Cape Town, Aug. 14, 1834. Dear Sir,--We have received your letter by Mr. Walker, and also that by James Hudson--so much to tell you that I scarce know which to begin--You have before this, no doubt, heard of the strange proceedings in this land by the Caffers; they have for a year past been getting worse and worse, until at last it has come to murder outright. The circumstance of the death of Mr. Parcell is already in Town, as also that of Mr. Newb being wounded in the thigh by a fellow named Camas, you may recollect, at the place you lived; so you see these occurrences were just right and left of me: I have three different times been all served the same; once in particular was a very serious hair-breadth escape; and threats of hanging and burning have been so common that we are somewhat hardened to it, so that it makes but little impression, knowing that words do not break our bones. We have a little consolation that through the aid made by the foregoing affairs, the Caffers are a little mended, but I fear not sufficient to give much confidence; for nothing short of downright punishment on their whole race and country will bring them to their senses; but that I suppose will not happen, as it would have the effect of destroying the trade altogether, and ruin all engaged in it. (Signed) J. ROWLES.

DUPLICATE.] A 2. Extract of a Letter from Field-Commandant VAN WYK to the Hon. Lieut.-Colonel SMITH, Commanding the Forces at Graham's Town, dated Bekitah-Whitery, in Koonap, 25th January, 1835.

I beg also to inform you, that, on the 25th instant, I fell in with a Caffer by name Zoolo, who stated himself to be First Captain of the Chief Hintza, who had sent him to me with the message--"that he (Hintza) was aware of the effects of assistance rendered to him by the Colonial Government against his enemies the Fet-janics, and that he had nothing in the least to say to the present Invasion of the Colony, and that as yet there were none of the stolen cattle to be found in his territories." My answer to which was, that if he had not taken a part in the Invasion he had no occasion to fear harm at our hands, and that Hintza must come himself to me. The Captain then said it was his master's wish, and that he should come immediately. In the event of his arrival, I now beg the favor of your speedy orders in what manner I am to act in such case, for which purpose I have given orders that six men must await your orders at Fort Beaufort, so as to bring them with despatch as well as safety into my hands.

DUPLICATE.] A 3. Head-Quarter's, Graham's Town, 1st February, 1835.

Sir,--I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 25th instant, which having submitted to His Excellency the Governor and Commander-in-Chief, I am directed by him to request that you will proceed in your purpose of a personal communication with the Chief Hintza, and that you will therein say to him on the part of His Excellency the Governor, that he (the Governor) is disposed to believe in his (Hintza's) friendly professions, inasmuch as the Government have observed a good faith and mutual assistance at his hands; that now is the time to prove it, and strengthen the bonds of friendship between us; that in this view of the case the Governor expects at the hands of the Chief Hintza the same proofs of his friendship, which the Government in the case of the Fetcani afforded to him, and that he (Hintza) should therefore--

1st. Intercept the cattle stolen from the Colony by the Tribes of Tyali, Macomo, Botman, Eno, and others, and send it back from the Kei and Buffalo, in order to its being returned.

2d. That he should state when, where, and with what forces he will be prepared to co-operate on his side in the Government war against the Tribes of the hostile Chieftains which will speedily be commenced.

Upon these principles and basis it is His Excellency's desire that you would be pleased to proceed, and I am to assure you that the Governor has full confidence in your judgment and discretion, and he leaves you to carry on this matter according to your own opinion and ability.

Whenever you have concluded this interview you will be so good to communicate with me immediately for His Excellency's information, and to offer your unreserved opinion of the Chief Hintza's deportment when in communication with you.--I have, &c. &c. (Signed) H. G. SMITH, Colonel, Chief of the Staff.

DUPLICATE.] A 4. Basterworth, Feb. 9, 1835.

