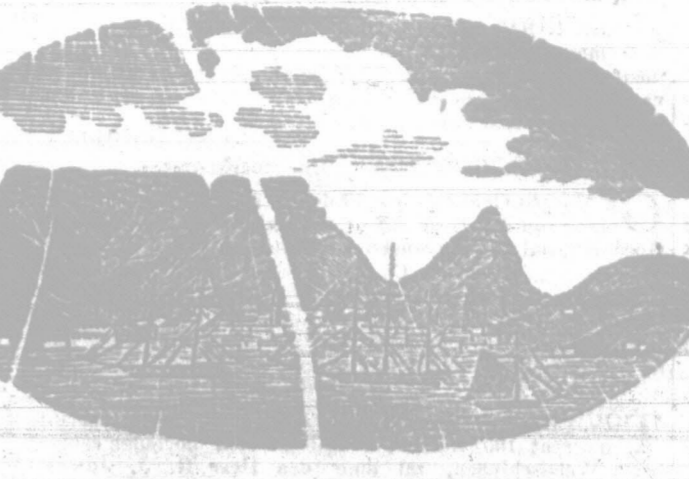

COMMISSION OF INQUIRY.

"If I had a Province to chastise," said Frederick the Great, "I should put it under the Government of Philosophers."

Cape Town, Nov. 21, 1836. Sir, I have perused with much interest, the celebrated despatch of your Lordship, dated the 26th Dec. 1835, in which he lays the whole blame of the late War upon the Colonists, and local authorities on the suspicious statements of irresponsible persons, who "from various motives," have furnished him with their *ex parte* views of the subject, whose "credibility" he admits, might be questioned by the accused party, but whose names he cannot reveal for fear of incurring a charge of "a breach of confidence."

Notwithstanding the (un-English) use which his Lordship has made, (or what is by far more probable, which has been made for him,) of evidence from so dangerous a source, the Colonists I believe, are yet ready to admit that his intention is above suspicion; they consider he has been led by the arts of ambitious and designing men, the Philip's of the Fairbairns and others, against his better judgement into an erroneous and unjust estimate of the Colonial Character, and which he will be ready and the first to correct when our petitions shall reach England, and they rely upon the Honor of British Statesmen, for a full open investigation of the charges brought against them, they ask to be confronted with their accusers face to face, to be judged by honest men, not partisans or politicians,—"a fair field and no favour," and they are fearless of the result.

Having gone over the despatch in question with much care and compared its positions with the knowledge I possess, with works upon the Colonial History and such documentary evidence as was within my reach, I have arrived at the following conclusions which will be found widely at variance with those come to by the Right Honorable Secretary for the Colonies, upon the testimony before him, and as I hope the just demands of the Colonists for investigation and redress, will not fall upon deaf or averted ears, I shall place these conclusions on record in your columns, with an indication of the general nature of the proofs that are available for their support, pledging myself (should I then be in the Colony,) whenever the commission shall arrive upon our unfortunate shores to supply it with information as to the precise point where the proofs are to be collected.

First, That the Country from which the Caffers have been successively and gradually removed, that is between the Chantoms and the Keiskama Rivers, was never their Ancient, lawful, undisputed, or peaceable possession, but that they were aliens on the soil, and invaders, equally with the Christian Colonists, on the lands rightfully belonging to the Hottentot nation, whose territories extended far to even to the eastward of the Kei River.

To be proved by reference to the earliest documents in the Colonial Archives,—by the admission of the Caffers themselves, by the oral traditions of the Hottentots,—by the early travellers—and above all, by the physical evidence in the still existing Hottentot names of Mountains, Rivers, and other great Geographical Features of the Country, extending far into the interior of what is at present denominated Caffraria.

Second, That the ceaseless, wanton, and intolerable outrages of the Caffers on the suffering Colonists in the Zuurveld, were the causes of their expulsion from the Countries over which they had unlawfully, and in a warlike manner, spread themselves, in disregard of treaties, and engagements, in defiance of threats, and in spite of every lenient measure attempted by the Government and inhabitants, to provide for their quiet and peaceable removal.

