W'r maken gene aanspraak op de gaven van voorzegging, maar wy zyn niet weinig trotsch op het vertrouwen, dat onze Lezers stellen op onze inzigten omtrent grens staatkunde, en op de voorzegging en voorspelling van gebeurtenissen, van tyd tot tyd verrat, in de Inleidings Artikelen van ons Blad, en in de brieven van onze talryke en wel onderrigte Correspondenten.

Terwyl de verkoop van den Adeltierr, hoofdzakelyk bepaald is tot het Londonsche Zending's Genootschap, ten einde naar Engeland te worden gezonden, om door deszelve verkeerde voorstellingen, de gemoeerden van het goede volk aldaar, te vergriffen; is de aanvrage naar den Zuid-Afrikaan, door deszelfs talryke, loyale Intekenaren, zeer uitgebreid, en grootelyk aan het toenemen.

Het Hof van Onderzoek naar den dood van Hiazra, heeft, soo als wy vernemen, den Heer Southey volkomen vry gesproken, van enige onbehoorlykheid van gedrag, in het doodschietsen van het verraderlyke Opperhoofd, en heeft ontdekt, dat de auteur der valsche beschuldiging naar Engeland over het onderwerp aan den Heer BUXTON gezonden, Chirurgyn A. De staatkunde van het tegenwoordige bestuur, schynt op de illiberaalste en beknopte inzigten gevestigd te



hastened my return to Cape Town, or I should in all probability have witnessed the outbreak of the Caffers; and it is deeply to be deplored that any circumstances interfered to prevent his appearance there, for I cannot but believe that if, before he enjoyed a system of forbearance to the extent I have explained, which, under the circumstances of the frontier, and considering the people he had to deal with, it is an abuse of language to call humanity, and which ignorant and arrogant barbarians would not and did not fail to misconstrue into weakness and fear; and if before he authorized promises to be made to the Caffers through, I cannot but consider, under all the circumstances of the case, a most unfortunately selected channel: promises which, from his Excellency's own description of the benefits the fulfilment of them was to confer, most necessarily have excited hopes, the constantly deferred realization of which from month to month could not but generate discontent, and lead at length to doubts of their sincerity; promises, too, which, if the general feeling and belief on the frontier as to their extent had any good foundation, amounted to no less than the restoration to the Caffers of a considerable portion of the coveted territory; if, I repeat, before that system was enjoined, and those promises were made, his Excellency, after having advised and consulted with impartial and unprejudiced men, and such were to be found in the Colony, had then visited the frontier and examined the whole of this most important, and without any doubt perplexing, question, in all its bearings, on the spot, I do believe that what he would not at a whit less have felt not only the justice and humanity, but good policy of conciliation and indulgence, and of establishing and confirming, by every possible means, a friendly intercourse with the Caffers, that he would also have arrived at the conclusion that a reasonable compromise on the part of the great mass of that people must always be regarded as the result of fear, and not a desire for peace; that whilst every should in all our relations with them stand pre-eminently forward, the sword of justice never should be laid aside; that as regarded "degradation and reprisal," the rule of enforcing immediate restitution, or an equivalent before losses amount to an extent that at length compels a commando, is a measure of humanity, and the suspension or abolition of it a premium on degradation; that the admirable "remarks on the best means of preserving the peace of the Colonial frontier," which were communicated to his Excellency by the Rev. Robert Boyce, one of the Wesleyan Methodists, in the month of "March 1834," a gentleman who had long resided amongst them, and knew the Caffres well, were consonant with common sense, humanity and justice; and lastly, that if his Excellency ever did entertain the intention of re-admitting the Caffres to the coveted territory, that one glance at the Fish River or Bosch would have convinced him of the impossibility of doing so, and have satisfied him that such a measure of indulgence was not to be granted to them without not only the risk, but the positive certainty of sacrificing the Districts of Albany and Somerset. I remained five or six days at the Kat River post, visiting the Hottentot settlement and Country in the neighbourhood. Many of the occasions were in a promising state, and the general appearance of the whole certainly very gratifying; but notwithstanding the exertions that had in such a variety of ways been made to remove all impediments to their progress and accelerate their improvement, I was assured by those who could not be mistaken, that latterly the settlement had lost ground, and that the Hottentots—not the Bastards—very many of whom had exhibited at the commencement an energy and anxiety to improve that had not been expected from them, and again fallen off, and had become idle and restless and discontented; and also, that the internal tranquility of the settlement had been destroyed by the mischievous introduction of party feeling and political discussions amongst them.