The Colonial estate is coming in by thousands into this country, brought by Hintza's people, and that with the greatest impunity; indeed the two principal Chiefs next to Hintza have a quantity of them on their own place at this present moment, not to take care of them till asked for, as they will not own they belong to the Colony, though we know better; I have seen five droves of Colonial cattle pass here in one day, besides horses, all brought by Hintza's people; added to this, it appears Hintza sent men to order the plunder of the two last Trading Stations belonging to Fowles & Co., on the other side of the Kei, occupied by Jukes & Horton, which was immediately put into execution, and the men turned adrift; and were I to tell you of their sufferings it would make your heart ache; suffice it to say they stripped them naked all to their shirts, and left them in that state for half a month, both night and day, not even allowing them so much as a knowers to cover themselves at night, and then drove into a small cut house, without a bit of fire, and almost starved them to death, besides many other indignities too numerous and disgusting to mention, and this all done by Hintza's people; indeed, it is pretty certain that the subject of the destruction of this school has been in agitation for a long time among Hintza and his people, but it appears some of his principal men will not agree to it; he sent us word, formally to say, he had issued orders for the whole of his people to go up to him to the Amers, in order to make rooms, and give a country to the Amasambies when driven by the English. This you may depend upon is true. I spoke to the principal Captain here on the subject; he said that the wives and children of the Amasambies, and also their cattle, were here; and also they were related, and therefore they were bound to give them a country when pursued; indeed, nothing but fear and cowardice have prevented

Hintza not throwing off the mask, and joining the enemy. Vandanna, the Chief of the Tambookies, has sent professing his friendship with the Colony, but we hear that a great many Colonial cattle are already in his country. What appears ready for any outrage, and if the Government do not strike a decisive blow with a sufficient force all is over, both with the Colony and ourselves. The Caffers say that the English always thought them deficient both in courage and power, but that they have let them see it is only necessary for them to stand up and show themselves, and the English all are obliged to fly.--I fear that it will be with some difficulty, as well as with the loss of much life, before things are brought to a settlement, from the determined disposition of the Caffers.

DUPLICATE.] A 5. Koonap, Feb. 12, 1835.

Sir,--In my report to you of the 3d instant, I mentioned having forwarded an Express to the Caffer Chief Hintza. I have now the honor to inform you, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, of the arrival in my encampment of the said Hintza, having a retinue of thirty-four unarmed Caffers, amongst which were three Captains, Elasje, Zoobo, and Landoo, with the Tambookies Captains, Mapassa, Julie, and Magos, with one interpreter by name Coebo, living on the place of Mr. C. Mulder. Having assured Hintza he had nothing whatever to fear, and that he must speak the true feeling of his heart; having read and explained to him that portion of your letter of the 1st instant in reference to himself, he gave the following answers to my questions.

Q. Are you acquainted with the names of the Captains who have made the present inroad into the Colony?--A. Yes, Macomo, Tyali, Eno, Botman, Pato, and Gnoebo. Q. Where are Macomo and Tyali at present?--A. I am given to understand they are in the Witte Kei. Q. Are you aware of the Governor being at present in Graham's Town?--A. I am not aware of it.

The Governor is in Graham's Town; the present head of that Government who sent the great Commando to assist you against the Fetcani.

He (Hintza) still recollects the assistance at that time rendered him by the Government, and should the Fetcani again attack him, he will apply again for assistance to the same quarter, namely, the Colonial Government.

Q. Do you not think the same Government, who rendered you such effective assistance against your enemies, desire now at your hands the same assistance when they are attacked by another enemy?--A. I wish to know the reason of the war.

The Caffers, without any cause, have invaded the Colony, burned the houses, murdered the defenceless inmates, and driven away the cattle from such farms there as had no force to withstand them; and had you wished to know the occasion of the war, you could as highest Chief of Cafferland have learned it from Macomo or Tyali.

He (Hintza) will not assist--shall remain neutral because the war is between two brothers, Gailka's descendants, and the English, who always lived together as brothers; that he knows no reason for the war.

12th February, 1835. Q. Will you assist in delivering the stolen cattle?--A. I cannot distinguish the stolen cattle from those belonging to other Caffers; but if the Colonists can point out what belongs to them I shall render them assistance; at the same time giving the Caffers instructions how they are to act.

Q. How shall you render assistance?--A. I shall send word to my people, who might be under the invaders with stolen cattle, that they must return, or abide the consequences; has already sent word to Julie, Tambookie Captain, he must not allow the Caffers with the stolen cattle to come amongst his--not knowing the reason of the war. That the day after his arrival at home he shall send a message to the same effect to Vanto, Jonop, and Booko. I shall contribute 1000 (one thousand men) to assist the Commando; and immediately on his arrival at home he will call a Council of his Captains to hear their opinion, and whenever such is finished he shall send off messengers to the School of Silow at Klip Plat for the purpose of informing me of the circumstance.

Q. Have you any message to send, or anything to ask from His Excellency?--A. I can send no message to, nor ask anything from the Governor; the misdeeds of the Caffers being too great, and my being King of Cafferland, they flee to, and incorporate themselves amongst, my Caffers, whether I will or not.