To be proved by the evidence procurable in the Colonial Office at Cape Town, and that in the Frontier Districts, from which it may be predicted, that, even, it will refer to individuals, a complete exculpation from the charges of oppressing the Caffers people will be obtained. It is to be observed, at the same time, that a very small portion of these important documents appears to have been consulted by the Commissioners of Inquiry, or published in their collection of papers.

Third, That our incursions into Caffraria have been agreeable to a well defined understanding with the principal chief, Galka,—recommended by persons able to judge of the subject, and were not at variance with Caffer practice, that they were seldom, if ever, undertaken without the best evidence being obtained of actual robbery,—were always sent in to retake stolen property, and not for the purpose of spoliation, and that the fact of the existence of great plunderings in the Colony by their people is admitted by their Chiefs.

To prove this, reference is to be had to official returns of patrols and commands of cattle stolen and recovered,—to the treaties with Galka,—to the recorded opinions of many intelligent and practical men, who have been consulted on the subject at various periods,—to the testimony of persons who have written on, or are acquainted with, the customs of the Caffers,—to the Caffer Chiefs, and especially to Kno, Botma, and Sibaya.

Fourth, That the Caffers have not been confined within a comparatively narrow space where pasturage for their cattle could not readily be procured, but on the contrary, that their Country extended to the Keiskama River, is fully adequate to the support of its population by its climate, its abundant streams and its fertility, in all which it has a decided superiority over the Colonial Territory.

Fifth, That the chief causes of the late War are to be found, 1. In the insatiable lust for cattle by the Caffers and not

in consequence of seizures of territory or unjust inroads into Caffraria by the Colonists.

2. In the indiscretions (if not worse) committed by the Rev. the Superintendent of the London Society's Missions, and the Editor of the *South African Commercial Advertiser*, during their visit to the Eastern Frontier in 1830, when they headed dormant regrets for the cession of the lands between the Great Fish and the Keiskama Rivers, forfeited by the Nation for their bloody and ruinous inroad of 1819,—by entering into dangerous discussions on the subject with the Chiefs, and publicly stating their belief in the injustice of the Colonists, and the wrongs of the Caffers.

3. In the subsequent visits of the said Superintendent and others, both to Kat River and Cafferland, and the intemperate writings in the *Commercial Advertiser*, which chronicles these visits, and defended their objects,—by which the Caffers were encouraged to an urgent and increasingly insolent demand for their justly forfeited lands,—and the Hottentots excited to disaffection by ill-advised and encouraged contentions on a proposed Vagrant Law.

4. In the consequent seditious and dangerous practices at a part of the Kat River Settlement,—the inhabitants of which encouraged the Caffers to the invasion,—pledged themselves to support them in their inroads,—engaged to burn Fort Willshire,—and supplied the Caffers with arms.

The proofs to be gathered from the recorded evidence of the Caffers Chiefs, Mako, Tyali, Congo, Pato, Kama, Kno, Botma, Galka, &c., &c., and the Caffers Kno and Nomo,—from the statements of the Commissioners and the Caffers Majoce, strengthened by the Chiefs Pato, Kama, and Congo,—from the written statements of several Missionaries residing with the Caffers,—from the Rev. Mr. Reid himself, from the columns of the *Advertiser Newspaper*—and the Parliamentary papers lately published.

Sixth, That so far from the treatment of the Traders and Missionaries by the Caffers having been friendly, or that their lives were secure, it is known, that for many months previous to the war, they were insulted, robbed, their dwellings burnt, their personal safety threatened by the Chiefs, murders and assaults were committed on them, and that had not the Missionaries and surviving Traders been rescued by our Troops, after having fled from the places at which they had been permitted to reside, they would all have been indiscriminately murdered.

To be proved by the depositions of the Traders,—their Memorial for redress,—the representations of the Missionaries,—and the testimony of Tyali, Kno, Yo-Yo, and the Hottentot deponent Louis Arnoldus.