2795. I am not going to enter upon the question of the vagrant law further than as it relates to the disunion of which I have been speaking in the Hottentot locations, and I have deemed it right to bring this subject under the notice of the Committee, because that disunion is connected with the subsequent Caffre war; and I shall hereafter, I feel certain, convince the Committee that the disturbed state of the Hottentot Locations, arising out of discussions on the vagrant law, was very near proving fatal to them; that when the Caffre war broke out, the Hottentots had been tampered with, and successfully tampered with. (I beg here again to say the Hottentots, and not the Bastards), and that their being so tampered with was clearly considered by the Government, and I have adverted, and that that disunion was the result of most improper (as it appears to me) interference on the part of Mr. H. J. Borchers and Dr. Philip of the London Missionary Society; I conceive that it was impossible that the Hottentots should not have been excited by the memorials addressed by Dr. Philip to the Legislative Council respecting the vagrant law; and the contents of which became publicly known to the Colony; I conceive that it was impossible that they should not have been excited, whose political Meetings were got up by Mr. Reil for the purpose of presenting petitions against the vagrant law; and I conceive that they were likely to be still more excited, when, as I shall prove, a circular letter was addressed by Dr. Philip, the superintendent of the London Missionary Society, to the whole of the clergy under his orders, calling upon them to put up prayers in the midst of their congregations, which congregations consisted almost entirely of this ignorant class of the population, who necessarily would be those most affected by the vagrant law; prayers to the Almighty to avert the evil that was then hanging over the Colony!!!

2796. Chairman. I understood you to say, that you think that the Caffre war was brought on in some degree by the disunion among the Hottentots, as distinct from the Bastards, and that it was occasioned in a great measure by the political agitation of the vagrant law?—I beg pardon; I have not said that the Caffre war was occasioned by any such thing; I have said that the Hottentot locations were endangered considerably at the time of the Caffre war by the political feeling that had been excited there, and that the disunion introduced in discussing the vagrant law, and that the Caffres had taken advantage of that excitement to tamper with, and had successfully tampered with that portion of the settlement that was under Mr. Borchers' influence, being the same portion that had been induced to present a petition to the Legislative Council against the vagrant law.

The Chairman here intimated that the Committee having already come to a resolution, that they would not at present inquire into the subject of the vagrant law, any remarks that the witness had to offer had much better be postponed until such time as they should think it requisite to proceed with that inquiry.

(Extract of a Letter dated Cradock, Sept. 27, 1836.)

"His Honor the Lieut. Governor arrived here yesterday afternoon, at half-past five o'clock. Scarcely had his Honor entered the Village, when firing of guns were heard from all houses, so that the ground shook. Every well-disposed person was glad to see among them a fellow-countryman as the Representative of His Majesty, in the hope that they

may now live peacefully under their vine and fig-tree.—The Village was, with a few exceptions, splendidly illuminated from seven till about twelve o'clock, and had we sooner been informed of His Honor's arrival the illumination would have far surpassed the one given on a former occasion to His Excellency Sir Lowry Cole.—To-morrow His Honor will give audience to the Inhabitants."—(From a Correspondent.)

Original Correspondence.

TO THE EDITOR OF "DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN."

Cape, Oct. 3, 1836.

Sir,—When Dr. Philip was here, I never thought him so great a man as I do now. Many a tear has he made us all shed when telling us about the poor Caffers; how they had been oppressed and plundered before the war; and how the rivers of their native land run red with their blood in fighting against our soldiers with their guns during the war, while they had only reeds and sticks in their hands to defend themselves with. The Doctor always took their part from first to last; and for this, and his book of Researches, he has got the ill-will of the Colonists. I deplore the circumstance that the Governor took offence at our Divine Teacher, as Sir Benjamin is said to be as humane a gentleman as can be expected of a Peninsula Officer, accustomed to fighting and to feel and talk about the honor and glory of the British arms, which is all nonsense with savages, in making peace with whom it is not necessary to stand upon ceremonies; it was, therefore, a pity he did not take Doctor Philip up with him to the Frontier, to be employed as a Peace-maker, and to give heavenly consolation to those who were mortally wounded in the war.

