TO THE EDITOR OF "DE ZUID-AFRIKAAN."

INSOLVENT LAW.

Cape Town, Oct. 12, 1840.
Sir,—I read with pleasure in your last number the letter signed "A Capitalist," and though I fully agree with his opinions, I take the liberty to draw the attention of those interested, to the following additions to said law, which, however simply suggested, I feel convinced will, if supported by your observations, not be lost sight of.—I would, namely, propose, "That any insolvent, who cannot prove his insolvency by his books, be immediately considered to have wilfully become insolvent, with intent to defraud his creditors, and be forthwith placed into the hands of the Attorney General, for the purpose of being criminally tried; and that such person, after conviction (trifling as his punishment may be), should never be entitled to his rehabilitation." Such a measure would deter persons from carrying on business beyond their means or ability, and I am positively of opinion, that if a few examples were set, the Public would be able to transact business with less fear, and in a more regular manner.—It might be asserted, "The insolvent is liable to an examination, and if found guilty, the law has provided for such cases." But, I may be allowed to ask, who is actually the suffering party? Is it not the unfortunate creditor, who is obliged to pay the expenses of the examination of the insolvent who commonly evades the well deserved punishment, by saying, "I have no books, and therefore cannot state the cause of this or that transaction;" and who, moreover, procures his rehabilitation within a short time, and carries on business to a greater extent than he did before the surrender of his estate.—All this, of course, would not take place if the insolvent were compelled to prove his transactions by his books.

I am also of opinion, that every creditor in an insolvent estate should swear to the correctness of his claim at the time of his filing the same, in order thereby to prevent any false claims being set in, which are generally filed by the friends of the insolvent, in order thereby to get him rehabilitated the sooner.—I am,

ANOTHER CAPITALIST.

REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF SOMERSET HOSPITAL.

ESTABLISHMENT.

The establishment to consist of one surgeon in charge, one assistant surgeon and resident medical officer,—one clerk and steward,—one male lunatics' keeper,—one female lunatics' nurse,—one hospital wardenmaster,—three ward attendants,—one nurse,—one cook,—one washer woman,—one porter,—and one messenger.

In addition to the above, an honorary consulting physician and consulting surgeon, who will assist the medical officers of the establishment with their opinion in extreme cases, when required.—On all occasions when a capital operation is deemed necessary, and time will permit, these officers are invariably to be consulted as to its propriety.

The surgeon and assistant surgeon to perform their respective duties under the general superintendence and control of an inspector of colonial hospitals.

DUTIES OF THE SURGEON.

The surgeon is strictly responsible for the whole management of the establishment. He is prohibited entirely from engaging in country practice, and is allowed only to take so much town practice as will not interfere with the correct and regular performance of his public duties, or with his attendance on the sick in hospital.

He is to be the receiver and disburser of all public monies on account of the hospital, and he is held liable for their due and correct appropriation;—he, himself, shall sign all the official documents, for the accuracy of which he is alone to be answerable.

He shall be required to visit the hospital at least twice a day, taking under his own immediate care the medical treatment of at least one half of the patients that may be admitted, reserving to himself those cases that may be of the most importance.

He shall also be required to superintend the assistant surgeon in the discharge of his duties, and of the sick he may entrust to his care.

The pauper establishment being a branch of somerset hospital, he will visit that institution regularly twice a week, or oftener, if requisite, for the purpose of affording every assistance to the inmates of that department. He will immediately cause the removal of the sick to Somerset hospital, for treatment; and will not, on any account, delegate this duty to servants or unqualified persons.

DUTIES OF THE ASSISTANT SURGEON.

The duties of the assistant surgeon are to be exclusively confined to the hospital. In virtue of his appointment, he is not engaged or enter into private practice, so that his hospital duties may be efficiently and carefully performed.

He shall perform his duties under the immediate superintendence and control of the surgeon. He shall attend to, and treat such cases as the surgeon may allot to his care.

He is to make three established visits daily, as more particularly defined under the head of "hours of attendance."