Seventh, That the war was treacherously commenced in a season of supposed peace, by the Caffers, without any warning, which it is their custom to give; that not until long days after the unexpected invasion, when numerous murders had been committed on the surprised and defenceless inhabitants, the whole frontier swept of its cattle and other property, and the greater number of the habitations consumed by fire; did the Chiefs Tyali and Mako declare themselves belligerents when they sent in certain articles of grievances, replete with exaggeration and full of falsehood, and declaring they had left off hostilities, which was denied by the Missionary employed to prepare their manifesto; that the war was commenced at a time when the Rev. Dr. Philip, as he has admitted, had communicated friendly messages to the Chiefs, who declared themselves satisfied, although they had been for more than nine months previously preparing for the inroads, at which they were then actively engaged, and from which they never desisted, or intended to desist.

To be proved by the depositions of Tyali and Kno,—by the statements of grievances of Mako and Tyali,—by the letters of the Missionary accompanying the Caffers, and the communication of these statements to the Governor's Despatches which have been printed, and Dr. Philip's admissions, and numerous other accessible papers.

Eighth, That the Chief Hintza was a legitimate object, first of suspicion, and then of the war which was carried into his country and against him;—for robbing the Traders with his own hands; for the outrages permitted by him against the Traders in his jurisdiction, and which he would not redress; for his inexplicable conduct regarding the murder of Purcell; for his insults to the Missionaries whom he had encouraged to reside near him,—his intention to destroy the Station and murder the Missionary and his Assistant, of which they were forewarned by his (Hintza's) great wife Noma, and put on guard by another Chief; for his unusual communications with the border Chiefs Mako and Tyali several months previous to and up to the time of the inroad; for covertly aiding and abetting the invasion, for encouraging and approving the war, and promising himself to turn out in case of need, as he needed for the remote Chief Fak-o to engage in hostilities for offering the inland Traders shelter in his territories should they be driven out by the border Tribes; and for receiving in his country the cattle of the border Tribes preparatory to the war, and afterwards the stolen herds from the Colony, immense numbers of which were driven, by his orders, into his territory, and distributed among his people to take charge of; for allowing large bodies of his warriors fully two-thirds to join with the frontier Caffers, and engage in the invasion and war, many of whom were identified in the Colony; for refusing to assist our forces, or to intercept the stolen cattle, but declaring his intention to remain neutral between the Tribes and British, the latter of whom had so lately saved him and his people from overwhelming destruction by the Fetanias; for concealing himself to prevent an interview with Van Wyk when he was required to procure from Hintza a categorical reply to the question whether he was at peace or war, and to prove his sincerity by separating himself to a distance from Mako, preventing him and his people from entering his territory with their plunder, and by sending word to the Colonial cattle which had been driven into it, all of which he craved.

To be proved by the depositions of Traders taken before the war,—statements of Missionaries,—Memorial of Traders,—Report of the Government Agent, Mr. Fynn,—by various documents and their inclusions issued during the war,—by the depositions of the deponent Louis Arnoldus, and those of the Caffers Mako, Tyali, Botma, Kno, Galka, Kno, Onze, Yo Yo, Unanusi, and the acknowledgements of Hintza himself.

Ninth, That the conduct of the warfare was marked by no gratuitous aggravations of the usually attendant miseries, or that it was waged in a spirit of revenge and retribution; that no such complaint was made by the Caffers, but that they acknowledged in many instances the justice of the retribution,—confessed to having received several messages to make peace, but fought on to procure better terms; that women and children were invariably spared, fed and well treated; that on entering Hintza's country the general orders were of the mildest and most humane character, such as would have been issued in civilized countries in a similar state, and that it was impossible to take prisoners, as a Caffer never surrenders but with his life.

To be proved by the papers and orders issued during the war,—the testimony of persons actually engaged, and the depositions of the Caffers Kno, Onze, Unanusi, and others.