We cannot but approve of the good-natured plan of not shooting directly at the misguided savages; for when they err, it is from their ignorance. The Missionaries have not yet had time enough to teach them better; but had the war not broken out, Dr. Philip had a grand scheme in contemplation, in concert with America, by which he would have been enabled to have converted them all to Christianity.

The Doctor's Researches in South Africa will, I think, be printed in letters of gold by Hottentots, when he himself will wear a Crown of Glory upon his head. Plato does not say a word too much in his favor; his wanderings on earth for the spread of the Gospel, have exceeded those of St. Paul; and for the evil doings of the Colonists against the Caffers, he called down "divine vengeance upon them, as children of the devil and enemies of righteousness." In the good cause of the Aborigines, his words always flowed like honey from his lips. I am sure he would rather die than tell a lie; and the way the people of England received him, after his very shameful trial here, shewed that he was most unjustly condemned; indeed, he might have impeached all the four Judges that were on the Bench; but he is the man of God; he returned good for evil, and freely forgave them; and the Lord compensated him, and sent him more money than the fine they awarded.

As to *Observer*, and *Albani*, and *Miles*, and *Ferret*, and *Hope*, and *Mackay*, and others, who write against him in the *liberal Cape Newspapers*, he will disdain to answer any one of their letters, as he is doing the work of the Lord, who sent him; and *Honestus too*, (who I take to be my neighbour, and whom people see or know very little of since Dr. Philip went), has not only succeeded from our principles, but does not seem to care any longer about the education of the ignorant Natives. You don't know, perhaps, that Dr. Philip proposed to go up himself to make peace between the Governor and the Caffers; and, as a Minister of the Gospel, they would have listened to him. When he heard the Governor had taken the poor creatures country from them, he tore his hair, and was heard to exclaim, "Oh, the oppressed beings! my heart bleeds for them—what will become of them?" It was really a most affecting scene. We know, from the highest authority, that there are angelic spirits sent to minister to those who are heirs of salvation, and that they are peculiarly attached to holy individuals, to guard, protect, and instruct them. It must be soothing and consoling to Dr. Philip to feel that he is so guarded and instructed in performing the services of Him who sent him; and it is his firm belief in this special grace which supports him under and reconciles him to those dispensations of Providence, which have so often called him to resign his domestic bliss, and other earthly enjoyments, when required "to be up and doing the work of the Lord."

I devoutly hope that a Subscription will be set on foot for two pieces of Plate, for Dr. Philip and Mr. Fairbairn,—I am sure that we alone should be able to raise such a sum, and get such a number of respectable names, as would convince the Colony of the merits of these two patriotic and philanthropic men.

Sir,—The fustian sentiments, and political schemes of your correspondent PLATO, are so infernally bad, that I do not wonder at your mistaking the author of them for PLUTO, of whom we read—"That he received as his lot the kingdom of HELL, and whatever lies under the earth, upon which he became the God of the Infernal Regions: That as all the Goddesses refused to marry him, he ravished Proserpine, and carried her off to his tartarean abodes, where she became his wife, and Queen of Hell: That he was a hard-hearted and inexorable monster, with a slobbery mouth, and hypocritical countenance; and that black victims were the only sacrifices offered to him."

To be honest with you, Mr. Editor, I cannot reconcile it to my judgment, that PLATO's letter is any thing but a ROX upon the PHILIPPICS, written either by yourself, or some wag; for it appears to me a tissue of ironical satire from beginning to end; turning into ridicule at once the fatuous credulity of the *Observer's* portion of the roguish leaders of it. In the light of a ROX the letter is inimitable, and your correspondent truly a PLATO: As such, it has succeeded to perfection; that both the rogues and gulls have swallowed the bait, and fallen into the snare of approving of its sentiments and politics; and they are chuckling at its having been got inserted into your paper, considering it a *knock-out* upon reply to HONESTUS. The only doubt they entertain is, to whom to attribute the honor of so monstrously creditable a production.

