THE ZUID-AFRIKAAN. CAPE TOWN, JUNE 4, 1841.

The Elliot against the "Cape Paper Money" has at last been issued! In the Meeting of the Legislative Council on the 27th of May, the Governor laid before it an extract of a letter from the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, dated 29th December, containing a direction to withdraw and cancel the "Cape Paper Money," or substitute in lieu thereof "Debentures" bearing interest, as the Council shall appear most expedient, for reducing the amount of Government Paper Money in circulation. The whole of the extract, as reported to have been read in the Council, will be found in another column.

In addition to this, we have been credibly informed, that a sum of £20,000 in gold, is already directed to be taken Home by the "Melville,"—that about £60,000 is to be transmitted to the East,—and that further transmissions are about to be made to the Mauritius and New-South Wales. The Paper Money is said to be chiefly treasured up in the Commissariat chest, which, for the purpose of redemption, withdrawal, or cancellation, the Colonial Government will now have to exchange for gold and silver. The whole amount of Paper Money is given in the Blue Book of 1839, at £202,608, of which it was stated in the Legislative Council of 1840, that £27,000 was in the Government Bank, £3,000 in the Treasury, £120,000 in the Commissariat chest, and £52,608 in circulation.

The whole amount of coin in circulation is given in the said Blue Book, at £300,000, of which £120,000 will have to find its way into the Commissariat chest, for the redemption of the Paper Money, for the purpose of cancellation or withdrawal, leaving, therefore, the metallic currency at £180,000. If, then, the directions given in the letter of the Lords of the Treasury, be further followed up,—which we cannot with any possibility see how it can be longer delayed,—the whole circulating medium in the colony being

will be reduced, first by paying to the Commissariat, to redeem the paper money, in their hands 120,000

which will leave 382,608 and secondly by cancelling the paper money, being 202,608 leaving only 180,000. If therefore the £20,000 and £60,000 above mentioned is also to be exported, the balance of coin will remain £100,000.

An increase must necessarily be expected from ships touching at this place, passengers staying here and spending money, &c. But if the object of the Lords of the Treasury be executed, as we expect it to be from the said letter, viz.—"The attention of their Lordships have necessarily been called to the expense and inconvenience which continues to result from the very large amount of drafts drawn, and balances held by the Commissariat Department on this Station," [which we are informed at present to be upwards of £400,000], especially at a period when Her Majesty's Government is adopting every precaution in other quarters to keep down the public balances, and carefully to adjust the supplies to the expenditure,—which we infer to mean, we shall order all surplus balances to be transmitted home,—we may as well ask what will be the amount of coin remaining in this Colony.

Such are the results, which we represent to ourselves as consequent upon the measure, if executed. But the Lords of the Treasury seem to have it to the opinion of the Council, whether they shall deem it expedient to cancel and withdraw the Paper Money, by direct redemption in cash, or by the issuing of "Debentures," bearing interest, which will have the effect of making the Notes like the Government Paper at Ceylon and Mauritius, payable at all times in specie on demand, at the Colonial Treasury.

It is evident, therefore, that the reduction of the circulating medium must be counteracted by the issuing, on the part of the Colonial Government, of "Debentures bearing interest," or by the issuing of Notes on the part of private Banks, as is now done by the Cape of Good Hope Bank. Will the Colonial Government issue such "Debentures"? If it does, to what amount? Will the Council will pause, before adopting the first, or deciding upon the second. It was maintained, by the unofficial members of the Council, during the discussion on the subject in August, 1840, that for the redemption of the Government Paper money—the Home Government, and not the Colony, was liable. Will they, therefore, now take it upon them, at once to relinquish their claim, and admit the liability of the Colony, by issuing Debentures, and thus creating a public national debt, to redeem the liabilities of the Home Government? Will they at once recklessly saddle the Colony with the payment of interest on those Debentures, and thus increase the public expenditure, for which our revenue has already proved insufficient? The other source, is the issuing of notes by private Banks. The only Bank of "issue" in Cape Town is the Cape of Good Hope Bank, which will and must necessarily increase its "notes," as the circulating medium, both Government notes, and gold and silver decrease. The public will be compelled, for want of other or sufficient circulating medium, to employ those notes, and the question then arises,—Is it safe that the public in that respect shall depend from only one Bank? We intend no reflection of whatever nature against that Bank, we merely argue upon general principles. We have seen accidents happening to the greatest and wealthiest Bankers in England, such as stopping payments, or otherwise

recalled loans, or any additional issue of notes in any other manner, on the plea of carrying on public works or otherwise, either can or ought to be permitted on the part of Her Majesty's Government, until that of the Colony shall have made arrangements for the redemption or liquidation of the already existing paper debt; as it still appears to their Lordships that any such re-issue could be considered in no other light than as an arrangement for carrying on those works by them and at the charge of this country,—a course which they do not consider Her Majesty's Government would be warranted in adopting without the assent of Parliament. The proceedings of the Executive and Legislative Councils of the Cape of Good Hope, render it incumbent on their Lordships further to remark, they cannot admit that any inference is to be drawn from the terms of the Treasury Minute of the 11th Feb. 1825, or from the liberal aid afforded to the colony by the subsequent cancelling in the year 1825, of an amount of paper which had been received into the Commissariat chest, that Her Majesty's Government ever contemplated the redemption of the whole of the colonial debt of the Cape of Good Hope at the expense of this country, which would have been a species of pecuniary assistance not granted in the case of any other colony; and, moreover, it is scarcely necessary to point out to Lord John Russell that Her Majesty's Government have not at present any means at their disposal, of effecting such an object without applying to Parliament. Their Lordships are certainly not aware of any circumstances, either in the original creation of the debt, or in the recent financial state of the colony, which should warrant their entertaining the project of any such application.

I am to request that you will likewise observe to his Lordship that, on recurring to the subject of the colonial paper currency at the Cape, the attention of their Lordships has necessarily been called to the expense and inconvenience which continues to result from the very large amount of drafts drawn and balances held by the Commissariat Department at that Station, under the present arrangements relative to that currency, more especially at a period when Her Majesty's Government is adopting every precaution in other quarters to keep down the public balances and carefully to adjust the supplies to the expenditure. Their Lordships not only feel assured that renewed issues of the Colonial paper would increase that inconvenience, but they also deem it indispensable that the Colonial Government should be urgently required to take further steps towards putting the paper debt in a train of liquidation, by devoting, forthwith, the accrued surplus balances held by the Treasurer to replace in the Bank the residue of the amount which had been borrowed from the repaid loans, and, forthwith, causing an amount of paper equivalent to the repaid loans, to be withdrawn from the Bank and cancelled,—as well as the adoption of such measures, by substitution of debentures bearing interest for a portion of the existing paper, or otherwise, as may appear to the local Council most expedient for reducing the amount of paper in general circulation, in such manner that, like the Government paper at Ceylon and Mauritius, the notes may be made payable at all times in specie on demand, at the Colonial Treasury.

Until this desirable and indispensable object shall have been attained, their Lordships deem it unnecessary to enter into the discussion of any projects for carrying on extensive public works, or for the furtherance of emigration to the Cape of Good Hope.
