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the 19th section of said Ordinance, No. 1, 1840, after the approval and publication by his Excellency the Governor, obtain the force of law, and are considered as part of the Municipal Ordinance...

And whereas, says the 50th section of the Municipal Ordinance, No. 1, 1840, "by a new organization of the Police in Cape Town, to be arranged and established under the superintendence of the Colonial Government, the necessity for watchhouse keepers, sergeants of the night, watchmen, and patrols, to be provided by the Municipality, will be altogether superseded..."

Such then being the law, we have to record with deep regret, that the Police have not been performing their duty, in abating the nuisances as prescribed by the Municipal Regulations, and the Police Ordinance No. 2, 1840. The Inhabitants justly complain that the Regulations are a dead letter; and one of our respectable Wardmasters has actually laid his complaint in writing on that head before the Board of Commissioners...

It appears that the Superintendent of Police considers his force too small for the purposes alluded to,—that he expects the Commissioners will appoint "streetkeepers," to abate the nuisance,—and that his force will then assist the Streetkeepers,—he considering: the principal duty of his Police to consist in the protection of lives and property, and the prevention of crimes...

If the Superintendent considered his force too small, why was not an application made to Government for an increase, instead of waiting till the present occasion. Surely he must have seen and read in the Government Gazette, the Nuisance Regulations as published by his Excellency the Governor, on the 2d of October last,—and have perceived from the 33, 44, 55, 56, 57, and 61 sections of the Municipal Regulations, that the Police was directly charged with the execution of certain matters, which they have failed, neglected, and actually refused to do!

But what means "assistance"? We are afraid the following case will not explain it! By the 17th section of Police Ordinance, No. 2, 1840, the members of the Police force are directed—"to prevent, abate, and suppress all such nuisances"—(as set forth in the Municipal Regulations)—and they shall—"arrest, without warrant, any person whom they shall see in the actual commission of any nuisance, or who shall be charged by any streetkeeper or other officer of the Municipality, or any other credible person, with having recently committed any nuisance..."

Enough for the present. The case is now in the hands of Government, and we will see what orders will be given to the Police Department. We remind the Wardmasters that a Meeting of their Board has been convened for Monday next, to take into consideration and decide upon the Regulations to be submitted to them. —Those Regulations have been published in the Government Gazette, and we rejoice to find, that the Public have come forward with their remarks, observations, and censures upon some of them. They have adopted the legitimate mode of making their wishes and desires known through the public press, and it will become the pleasant duty of the Wardmasters, (the more direct representatives of the inhabitants of Cape Town) to seriously consider, and fearlessly and independently decide

upon them.—They have up to the present performed their functions to the entire satisfaction of their constituents, and we have no doubt they will do the same on the present occasion.

Although we consider the proper place for explanation to be the Meeting above alluded to, yet we may be allowed to calm the minds of "fool-waters," by informing them, that the enormous 2d. market fee is a mistake for 1d.

PORT NATAL. We give the following extract from the "Cape Frontier Times" of the 4th Nov.:

It is a singular circumstance that his Excellency the Governor has taken advantage of his visit to the Eastern Districts, to extend his tour as far as Port Natal, but as to whether it be in consequence of a communication received from the Boer, or from a desire to ascertain, by personal inspection, the true position of the emigrants, and to judge of their probable influence over the Zoolah tribes with respect to the threatened Natal—it is equally silent.

Should his Excellency, however, seriously contemplate the journey, we trust that whatever may be the motive in view it will essentially be productive of benefit to the Colonists, to the Dutch, and to the Caffers.

On Sunday last the inhabitants of Graham's Town were thrown into a state of much excitement by a report of a disturbance of a serious nature,—connected with the Caffers—having taken place, in the neighbourhood of Fort Peddie; which the sudden departure of his honor the Lieut. Governor prevented that day, and the subsequent dispatch of a strong military force to the supposed scene of action—were by no means calculated to allay. We have heard several versions of the affair; the following, however, we believe to be correct:—It seems that an affray took place between some Fingo and Caffer children, who had been playing together, in which a party of Fingoes, and subsequently one of Caffers joined, and the former were eventually driven to take refuge under the walls of the fort; several lives are stated to have been lost.

Accounts received from Fort Peddie this morning, (Wednesday), corroborate the report already described.—Various rumours are current respecting the affair. Urabie is represented as having been the prime mover in it—and the possession of the Fingo cattle the object. This Chief, it is said, sent an impertinent message to the Resident Agent, Mr. T. Shepstone, desiring him to move, whilst he sat up the Fingoes. He is stated to have collected, at this time, between 2 and 3,000 followers. Matters, however, have been amicably settled, for the present. His honor the Lieut. Governor has returned to town.

ARRIVAL AT GRAHAM'S TOWN OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR. Last Thursday afternoon, about 5 o'clock, his Excellency the Governor arrived here, attended by a large assemblage of military officers, and of civilians who had rode out to welcome him, and to grace his entry into town. The day was extremely auspicious—the air calm, and sun brilliant, and as the carriage passed down the High street to Government House, a "coup d'oeil" was one of the most picturesque and pleasing of the kind, that can well be imagined. The great breadth of the street was extremely favorable to the arrangements—while the deep green of the luxuriant foliage of the oaks and Caffer Booms, which margin the pathway on either hand, contrasted finely with the gorgeous scarlet dress of the military, that lined the avenue through its entire length. His Excellency rode between the lines bare headed, the bands playing the national air of "God save the Queen," the troops presenting arms, and the battery announcing by repeated arrival. Lady Napier preceded his Excellency a short distance in the Lt. Governor's carriage, drawn by four bays, escorted by a party of the Cape Mounted Rifles. We are glad to say, that his Excellency looked remarkably well, and was as gratified by the cordial greeting with which he was met on every hand. Englishmen are naturally loyal, their King and their country are household words with them, and no wonder that the representatives of their Sovereign should be to them an object of great interest and respect. We make this remark from a conviction that his Excellency must have felt this to be the case in the reception which he received, and in the cheers which hailed his arrival in the metropolis of the Eastern Province.—Graham's Town Journal, Nov. 5.