If it be not fictitious, the writer has marked himself down for a KNAVE of a good kind. Knaave, if he be imposing such impious and poisonous doctrines upon the bigoted Disserters, 'twould, if he know not the preposterousness of his positions. As a voracious letter, there is more *knavery* than *folly* in the composition; but it is too bungling for a clever

knave, and too clever for a silly fool;—its absurdity and business must be palpable to every one of common sense here, however well adapted it may be for the home market.

Its style must be allowed to be strictly in conformity to the language and sentiments of the UNION CHAPEL CONGREGATION, and to the politics of the PHILIP FACTION; but the evulgation of this RELIGIO-POLITICAL GALLIMAUFY, purporting to be the creed of that congregation and faction, could not surely have been sanctioned by the Superintendent and his Council.

It is blasphemous to place Dr. Philip next in estimation to Jesus Christ, (his proximity being rather to *Old Nick*), and it is indignity to the name of Wilberforce, to couple him with Buxton and Philip;—the former was truly a Philanthropist, but the two latter are mere dealers in cant, hypocrisy, and lumbung.

In regard to the political dealings of Dr. Philip and his coadjutors, with the Caffers;—after they had maddened them by their traitorous conferences and writings (Pringle's Poem for instance), Philip's advice to them to be still was only a Jesuitical POOL'S TRAP, to keep his and their necks out of the halter. To rely upon the London and Glasgow Missionaries for keeping the Caffers still, would be trusting to arrogant impotency;—indeed, mischievous exhortations from their mether garments, such as were *friggid* by Colonel Cox's detachment when it relieved the party from Burn's Hill, is the only result to be anticipated from employing Platonians as peace-makers when the barbarians are in the Bush.

When they had the best opportunity in the beginning of the war, what proof did these CLAUSTRALS give us of their VAUNTED INFLUENCE?

AFFAIRS OF THE FRONTIER.

(From the "Graham's Town Journal," Oct. 6, 1836.)

This frontier still continues in a most deplorable and unsettled state. Nobody feels secure, and some of the oldest and most respectable inhabitants entertain serious intentions of removing to a situation of greater safety.

Despatches from the Commandant have been transmitted to the Lieutenant Governor, detailing the numerous robberies and increasing audacity of the Caffre tribes, but to these we have not learnt that His Honor has returned any answer; and although he has been for some days past expected in town, he has not yet arrived, nor have we any certain intelligence of his movements. We have heard that His Honor is waiting the arrival of final instructions from home, as, until he receives them, he is not authorised to enter into any definite arrangements with the Caffre chiefs. In the mean time they are, it is said, growing daily more audacious in their conduct and more unreasonable in their expectations and demands from the colonial Government.

The most important affair we have heard during the week is the robbery from Mr. Hobson, at Port Peddie, of Fifty head of cattle. The thieves attacked the herdman at noon-day, wounded him in the leg, and made off with the booty. Several daring thefts have been committed in that neighbourhood; the cattle also which have been stolen from that part have been traced into Cafferland in that direction, and

into the possession of either Botman's or Eno's people. It is said that the primary cause of these active robberies is the distress now prevailing in Cafferland from the extreme draught, and which indeed is a plea that is urged annually. A Caffre will not, if he can possibly help it, slaughter his own cattle for subsistence,—and hence when their milk fails, the flocks and herds of the colonists are his support till the return of a more favorable season.

No wagon can pass into the New Province with safety, for not only are the oxen stolen during the day, but even when they travel to the wagon at night they are cut loose and carried off. Several robberies of this kind have been reported within the last few days. As an instance of the precarious state in which our farmers live, we may cite the following:—A person named Potgieter, living on the Fish River, informed us a day or two since, that he had come to town for the purpose of reporting to the authorities his having seen the footmarks of at least thirty Caffers on his farm, and as his neighbours had all abandoned their places, he was naturally alarmed for the safety of his family.—We have learned since, that during the time he was in town his shepherd was accosted when in the field by a party of Caffers, who coolly told him it was their intention to drive off his master's cattle. Whether this threat has been executed we are not informed, but the poor man now declares his intention of abandoning his home, and moving to a situation of greater security.