He is to reside in the hospital, and is not to leave it before one o'clock, p.m., nor to be absent from it after five in the evening. During his hours of absence, viz.: from one to five, he is to acquaint the messenger, so that he may be found in the course of half an hour, in the event of accidents, or any thing of importance occurring.

He is to attend to all cases that may be admitted between the regular visiting hours, reporting to the surgeon on his first visit thereto.

The assistant surgeon to be present at the execution of all wills of patients, and to attach his signature, certifying to their correctness, and the patient's state of mind at the time.

He shall superintend the compounding of all medicines for the sick. He shall be responsible for the due custody and appropriation of the medicines, materials, &c. that may belong to the hospital, for which he will account in a half yearly return.

DETAIL OF CASES.

The surgeon and assistant surgeon will each keep a case book, in which the clinical history of the cases admitted into hospital will be entered, and the continued detail of the case is to be taken, daily, at the bed-side, and the treatment entered, where alone it can be faithfully and correctly done. This book to be carefully preserved as a hospital record.

In all fatal cases an examination is to take place, and the morbid appearance is to be carefully and minutely noticed, at the time. Previously, however, to the examination taking place a short outline of the case is to be made out, which, together with the morbid appearances, will be entered in the necrological register.

DUTIES OF CLERK AND STEWARD.

He is to take charge of the bedding and utensils, and other hospital stores, for which he is to be answerable to the surgeon, who is responsible to the public, for any damage or loss.

He is also, at a fixed daily rate, to issue to the cook, the due proportion of provisions, according to the diet roll, and is to take care that the whole are dressed in a clean and proper manner, and that the several meals are punctually ready for delivery at the prescribed hours, and to see the same delivered to the respective patients.

The steward is particularly charged with the economy of the kitchen, to see that no waste or slovenliness is permitted, that the various cooking utensils are kept clean, and employed only for the purposes for which they were provided.

He is to receive whatever articles of dress, &c., the patient may have brought with him on his admission to the hospital, and after having entered them in a book kept for that purpose, is to attach to them a ticket, with the patient's name, and keep them safely until such time as the patient dies, or is discharged.

He is to keep a book in which he is to enter the name, date

of admission, discharge, or death, of every patient received within the hospital.

On the arrival of a patient at the hospital, he is to receive him, and hand him over to the hospital wardenmaster, who will supply him with the necessary clothing and bedding, and immediately report it to the surgeon.

If the surgeon directs, or a patient expresses a wish to be visited by a clergyman, he is to give notice of it as soon as possible to the person who may be appointed for the purpose, or whom the patient may direct.

If a patient expresses a wish to make his will, he is to repair immediately to the ward in which the patient lies, and in the presence of the hospital wardenmaster, or any other respectable witness, or witness, he is to fill up the customary form agreeable to the patient's instructions; but if the patient expresses his wish to have a notary, then the steward shall send for one immediately, and after obtaining the patient's signature, and that of the witness or witness, and the attending signature of the resident medical officer, the latter will hand it over to such person as the patient may appoint.

During the absence of the surgeon and assistant surgeon, he is to exercise control over the hospital servants,—to see the orders of the medical officers carried into effect, and to maintain regularity and quietness throughout the hospital.

The steward is not to leave the hospital without the knowledge of the resident medical officer, nor at all during his absence.

He is to make out all returns connected with the expenditure of the hospital, and any other returns that may be required of him by the surgeon in charge, for the accuracy of which, however, the latter is alone responsible.

HOSPITAL WARDMASTER'S DUTIES.

The hospital wardenmaster has the immediate charge of the several wards of the hospital, and is to see that the other attendants on the sick carefully perform their duty.

On the admission of patients, it is his business to receive them himself, and report to the surgeon. He is to take care that they are properly cleaned and washed with warm water and soap, their hair combed, and cut if necessary, and then remove them to the wards allotted for them.—He is to have them provided with an hospital dress, bed, and bedding.

He is to consider the bedding, linen, dresses, utensils, and necessaries of every description, issued for the use of the wards as in his charge, and is responsible that no part of them be damaged or misused. He is to report damages or losses, as soon as he becomes aware of them, to the steward. These returns will then be submitted to the hon. colonial secretary for his final approval.