That he will assist the Government, otherwise it might happen to fall on his head. And that his present place of abode is above the white Kie River.

I am informed by Mr. Charles Mulder, the Messenger whom I sent to Hintza, and the above-mentioned Coebo, the Interpreter, that the Caffers belonging to Tyali and Macomo are lying along the Swart Kie, from Windvogelberg to near the Klip-plant School, in great force; if you will give me orders to move from this to Oos Kraal River, I shall then be in a better situation to afford you correct information,--from these circumstances I find it highly necessary that one Commando must enter and proceed along the "Kie"; and should you choose, this Commando must do it; it is much nearer from Oos Kraal River than from this place; but previous to the Commando moving, I must request a further supply of ammunition--twenty muskets and bayonets, four tents, and about half a ream foolscap paper. Should you be enabled to give me these supplies, you will oblige me by sending an order for the same, and say where I am to procure it.

Erasmus has with him 75 men, over the 150 burghers which Major Bureby detained there, until further orders from you; I, therefore, request you will cause the surplus men to be forwarded to me.

Amongst the horses belonging to Hintza's retinue, there are two almost blind, the one by John Joseph Smith, and the other by Gerrit Kruger, P. but I did not think it advisable to mention it either to Hintza or his people.

My opinion respecting Hintza's demeanour whilst the conference was proceeding, is; his answers were equivocal and evasive in the extreme, and his promises of rendering assistance not to be depended upon; his present place of residence, where I am certain he never lived before; his having forsaken his former place of abode; in moving to within such a short distance from our Frontiers with so many of his people, are sufficient reasons for keeping a most strict watch over all his movements,--he has this day left for his own country.

PS.--I have also the honor to inform you, that having asked the Tambookies Captain, Mapassa, if he would render assistance if required, his answer was, by no means, he never

having received any assistance from the Colonial Government.--I have, &c. (Signed) S. J. VAN WYK, Field-Com.

DUPLICATE.] A 6. Extract of a Letter from Captain A. B. ARMSTRONG to Colonel SMITH, Chief of the Staff.

Camp Adelaide, 13th Feb. 1835.

Sir,--Yesterday I rode over to Van Wyk's encampment, where I saw Hintza and Mapassa. Van Wyk had previously held a conference with this Chief, and I became acquainted with the purport of it, from having read the questions and answers which passed between them, and which were to have been forwarded to you this morning. I did not think it necessary or delicate to interrogate him further, but suggested to Van Wyk proposing to Hintza, that he should have one of his principal Captains with Van Wyk, as a pledge for the sincerity of his professions of good feeling towards the Colony.

Hintza made excuses, the foremost one that his Captains could not make themselves understood to us. I proposed an interpreter, assuring him that his Captains should be treated in the kindest manner, and should receive handsome presents. Hintza said he would consult his Heemraden on the subject when he returned. I wrote to Mr. Bonaty, requesting he would urge the point when Hintza reached Klip Plat, to assure Hintza of the good faith of our Government, &c.--Mr. Bonaty speaks the Caffer language, has a good deal of ability, and will, I am confident, exert himself in that particular.

Van Wyk and I agree in opinion, that it yet remains to be proved whether Hintza's professions can be relied on.

Weighing every circumstance that has come to my knowledge regarding Hintza, and finding it to be the case that he has not yet moved to his own country, but remains with his people in a position nearer the Colony, and farther from his country than ever he had been before; I am of opinion, that if we do not meet with reverse, which I do not for a moment anticipate, Hintza will make a merit of assisting us; but should we use small Commandos, and incur such risks as may give confidence to the enemy, I think it not at all unlikely, that Hintza will give his support to Tyali, Macomo, and the others, as it is the general opinion, according to Caffer customs, that he must have sanctioned their hostile proceedings.

I feel borne out in this opinion, from Van Wyk having at first asked Hintza for his assistance, and from Hintza having remarked that we should first try what we could do ourselves, and that if we required his aid he would give it us; I am of opinion, that when he was pressed upon by the Fetcani he first tried to contend with them himself, but did not think of asking for assistance until he found they were too powerful for him.

COMMISSION OF INQUIRY ON THE SPOT.

Extract from the Evidence before the Committee on Aborigines, by Col. WADDE, 20th April, 1836.

