen have not ceased to this day, but their open war upon the Colonists ceased long before they heard of a Missionary, partly by their strength being broken, and partly by a more humane system of conciliation being substituted for that of retaliation.

WHEREAS, we have evidence to prove the contrary, and at the same time to shew the system of Commandos against them was not undertaken by choice but from stern necessity alone.

The Boesjemen did not originally inhabit the Country where they now carry on their most injurious warfare against the Colonists, it cannot therefore be urged that the savages revenge themselves for being dispossessed of their country.

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deemed it certainly preferable that they should be received by the Boers to being strangled or dashed to pieces by their parents, from absolute want of food, or to being left exposed to the wild beasts, occurrences which the Landroost maintains as not rare.

TO THE EDITOR.—SIR,—In the proceedings of the "Cape Town Committee for the Relief of the Sufferers by the Caffre Invasion," published in the Commercial Advertiser of this day, I observe that allusion is made to a debt due by the Committee to the late Proprietors of that Journal; and as the Committee have been unwittingly entrapped into giving hasty currency to only one limb of the case, I request the insertion of the following correspondence, which will explain my reasons for not complying with the request of the Committee. I have, &c. GEORGE GARIB.

(Copy.) "Cape Town, 11th Sept, 1835. To GEORGE GARIB, Esq.—SIR,—I am directed by the Cape Town Committee for the Relief of the Sufferers on the Frontiers, to inform you, that at a Meeting held yesterday, the Treasurer laid before the Committee an account, presented by you, shewing a balance of Rds. 109, due to the Commercial Advertiser Newspaper up to the 30th of June last;—The Treasurer stated at the same time that he was authorized by Mr. Fairbairn to forego all claim on his part of this balance. And I am instructed to inform you, that the Zuid-Afrikaan Newspaper have printed similar communications for the Committee, and made so charge for the same; and from the low state of the funds of the Committee, and the severe distress still prevailing on the Frontiers, which renders every means of relief that can be afforded to the sufferers imperatively necessary, the Committee are led to hope that you will also be pleased to relieve them from the payment of your proportion of the amount in question. TO WHICH I WROTE THE FOLLOWING REPLY:—(Copy.) "Cape Town, Sept. 11, 1835. To J. H. TREGOLD, Esq., Secretary, &c.—SIR,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 10th inst., intimating the wish of the "Committee for the relief of the Sufferers on the Frontier," that I should forego my claim on that Society for Rds. 109—a sum which you are aware is considerably below the usual charge. In reply I beg leave to state, that I have long since discontinued the practice of identifying my claims in the way of business on public Institutions or Societies, with my private donations to such Institutions or Societies. My conduct, in these cases, is not regulated by that of others; it is, therefore, uninteresting to me to learn what other persons have done, or may have authorized any one to say they are willing to do. The collection of the claims of the Advertiser, up to the end of June last, rests with me alone. And as I have already contributed about eleven guineas to the object of your benevolent Society, I do not feel myself called upon to accede to the request of the Committee. I regret, however, to learn from your letter, that severe distress still prevails on the Frontier, and that the Society's funds are very low. The Committee will perhaps allow me to suggest a further earnest appeal to the public, in which case I shall be happy to contribute another donation. I have the honor, &c. (Signed) "GEORGE GARIB."

TO THE EDITOR OF THE "ADVERTISER." Sept. 9, 1835. SIR,—I beg leave to express my opinion that it may be dangerous to your fellow Colonists, to publish such a copy of your letter as the one you did to-day; because the parties, whose cause you advocate, either read or get your Papers read to them; and in consequence of the pains you were pleased to take last Dec. in not only publishing in your Newspaper, but reprinting, and causing to be distributed among the blacks, your strictures upon "whips, stocks, prisons, &c. with your name at the bottom; you are perhaps looked up to by such persons as their Champion, Governor, Councillor, and so forth, and your "Prophecies" might be considered tantamount to invitations, incentives, and encouragements to war, therefore I humbly suggest that it would answer every useful purpose were you to forward your "prophecies" of this kind privately, under cover, to Colonel Bell.—I am, Sir, &c. (From a Correspondent.) According to a previous public notice, a Meeting was held in the Reading Room at Swellendam, on the 5th September, and several resolutions proposed and carried without opposition by 2 or 300 farmers present, since which an address has been embodied from those resolutions, and sent round for signature;—the following is the address:— To His Excellency Major-General Sir B. D'URBAN, K. C. B., &c., Governor and Commander in Chief of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, &c. &c. &c. MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY. We, the undersigned Landholders and Inhabitants of the District of Swellendam, humbly beg, in accordance with the resolutions unanimously passed at a Public Meeting held in the Reading Room at this village, on the 5th inst., to convey to Your Excellency the sentiments we entertain with respect to the important measures which have lately engaged Your Excellency's attention, and to express the gratitude we feel due to Your Excellency, for the readiness and humane feeling with which, at the expense of so much personal comfort, you immediately proceeded to the scene of danger for the relief of the Colony, and the relief of our fellow countrymen. Reflecting on the treacherous inroads of the enemy, and the barbarous cruelty and devastation which every where marked their progress in the frontier districts, and at one time seemed to threaten even our own, we consider that prompt & exemplary punishment was demanded, and the combination of wisdom and justice, tempered with mercy, which has been so happily displayed by Your Excellency in chastising and repelling the invaders, has not failed to excite our unqualified admiration. The policy pursued by Your Excellency towards the Fingo Nation, now rescued by Your Excellency from a most degrading thralldom, and towards such of the Caffers as remained faithful to the Colony, we humbly deem you and your troops, whilst we fondly trust that the measures proposed by Your Excellency will be the means, under divine Providence, of promoting the civilization and best interests of these Heathen tribes.

Be pleased, Sir, to accept our unfeigned thanks for the obligations under which Your Excellency has placed the inhabitants of this Colony, by the promptitude and activity with which you have accomplished all these very arduous duties.

Be pleased also to accept the thanks of the inhabitants of this District for your uniform kindness to the individuals who composed the Swellendam Commando, and for your unwearied endeavours to alleviate the hardships to which they had become exposed on leaving their homes.

Convinced, as we are, that Your Excellency enjoys the approbation of your own conscience, as well as that of all well disposed colonists, with regard to the measures which, in circumstances of such unprecedented difficulty, you have seen fit to adopt, we sincerely hope that Your Excellency may have the further happiness of receiving the entire approbation of our Gracious Sovereign: And earnestly praying that the blessing of God may attend Your Excellency and family wherever you may go, we respectfully subscribe ourselves, as we trust to be ever found, Your Excellency's Most obedient and grateful Servants,