The surgeon will also be required to furnish an annual general statement of expenditure which will include all charges not stated in the quarterly return, and which will shew the actual expense of the establishment.

to be made acquainted whenever a change in the rate of diet allowed him is ordered, and whenever extras are issued, their amount and kind.

SUPPLIES OF PROVISIONS.

Fresh meat, bread, wine, and every other article required for the use of the hospital and of the sick, which can be provided by contract, are to be obtained from this source, upon requisitions entered daily in a pamphlet, and signed daily by the surgeon, who will settle accounts with the contractor monthly for the value of the supply.

The supply of provisions for the pauper establishment to be drawn direct from the contractors, the directors obtaining the signature of the surgeon to the requisitions.

Such supplies which cannot be obtained by contract, the surgeon is to purchase, taking care to procure satisfactory vouchers, in order to substantiate his charges.

A copy of the mode of diets to be pasted on a board, and one to be hung up in each ward.

In order that the patients may be satisfied that justice is done to them, and that no undue preference is shown, one or two from each ward to be present in the cook house at the hour of dinner, to see the apportioning of the articles of ordinary diet.

EXPENDITURE RETURNS AND ACCOUNTS.

The accounts of the hospital expenditure to be made up quarterly, and in duplicate, but the supplies are notwithstanding, to be paid for monthly.

The expenditure of the pauper establishment to be made out in a similar form, and at the same period, by the director of that institution—the surgeon alone signing it.

These accounts to be prepared as soon as possible after the termination of the quarter, for the purpose of being examined and approved by a board of directors, consisting of two of the commissioners of the municipality, and the inspector of colonial hospitals.

These returns will then be submitted to the hon. colonial secretary for his final approval.

The surgeon will also be required to furnish an annual general statement of expenditure which will include all charges not stated in the quarterly return, and which will shew the actual expense of the establishment.

HOSPITAL FEES.

The hospital fees for all classes of patients to be one shilling and three pence per diem, from which there is to be only one exception, viz., masters and chief officers of ships, who will be charged three shillings per diem.

The fees to be collected monthly, and in the event of a patient being intermediately discharged, the account to be immediately rendered for payment; this account in every instance to be signed by the surgeon.

The amount of fees so received by the surgeon to be entered in a book kept for that purpose, and a nominal list containing the sums received from each patient, to be attached to the quarterly expenditure return as a credit voucher. The deficiency to meet the hospital expenditure to be then drawn from the public treasury, by which means the actual cost to government will be correctly ascertained. A separate nominal list of non-paying patients that have been treated in the hospital to be likewise made out, and attached to the expenditure return with the periods that each have been in hospital.

Non-paying patients to be recommended by the wardenmaster of the district in which they reside, certifying to their incapacity of paying hospital fees, and that they are fit subjects of charity. Such ticket of recommendation to be approved of by the Colonial Secretary.

In the event of paupers found on the street, the recommendation of the superintendent of police to be sufficient to gain the patient admittance into hospital.

In cases of patients admitted on an emergency, the wardenmasters of the districts, as soon as possible, will certify to the means of the persons so admitted paying for their subsistence.

Patients who pay for their subsistence, to be recommended for admission into hospital by some respectable householder, who will become security to pay the hospital fees.

These recommendations for admission to be uniformly filed and kept for future reference.

No erasures, or interlinings will be permitted in any document connected with the expenditure, when such are unavoidable, they must be attested by the surgeon subcribing the initials of his name to each.

CAPITAL OPERATIONS.

Whenever a capital operation is about to be performed, an intimation stating its nature and the hour of operating is to be sent to the president of the medical committee, for the information of such of the town-practitioners who may wish to be present.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS' RELATIVES.

The friends of patients to be admitted on Mondays and Thursdays, from 12 to 1 o'clock, P.M., under such restrictions as the medical officers may from time to time fix. In urgent cases, or friends coming from a distance, they are to be admitted at any time during the day, having first obtained the sanction of the surgeon or resident medical officer, who will use great circumspection in permitting the friends of the lunatics having access to them.