"I do not pretend to state that instances of misconduct and outrage may not have occurred on the part of those on Commando within the last 10 or 15 years; but I do assert, that instances have been very rare; and in the most direct and unequivocal manner I deny the suppression of all and every statement or representation, proceed it from what quarter it may, which can be said to justify the descriptions contained in the above extracts." Pringle, Kay, Stockenstrom, and others) "and on the part, both of the Colonial Government and Colonists, I protest against the 'representations' or 'statements' in question being admitted as in any degree proving the correctness of the accusations with which they have been assailed, without a formal and public investigation there, where it alone can be instituted, with any reasonable hope of the truth of every such charge being ascertained, into every case of outrage or oppression that has been brought forward. With the greatest possible respect for this Committee, I deny that they are in a position to arrive at a satisfactory conclusion (viz.), to elicit the whole truth, and thereby do justice to all parties. Let a Commission proceed to investigate upon the spot; let the accusers and accused be confronted; and the Colonists will not, I dare affirm, be found to shrink from an inquiry which they have, over and over again, challenged and solicited. Let a commission of competent and unprejudiced men be granted, and I feel well assured that the inhabitants will stand acquitted in the eyes of their fellow subjects, of the foul charges which have been so unsparingly and unhesitatingly preferred, and so credulously--nay, I must say so unjustly--received in this country, as substantiated, without a single tittle of evidence having been heard on the part of the accused."

Original Correspondence.

TO THE EDITOR OF "DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN."

Sir,--The case of Mr. Adriaan Cloete, for assaulting Mr. John Fairbairn in the public street of Cape Town, will still be in the recollection of the public, allow me to state a case of assault, committed on the high road between Klipmuts and the Paarl, by Mr. Enslin, on the person of Mr. Minnaar, which was transmitted to His Majesty's Attorney-General, and returned by him to the Clerk of the Peace of Stellenbosch, to be tried before the Resident Magistrate. It appeared from the evidence and views reported, that Mr. Minnaar, on his way to the Paarl, was assaulted by Mr. Enslin, who was on his way to Stellenbosch; the latter first held his stick, of an iron thickness, under Minnaar's nose, which Minnaar, apparently a weak person, pushed away and rode on; that Enslin galloped after him, and gave him a blow with the stick on his head, breaking his hat, and causing a wound on the back part of his head, which bled profusely. The broken hat was produced, on which the blood marks were still visible. Minnaar also received a blow on his cheek bone, two blows over his shoulders, as appeared from the blood marks, one across the other, a grazing stroke on his neck, and bruises on his arm, which was discolored. Doctor Muntingh also added, that had the blow on the cheek-bone been an inch and a half higher, it would have been mortal. Mr. Enslin was sentenced to pay a fine of £3, and to be eight days imprisoned. Query,--which case was the most severe, Cloete's or Enslin's?--not only on account of the manner and intention wherewith, but also of the place where.

This Mr. Enslin had been fined £4 some weeks before, at the Paarl, for assaulting another person.

Cape Town, Dec. 5, 1836.

Sir,--On Thursday last a criminal prosecution took place in the Resident Magistrate's Court at Stellenbosch, for an assault committed, on the high road, by Mr. Enslin. The case was clearly proved; and after its close the Magistrate desired the defendant to retire, because he wanted a few minutes to himself to read over the preparatory information. About half an hour after, the defendant was again called in, and sentenced to pay a fine of £3, and to be imprisoned for eight days;--the defendant paid the fine, and stated his intention of bringing the case in review; for which reason the Magistrate suspended the imprisonment. This caused some conversation, and opinions I presume, were asked, whether the defendant should be confined or not, notwithstanding his intention of bringing the case in review. I say I presume, for I saw Ordinances, Books, Rules of Court, &c., read, and several gentlemen talking with the Magistrate on the subject, while the defendant was desired to wait outside the Court. The bell was rung for clearing the Court, and the doors closed. What then happened between those persons who were allowed to remain with the Magistrate, I cannot positively say, but the defendant having been recalled, the Magistrate stated, that, as his opinion differed from that of the Clerk of the Peace, regarding the staying of the sentence, he would consequently take the opinion,--whether of the Supreme Court or the Bar. I don't recollect on the subject; but that the defendant should, in the mean time, enter into a recognisance to appear, whenever called upon; to which the defendant consented. If any thing be incorrect in this statement, I hope some other person, who understands the Dutch language better than I do, will correct me, as I am but a poor Dutch scholar, and the whole of the proceedings, except the observations of the Public Prosecutor, were carried on in the Dutch language.