Original Correspondence. TO THE EDITOR OF "DE ZUID-APRIKAAN."

Garden "De Hoop," 10th Nov., 1840. Sir,—The writers of both the anonymous letters which appeared in your paper of the 6th inst., subscribed by Shareholders of "De Protector" Fire and Life Assurance Company, but which, under correction, might have been subscribed with other and more proper names, do not merely refer to my letter in your paper of the 30th ultimo, simply remarking, that both these letters, about which I might say a great deal, are not worthy of my further notice.

As regards what Mr. De Kock was pleased to inform the public, about the return of my letter by him, which he says to have been done with the advice of my father in law, (Directors being able to testify, that Mr. Blanckenberg continually declared to them, that on account of his being so closely connected with me, he would not at all interfere with the case), it appears quite clear, from the letter written to me by Mr. Blanckenberg, at the office of "De Protector," immediately after my letter was returned to him, and which Mr. De Kock had the kindness to cause to be published, who is to blame in the case alluded to.

If Mr. De Kock had read my published correspondence with more attention; or had simply asked an explanation as to the object of my remark about the return of my letter by him, instead of so ungenerously attacking Mr. Blanckenberg, it would have been explained to him, that it was merely made for the purpose of explaining the whole correspondence.

But now one word, Mr. Secretary, as you still seem to like it! We have not done yet. Do allow me to ask you, who then you think you have cleared yourself, if you say (suppose it to be so), that my letter was returned by you, by the advice of Mr. Blanckenberg?—You are honored with the situation of Secretary, and are liberally rewarded for the due performance of your duties. The question is simply this: whether you, in the strictest sense of the word, were officially justified to return my letter, addressed to you, unopened?

But follow me a little further with your serious attention, Why did you not also endeavour to expulate yourself respecting another of your (as you remark yourself in your letter to Mr. Blanckenberg,) unaccountable dealings, appearing in your letter of the 10th October to me, wherein you, with reference to the conditions of the Policy of Assurance (mark), express yourself thus: "It is therefore, for those reasons, that you are hereby kindly requested, to make a correct statement of the occurrence as soon as possible, agreeably to the conditions contained in your Policy of Assurance."—The conditions of my Policy of Assurance being as follows:—"Such persons as suffer damage or loss, are to make a correct statement thereof within three months. What do you think would you be able (not too complimentary for a Secretary), to accuse Mr. Blanckenberg of this? Suffice it for the present. As to myself, I wish to pause, until it shall please the Secretary to enter into some further conversation with me about it.

But, suppose, Mr. Secretary, do tell me (as I seldom mingle with public affairs), and you will particularly oblige me by so doing,—what difference there between the Secretary and a Shareholder, and a Shareholder and a Director? or otherwise,—what difference is there between a Shareholder of the "Protector" Fire and Life Assurance Company and the Secretary, and another Shareholder and a Director? During the Caffer War, Cape Town, and all the upper Districts, were supplied almost solely from it with slaughter Cattle and Sheep; and it is a singular fact, and perhaps unparalleled in any other District, that almost all the Farmers who emigrated from beyond the Orange River, have returned, or are returning to it, having found the Sheep pasturage there inferior to what they had left.

There is an abundant supply of Water on all the Farms, with the exception of two or three, on which, however, reservoirs, which would contain rain water for a very long time, might be formed at a trifling expense.

The Hill Farms are particularly well suited for breeding Horses, as there is abundance of Grass, and the Distemper has never been known there. They are also valuable in seasons of drought, as, from their elevation, the herbage is green, while the neighbouring low country is then parched and dry.

The lowland Farms being situated at the base, and including the sides, of the Newveld Range of Mountains, are also much less liable to drought than most other Farms in the Division.

With the exception of *Geitsteele* among Sheep, called, it is believed, *Grasssteele* in Swellendam, and which, as it arises from superabundance of food, and too great luxuriance of pasture; may be easily guarded against, no sort of stock is affected with any kind of disease on these Farms. The horse distemper, indeed, sometimes prevails on lowland Farms; but, as already said, it never makes its appearance on the hill pastures. The *Jaagstiek*, *Lanzstiek*, *Kluisstiek*, *Tongstiek*, and *Brandstiek*, so prevalent in other Districts, may be said to be here altogether unknown. No sort of stock requires to be put under cover at any season, except on the most exposed of the hill Farms, where Sheep would require to be put under cover, in the event of a severe storm, which, however, does not occur oftener on an average than once in ten years.

Wheat yields a return of 40 and 50 for 1, without manure. The produce of the Vineyard is reckoned at 2 leaguers of Must for every 1,000 standard Vines. And there is a ready market for Grain, Brandy, and Wine. The average price of Wheat for the last 3 years has been Rls. 350 per load, Brandy, Rds. 240 per league, and Wine from Rds. 80 to Rds. 240 per league, according to quality; but the best inferior to common Cape Wine. Raisins and dried Fruits average 4jd. per pound.

There are good roads, generally, throughout the District. An excellent road has lately been made by the unaided exertions of the inhabitants, and at their sole expense, from Beaufort to the summit of the Newveld Range of Mountains, by which all the Hill-farms will be greatly benefited. It is also in contemplation to make a road over the Zwartbergen to Mossel Bay, which may then be reached from Beaufort in six days' journey, with a bullock wagon. The present sea port is Port Elizabeth, which is 9 days' journey from Beaufort.