OUT-DOOR PATIENTS.

Medicines and advice will be given to such poor persons who may not require hospital confinement, on their producing a certificate from the wardenmaster or the district in which they reside, as to their being fit objects for charity. These patients to attend at the hospital on Mondays and Thursdays, at 11 o'clock, when they will be furnished with the ticket of "out-door patient," by one of the medical officers, on which the medical officer will insert the medicine prescribed, and which ticket the patient will take with him to the hospital on every succeeding visit; the medicines prescribed to be entered in a book kept for the purpose.

HOSPITAL BOOKS, &c.

The following books and documents are to be kept in the possession of the surgeon for the purpose of occasional reference, viz.:—admission and discharge book,—case books,—necrological register,—medical return and report book,—guard book for copies of the quarterly and annual expenditure returns,—and for the monthly diet rolls, and monthly rolls of excess, filled up,—book for the entry of all requisitions for medicines and hospital equipment.

The pass books between the surgeon and the contractors to be invariably preserved.

ENGLAND & FRANCE.

As an outbreak of war is expected between England and France, on the subject of the affairs of Turkey and Egypt, we think the following discussion in Parliament, on the 24th of July, will appear interesting,—this being at the same time the latest Parliamentary information on the subject:—

Mr. M. O'FERRALL proposed a vote for the employment of 2,000 additional seamen for 10 months.

Mr. HUME objected to an increase of the naval force, because he believed that the British navy was not employed for British purposes. It had been alleged that the Government had sent a fleet to the coast of Syria to foment and encourage insurrection there. He trusted the noble lord at the head of the Foreign Department would be able to deny the truth of this statement. The Government had been the means of preventing peace between Mehemet Ali and the Porte, but he hoped that some portion of common sense had at least found its way into the Queen's Cabinet. He had been led to believe that the best thing for this country was a close alliance with France, and that the alliance of Russia was most to be dreaded.

He looked with extreme jealousy at the steady attempts which Russia made against the extension and consolidation of British power. He considered that the noble lord at the head of the Foreign Department had maintained an anti English policy with reference to Egypt, for which the people of this country had been taxed to the extent of 2,000,000. Under these circumstances he was unwilling to place any greater force at the disposal of the noble lord's disposal.

He had seen a strong statement to the effect that the Syrian insurrection had been fanned and incited by the British authorities. If this were true, the affair was most discreditable to the British nation. He had also seen a statement in a public journal, in which the noble

lord was accused of having formed a treaty with Russia, Prussia, and Austria, not only without sanction, but to the exclusion of France altogether, the object of the treaty being to compel Egypt to concede. He trusted the noble lord was in a position to deny the truth of this charge, and assure the house that the alliance with France was at the present moment as firm as it ever had been.

Lord Palmerston was bound to say that his hon. friend had made the most frank expression of an opinion, both in public and private, that the views entertained by him (Lord Palmerston) on the topics just adverted to were exceedingly injurious to the interests of this country; yet, with all respect for his hon. friend, he never felt a stronger conviction on any point than on this—that the views which the hon. member (Hume) himself did. Those amicable relations with France and with Russia, he believed, had more interest than France in the preservation of commerce and trade, which were essential to her interests. With respect to the insurrection in Syria, his hon. friend himself had said that such insurrections had occurred every year under the Porte, which was the case, and therefore it was unnecessary to resort to the supposition of British influence having been used on this occasion to produce that which his hon. friend himself admitted was of very ordinary occurrence. (Hear.)

Viscount INGESTRE begged to ask whether it was the intention of Government to put any more ships in commission, in what extent, and on what service they were likely to be employed?

Lori J. RUSSELL said, that he had stated at the commencement of the year that there was then a greater number of men in the vote then taken, and that it was then stated that the number of men employed should be reduced, with the ships being put out of commission. He had at the same time stated, that if it should be necessary, Ministers would call down the house for more men. They now asked, not for the full number of men, but only for so many as were required to keep in commission the ships he had referred to.

Captain GORD
